## Ancestor signed Declaration; introduced golf to colonies

George Rush knew that his ancestor, Dr. Benjamin Rush of Philadelphia, was one of the

signers of the Declaration of Independence 199 years ago Friday.

BUT HE didn't know, until he was thumbing through Time magazine's Special 1776 Issue recently, that his famous ancestor also introduced golf into the United States.

In the "People's" section of the special issue, on Page 56, Rush discovered a full-color portrait of his ancestor, wearing a Colonial golfing costume and holding a wooden golf club. The accompanying article said:

"Philadelphia's best-known physician Benjamin Rush, 30, is now busy prescribing to the health of all Americans. A delegate to the Pennsylvania Provincial Conference, he has been an outspoken Patriot since 1773, when he protested the British tea tax by publishing a newspaper article claiming that tea caused nervous disorders."

BUT HE has not cut off all ties to his ancestral Britain, and he talks of one sport that he feels should be imported to America.

"There is a large common in which there are several little holes," Rush explained to friends recently. "The game is played with little leather balls stuffed with feathers, and sticks made somewhat in the form of a bandy-wicket, and he who puts a ball into a given number of holes with the fewest strokes gets the game."

"One puzzled fellow delegate asked what the game was good for. A man who played golf, replied Rush, 'would live ten years the longer.'"

HOW'S THAT for a prime excuse, golf fans? As a result of this new information on his ancestor, Rush now considers it his patriotic duty to celebrate Independence Day with a game of golf.

Rush, who is the quality control manager of the Dimmitt Amstar Plant, is a direct descendant of the famous Colonial physician.

"The family tree shows it's a direct descendancy, six or seven generations back. It's so remote it's practically nothing, except for the family pride we can claim from it," Rush said.

"My uncle Andrew, a jeweler in Illinois, charted all the family history and had it all blocked out before he died."

GOLF AND independence were just two of many "firsts" provided to the new nation by the energetic young Philadelphia physician. Dr. Rush also served as the surgeon general [See ANCESTOR, Page 9]

We hear by the grapevine that gasoline prices have advanced by about three cents a gallon from wherever they had advanced to before. A number of major oil companies just happened to raise their prices at the same time, which shouldn't lead anyone to suspect that any type of price-fixing was involved.

Although the acreage has been small, harvest operations will be virtually completed this week on one of the finest wheat crops ever produced in this county. Heavy yields on both irrigated and dry land are being reported.

Onion harvest is expected to begin this week and the potato harvest should begin soon, as the harvesting of both crops usually overlaps. Our information is that there is a strong market and prices are good. Harvesting of the vegetable crop should be followed immediately, if not sooner, by the sunflower harvest. Sunflowers are a new money crop for this area and the early plantings will soon be in full bloom. We are told that harvest should begin about the first of August. I don't know about the commercial type sunflowers, but the wild ones down in Bell County, where I grew up mostly, had more chiggers per square inch than any other type of vegetation.

Everyone is in favor of the city operating on a solid financial basis, and are no doubt willing to foot the bill for all necessary city services. There has been considerable discontent recently with the drastic increases in city water bills and garbage collection. Until recent years city services were wholly financed by a city ad valorem tax, along with water, sewer and garbage collection charges. The city's income in recent years has been augmented by a considerable amount by the city sales tax and revenue sharing payments from the federal government. A comprehensive financial statement published by the city might be worthwhile in quieting the discontent of the people who pay the bill.

## New syrup to be liquid gold

Based on current prices, Robert Quittmeyer, president of Amstar, estimated that at the completion of Amstar's expansion program in Dimmitt, the annual market value of corn sweetener produced at the plant will be \$50 to \$60 million.

QUITMEYER and several other Amstar officials were in Dimmitt last Thursday for groundbreaking ceremonies for the \$23 million addition. Also on hand were vice president Howard Wentz, treasurer Randolph Williams and Spreckels division president Guy Manuel. "The expansion will allow greater production of the high-fructose corn sweetener, which is a new product for us," he explained. "Our company has been producing liquid sucrose sweeteners for over 100 years, but this is our first venture into high fructose corn sweetener. We've spent the last two years learning how to produce and use it."

