#### VD problem remains 647-3123 for Printing generally ignored

Except for influenza and other flu-like diseases, gonorrhea heads the list of communicable diseases in Texas, one authority reports.

SHE'S DR. Barbara Sears, health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Exten-

'According to American Medical Association reports, VD affects more people nationwide than any other communicable disease except the common cold.

Tr. 1971, one case of gonorrhea was reported for every 39 males between the ages of 20 and 24 years.

As for syphilis, some 500,000 persons don't know they're infected - and seriously need treatment. Dr. Sears noted.

"SYPHILIS ranks fifth on the fre, rency list of communicable diseases - behind influenza, gonorrhea, strep throat and mumps," she added.

'The public's reluctance to face VD as a problem is a major factor affecting the epidemic.

Although tests are available to detect VD - along with drugs to cure them - neither can bring a person to a doctor for diagnosis and treatment.

Responsibility rests with the individual," the specialist emphasized.



TURNING TO fruit counters, the specialist listed items in good supply with "pleasing" prices as grapefruit, Temple oranges, bananas, apples and pineapples. Also, strawberries, tangelos and tangerines,

"By-the-bag is the most economical way to buy the citrus fruits, if that amount can be used satisfactorily.

"Fresh vegetables are in more generous supply this winter than a year ago because of increased acreage planted,' Mrs. Clyatt said.

"No serious shortages of the important fresh vegetable crops have shown up thus far, but onion and potato supplies aren't as large now as they are in most other seasons.

AMONG THE most economical items are cabbage, carrots, broccoli, cooking greens, celery, bulk turnips and rutabagas, she said, adding that fresh asparagus is available at firstof-the-season prices.

#### **VOTER GUIDELINES**

- 1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to the Primary, which is May 4, 1974.
- 2. All registered voters, 18 years and older, are eligible to vote in all elections.
- 3. Present registrations are valid if you have voted in a Primary or a General Election within the last three
- 4. Register to vote at your County Tax Assessor-Collector's office or with a properly deputized person allowed to
- 5. Notify your County Tax Assessor-Collector of change of address 5 days prior to election day so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you have moved within the county.


