The Old Guard, they used to say, dies, but never surrenders. It does, however, occasionally leave the field at the double-quick, with its suspenders flapping against its twinkling ankles; and when it does, the spectacle is a sight for gods and men.

That was the signifcant thing about the recent Republican convention. Its significance was doubled by the fact that the great retreat took place in Cleveland.

For the last Republican convention to be held in Cleveland-that of 1924, when Calvin Coolidge was nominated -showed the Old Guard at the height of its power.

It was fat, smug, and satisfied, then. When a little group of midwestern liberals made a valiant attempt to remind the party of its old progressive heritage, the Old Guard rolled over it without delay or compunction.

The contrast with what happened this year is one of the most striking things in American politics.

This year, as in 1924, midwestern liberals advanced to the field with banners flying. But the solid Old Guard phalanx that was all-powerful 12 years ago crumbled and broke before them.

It fought a few stubborn rear-guard actions, to be sure. There were moments when it managed to give the convention, superficially, an echo of bygone days. In the end, however, it left the field in disorder.

The Old Guard lived by the name of Abraham Lincoln and the philosophy of William McKinley. These may be excellent things to live by, but they do not have too much direct application to modern life.

You cannot meet the infinitely complex problems of a modern industrial civilization by reminding people that Lincoln was a great man of the people and that McKinley believed in the full dinner pail.

To Build 36,000 Miles of Terraces To Hold Farm Land

the service, said today.

Most of the terracing will onfined in the southeast and will to protect approximately 500,000 acres from erosion To date, the service has built more than 15,000 miles of ter-

nces, as part of an erosion con-

trol program on farms of more than 200,000 acres. Approximate ly half of this work was done durng the past year. Bennett emphasized that ter-

races should be carefully built and that they are not adapted to all parts of the country.

"Terraces are valuable in the control of erosion, especially on moderate slopes of deep, porous soil," he said, "but generally it is essential that they be supplement ed by ample vegetation and proper cropping and tillage practices if they are to be effective in longtime erosion control.

"Terracing is only one part of rosion control. More extensive use of adaptable trees and grass es, correct methods of cultivation, increased planting of soil-binding crops and proper crop rotation are among the equally important control measures. "Experience has shown that

terraces are not practicable in all parts of the country because peculiar soil and climatic conditions in certain sections," Bennett said. "For example, in some parts of Washington state, heavy snows often are followed by sudder thaws. If these thawing periods do not melt all of the snow, terrace channels are left with alternating ections of snow and water. The now forms a series of blockades preventing slow, safe runoff to the protected terrace outlets. With no other route of escape, water breaks over the top of the ter race and flows down the slope, en