A highly refined liquid sweetener, the product is replacing granulated sugar in the bottling, canning and refining industries. It is distributed by rail tank cars to points such as California and Louisiana. Since it is a liquid, Quittmeyer noted it would not be suitable for export. [See NEW SYRUP, Page 9]

## Danny George still critical; 61 give blood

Sixty-one pints of blood were donated for Danny George at the blood drive conducted by Coffee Memorial Blood Center in Dimmitt Tuesday.

GEORGE needs 150 to 200 pints of blood. Anyone else wishing to donate may do so at the Coffee Memorial Blood Center in Amarillo.

Wednesday morning, officials at Parkland Burn Center in Dallas said that George was still in very critical condition with burns over 60% of his body, mainly face, arms and chest. He is undergoing skin grafting.

George suffered the burns last Wednesday when the spray plane he was piloting crashed and burned. He was transferred to Parkland after receiving treatment at Plains Memorial in Dimmitt and St. Anthony's in Amarillo.

A cable on the plane broke as George was spraying a cotton field for Odus Hastings four miles west of Dimmitt on FM 2392. George was able to get rid of his load of chemicals before crashing in a cornfield.

AT MONDAY'S drive, nine donors renewed insurance policies, bringing the total number of donors to 70.

"It was a real good turnout, I think," said Jack Newsom. "They had more donors this one time than they've ever had in an entire year before."

## Wheat harvest nearly over

Harvest of Castro County's bumper wheat crop is more than 60% complete.

ELEVATORS throughout the county indicated good grade, low moisture and high yields.

The Hart and Nazareth areas reported that harvest there is 95% complete or better.

The average yield for irrigated wheat in the Hart area has been 50 bushels per acre, with the high and low around 65 and 40. The high yield at Nazareth was 70 pounds with a low around 40 and the average between 50 and 60. Most dryland wheat there produced between 20 and 30 pounds.

The Flagg area estimated that harvest is more than 80%

complete. Average irrigated production has been 50 bushels per acre and the dryland average has been 25.

## Pickup-minibike collision leaves children critical

Ricky and Michele Dutton, children of Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Dutton, were transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock Monday in critical condition, following a pickup-minibike accident 17 1/2 miles SW of Dimmitt on FM1055.

RICKY, 11, was traveling north on the minibike, carrying his eight-year-old sister as a passenger.

Jimmy Nix, also driving north in a Ford Ranchero pickup, was passing the minibike and it suddenly made a left turn into a turnrow in front of Nix, said Elias Nava, DPS patrolman.

After the impact, the pickup carried the minibike 100 feet

before ending up in a bar ditch.

The accident occurred approximately 1/2 mile north of the Dutton home at about 5:50 p.m.

AN EARTH ambulance brought the children to Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt for emergency treatment. They were later transferred to Lubbock.

Ricky suffered a fractured skull, a fractured leg and abrasions. Michele sustained a broken jaw, a broken leg and lacerations. At last report, they were said to be in critical but stable condition.

Nix, 32, of Earth, was not injured.

## FPC, GM change stand on irrigation gas

The staff counsel of the Federal Power Commission and the lawyer for General Motors announced jointly last week in Washington, D.C. that they recommended a No. 2 priority for irrigation gas.

THE announcement was a pleasant surprise for farmers and agricultural leaders across

the state. Many of them have testified at FPC hearings in Washington and Lubbock during the last two months that a lowering of priority would bring economic disaster to the farming sector, mainly due to prohibitive costs of converting to another energy source.

Last December, the FPC said that irrigation gas should be in the same classification as industry. GM announced their support of that decision last month.

According to Don Reeve, local Chevrolet dealer, GM did not say why it changed its position.

"I imagine GM dealers in the High Plains had something to do with it though," he said.

"None of the dealers wanted to see irrigation gas diverted to auto building and we told them so through our dealer associations and individually."

"ALTHOUGH dealers didn't have anything to do with the original recommendation and worked actively against it since it could damage the economy of our region, we were taking the brunt of criticism on it because we worked with the public," noted Reeve.

According to John Aiken of Hereford, attorney for the Plains Gas Users Association, the only group still questioning the No. 2 priority is the San Diego Electric Co.

The FPC's administrative law judge will report his decision to the FPC by July 27.

Plans for a 1976 Bicentennial observance also will be discussed at Monday night's meeting, Mrs. Behrends said, "but only if we have people there who are interested in it."

THE ANNUAL summer celebration will include the Nazareth German Folk Festival July 20, Hart Days Aug. 7-9, and the Roundup in Dimmitt Aug. 14-16.

New plans for this year include a "flea market" at the new County Expo Center in conjunction with the Dimmitt celebration, and expansion of the Bicycle Marathon to a three-city event.

"Nursery Rhymes" will be the theme of the Hart Days Parade, and "The Opening of the Prairie" will be the Roundup Parade theme in Dimmitt. Elvon DeVaney is serving as Roundup Parade chairman for the Dimmitt Lions Club.

The Dimmitt area reports 65 to 75% of harvest, with some yields between 70 and 75 bushels. The average was placed at 45 to 50 on irrigated production and 22 bushels on dryland.

The County Activities Committee will meet Monday night to adopt a final schedule of events for the 1975 Roundup.

THE MEETING will begin at 8 p.m. in the courthouse community room, and is open to all persons interested in this year's Roundup events in Nazareth, Hart and Dimmitt.

"We need everybody possible there—all chairmen of events, representatives of all civic clubs and sponsoring organizations, and everybody else interested in taking part in this year's activities," said Jo Behrends, secretary-treasurer of the county-wide coordinating committee.

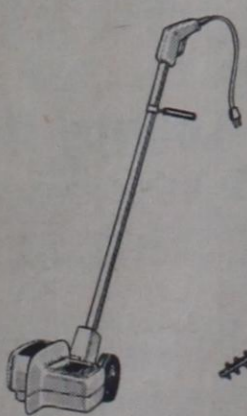

## VETERANS' SERVICES

By BEDFORD W. SMITH  
County Service Officer

Your service officer was in the Amarillo VA Hospital from Tuesday through Friday of last week, just for some needed check-ups; but our office on the second floor of the courthouse was open daily by a very competent summer office secretary, Miss Estella Aleman. She will also be on duty while we are on vacation to furnish needed VA claim forms and help you find information you may need regarding VA benefits. She may not have all the answers but will be very efficient in the search, and if she cannot give you the needed information she can put a call through to the Waco VA Regional Office or the Amarillo VA Hospital.

In calling our office, phone number, 647-4666, remember that the Amarillo Social Security representative and the State Welfare Case Worker have an extension to our office phone. The Food Stamp Office has another number, 647-3319, which is not on our line.

There will be some repetition in some of the information regarding benefits listed below, but they are very important to veterans and dependents regarding loan and educational benefits. Note some important recent changes in two basic laws.

**VETERANS** and eligible dependents who plan to enroll in a course of college training during the fall semester of 1975 must soon submit to the Veterans Administration their applications for educational assistance benefits.

Eligible persons desiring advance payment should submit their completed applications to the VA no later than July 15. You may secure them from our office or Vetreps on school campuses.

Current laws provide educational assistance payments for veterans who have served in the Armed Forces of the United States for 181 days or more at any time since Jan. 31, 1955, and who were released under conditions other than dishonorable. Also eligible for VA assistance are the wives and children of living veterans who are rated permanently and totally disabled because of disabilities which were incurred in or aggravated by military service

#### July garden guide

By IRENE KEATING

Goodness, here it is July already. The summer is well underway. Everyone is busy as usual.

The rain last week was very good on many crops, gardens and yards. It is time again for our monthly garden guide.

1. Check your mulch and replace it on those flower beds if needed.
2. Remember not to neglect those newly planted areas. They need moisture.
3. Spider mites and mildew are usually prevalent at this season. Check your plants closely before buildup occurs.
4. Check your mower height. Raising mower blade 1/2 to 3/4 of an inch in hot weather will aid in protecting the grass from excessive heat.
5. Early blooming mums should receive their last pinch by mid July. Once flower buds start to show don't allow plants to become dry.
6. Soak hanging baskets in a tub of water every few days in addition to the regular daily watering. This is also a good time to fertilize baskets but remember to never apply fertilizer to plants that are excessively dry.
7. Divide spring and early summer flowering perennials and replant the best clump in well prepared beds.

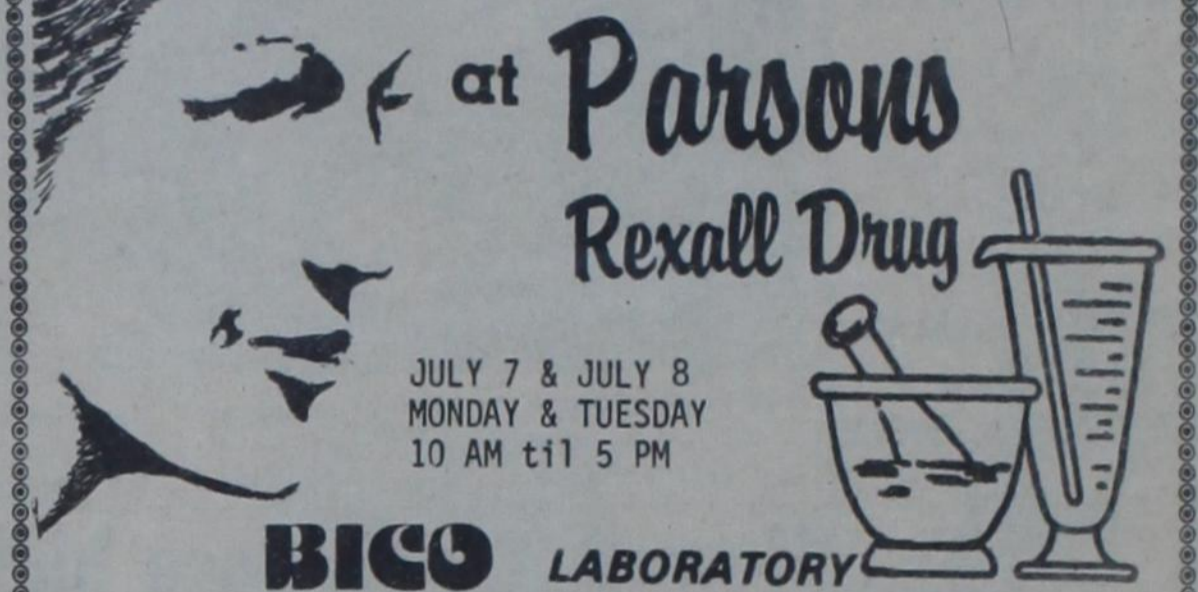

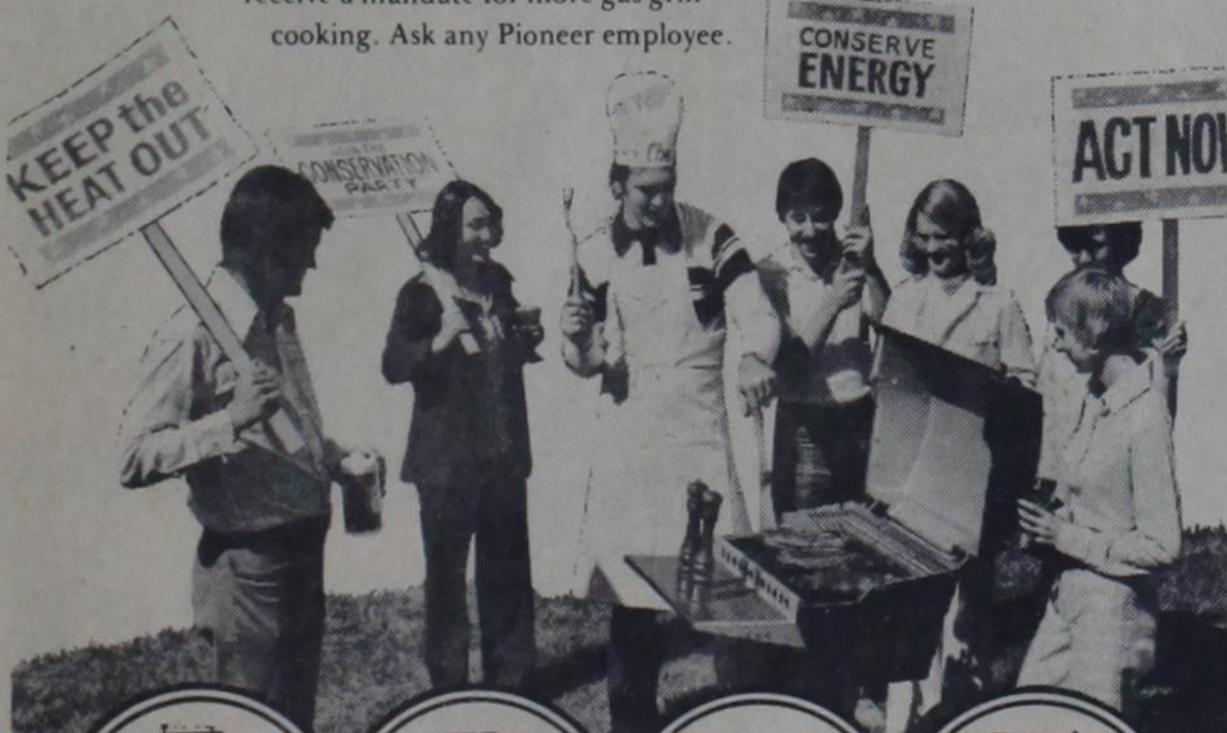

**On Wall Street**

One of the dangers which comes with good news of a temporary nature is that it isn't identified as being of a temporary nature. The result is a false sense of security or prosperity which results from being lulled into complacency when the good news isn't identified as temporary only.

THIS WEEK a sharp improvement in the US balance of payments was announced—from a deficit of \$6.6 billion in the last quarter of 1974 to a first-quarter deficit of only \$500 million. The surprisingly strong showing was a result of both strong trade activities and continued large investments in the US by the oil producing countries.

However, there is no room for comfort or complacency in the numbers recently reported. The OPEC nations plan another boost in the price of oil and this could substantially cool off business recoveries in several of the industrialized nations as well as kick the inflation rate above 10% in less than 12 months. Over half of the inflation pains suffered by many countries were a direct result of the jump in oil prices.

Continued hikes in oil prices could set off a major worldwide recession. The third world (developing) countries have used up the reserves of foreign currencies they built up by selling raw materials at high prices during the commodity boom. Many of these countries are in hock up to their necks and are no longer in a position to continue purchasing machinery, farm equipment and other goods. Thus, the trend toward high export by the US and other manufacturing countries will begin to taper off and drop sharply in the second half of 1975. The Agriculture Dept. estimates that farm exports will slide \$4 billion in fiscal 1976.

All of this should add a sense of urgency to the search for reduction in our dependence on middle-eastern oil, to conserve energy and develop new energy sources. Unfortunately, that sense of urgency is lacking in our Congress. It has failed to come up with a strong energy program and it has weakened President Ford's efforts to carry out a program to get this country energy self-sufficient.

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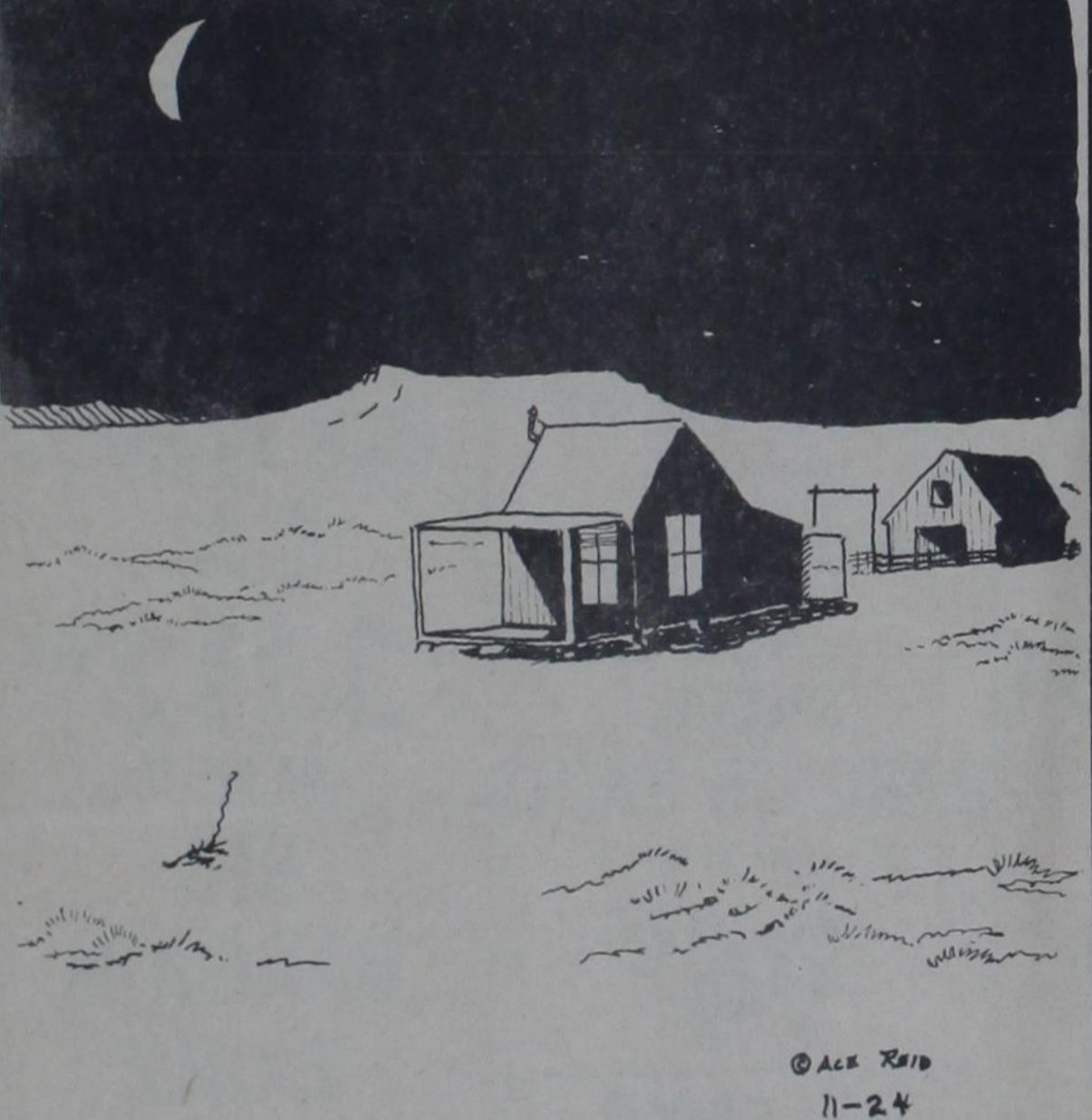

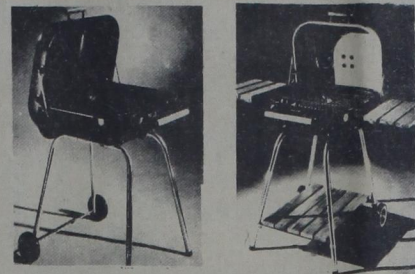

Slough, 26, has been the manager of DAI's Nazareth Branch three years. A native of Darrouzett, he worked for the cooperative four months in Dimmitt before being named to his present post.

WORKING WITH him are Lucy Leinen, who has been the clerk of the Nazareth Branch for six years, and Ramon Bermea, elevator operator and fertilizer serviceman, who joined the staff a year ago.

The Nazareth Branch is starting this week to run free soil samples for its customers. With the price of fertilizer nowadays, it helps to know just what your soil needs and doesn't need.

"We keep a pharmacy file for all customers, with information on past soil samples, the fertilizer applied last year, and so forth," Slough explained.

Speaking of fertilizer, the Nazareth Branch has "the best supply we've had in years," Slough said.

And the Nazareth Branch always keeps a good supply of livestock feed in stock for the dairies, feedlots and swine operations in its area.

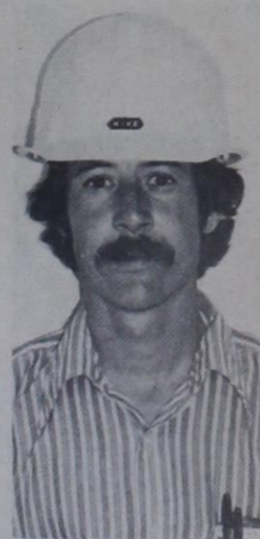

for Gen. Washington's Continental Army, established the nation's first free clinic in Philadelphia in 1786, helped found the first American Anti-Slavery Society, and was the founder of Dickinson College in Pennsylvania.

Rush Medical College (now the University of Chicago College of Medicine) was named for the Colonial physician.

"Chet Braafladt told me that his father, who was quite a well-known medical missionary to China, graduated from Rush Medical College," Rush said.

BORN ON Christmas Eve, 1745, in Byberry, Pa., Benjamin Rush graduated from Princeton at age 15, then received his medical degree from the University of Edinburgh. He was practicing medicine in Philadelphia and serving as a professor of chemistry and medication at the medical college there when he was elected a delegate to the Continental Congress which drafted the historic declaration.

Later, he was elected a delegate to the Pennsylvania Ratifying Convention, where he and James Wilson led the successful fight to ratify the new Federal Constitution.

"Like many men involved in the revolution and the signing of the Declaration of Independence, he ended up broke," Rush explained. "But after the war, he went into banking in Philadelphia, and eventually the family became solidly entrenched as Philadelphia's 'Main Line'—and they still are. My branch of the family staggered out West with the rest of the people."

AFTER establishing himself in banking, Dr. Rush served as treasurer of the US Mint from 1797 to 1813.

His son, Richard, established himself as a brilliant diplomat and public servant. He was Secretary of the Treasury in the Madison Administration, Ambassador to the Court of St. James (Great Britain), and Attorney General under President Monroe.

As a member of the Monroe Administration, Richard Rush established far-reaching US diplomatic policies. He co-authored the Rush-Bagot Agreement, which prohibited fortifications and armed ships on the Great Lakes, and it was the Monroe Administration that established the "Good Neighbor" doctrine of mutual defense among nations in this hemisphere.

"THEY WERE all Tories, so there weren't any Rushes in the Jackson Administration," Rush chuckled. "Nobody in the Rush family converted over to the Democrats until my generation."

Another family member, Richard Rush, was a high-ranking ambassador in the Nixon Administration.

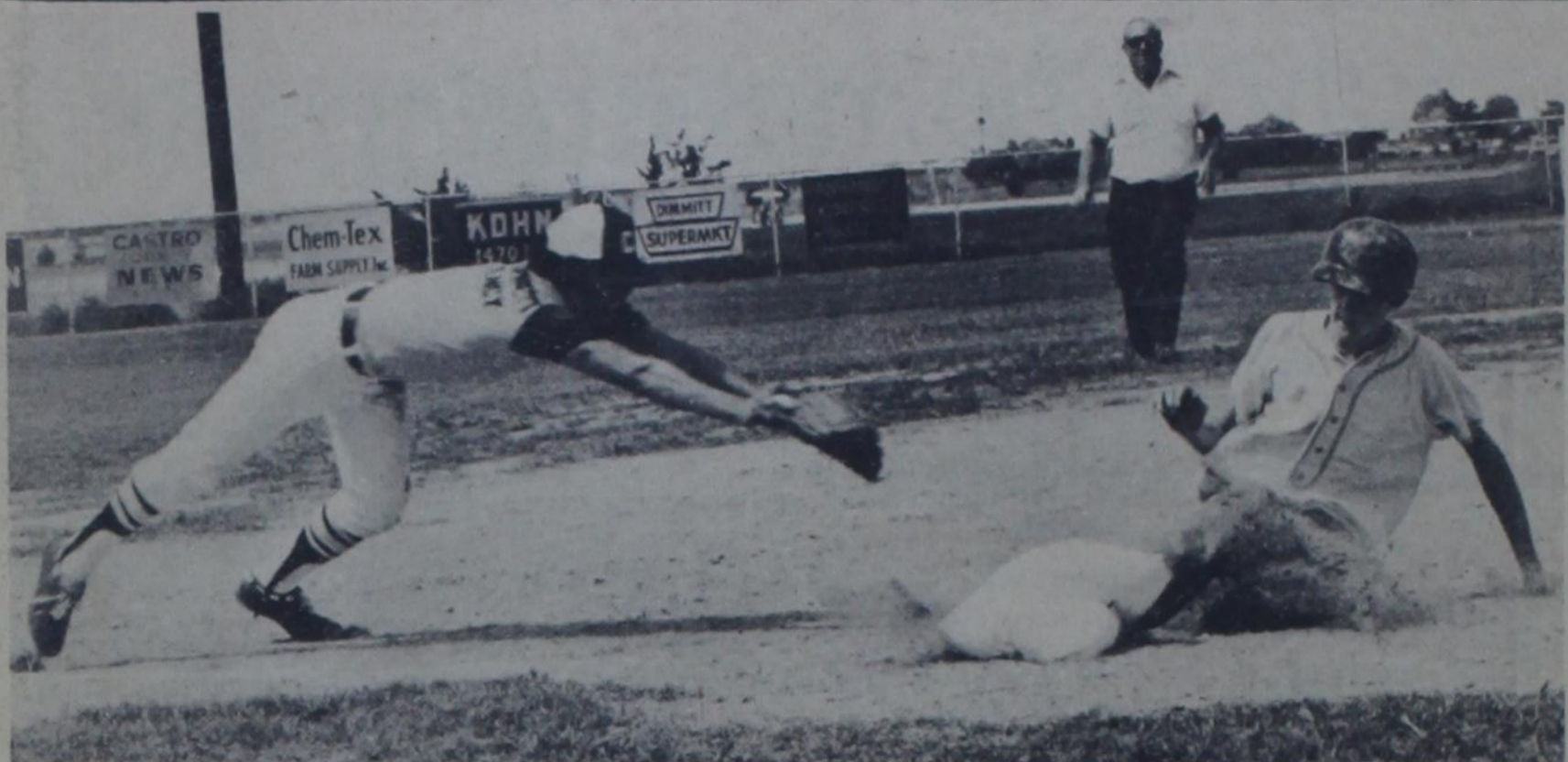
The generations may be distant and the political affiliations different, but the Rush family commitment to the ideals of freedom and service are still there.

WHEN HE was a 19-year-old student at the University of Missouri, Rush—incensed over Nazi Germany's persecution of Jews and its invasion of neighboring countries—tried to join England's Royal Air Force to help in the fight against Germany, but he was too young.

He joined the US Army Air Corps on his 20th birthday, and was a trained fighter pilot by the time the US entered World War II. Flying fighter planes in Europe, he won the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Silver Star, a handful of Air Medals and two Presidential Unit Citations.

"Most of the guys in my flight class were involved in the Battle of Midway, where the US crippled the Japanese Fleet," he said. "I doubt that more than half of the guys I trained with ever came back."

AS THE nation observes the 199th anniversary of its independence Friday, Rush will probably pay tribute to his famous ancestor by getting out for a round of golf. After all, he can tell his wife Adeline, it's sort of a family obligation.
