Bullock voices objection to businessmen's treatment

Bob Bullock, candidate for State Comptroller said today that, "The State is treating a number of small businessmen as if they were step children."

BULLOCK had reference to the new law which went into effect on Jan. 1 of this year requiring those who start in business after that date to post a bond or other security with the Comptroller, equal to three times the average quarterly tax liability, before receiving a sales tax permit.

"I have talked to a number of small businessmen who tell me that the insurance companies are not interested in writing surety bonds and they do not have the cash or other security to deposit with the Comptroller," said Bullock.

"We should be encouraging the small businessmen instead of making it more difficult for them to make a living. The amount of bond or security under the new law is out of line; it's too high. As Comptroller, I will ask the Legislature to substantially reduce the amount required or request that the amount be left to the Comptroller's discretion, as under the old law."

"Actually, the Legislature should not be criticized for passing the new law," said Bullock. "If the businessmen check into the matter, they will find that this headache was caused by the present Comptroller and his top employees, who advise him."

"BEFORE THIS new law went into effect, the Comptroller's office had the authority to require bonding in any amount they deemed necessary. Not once did they do so."

"When the Senate Interim Committee to Study the Sales Tax reported that the State was losing millions of tax dollars because of the Comptroller's failure to require bonds on known delinquent accounts, the Legislature passed the new law requiring him to do so and set the amount, taking away his discretion."

"All of this would never have happened if the Comptroller's office had simply enforced the old law, or, at the very least, informed the Legislature, when it was considering the new law, that the bonding requirements were too strict."

"Either action," Bullock said, "would have involved a little aggressiveness and initiative, which have been sadly lacking in the Comptroller's office."

Missionaries hold weekend meet here

Horse Club has first meeting

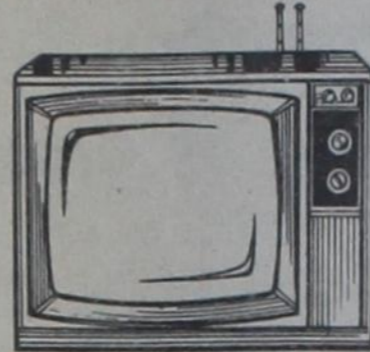
The Castro County 4-H Horse Club held its first meeting of the year March 4 at the Jerry Cluck farm.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT PLAINS WEATHER IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION, INC., OF P.O. BOX 1627, PLAINVIEW, TEXAS 79072, who holds License No. 74-6 of the State of Texas intends to engage in an operation designed to decrease hailfall by artificial methods, for and on behalf of Plains Weather Improvement Association, Inc., and will conduct such program by means of aerial application of artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over or within which equipment may be operated shall include portions of these counties: Hale, Lamb, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Floyd, Crosby, Lubbock, Hockley, Randall, Deaf Smith and Farmer.
2. The target within which hailfall is intended to be decreased is described as follows: The outer boundary commencing at the point of intersection of the counties Hale, Lubbock, Hockley and Lamb; thence northward along the Hale-Lamb County line to the southern boundary of Castro County; thence westward nine (9) miles along the Castro-Lamb County line; thence due north to State Highway 86; thence eastward along State Highway 86 to U.S. Highway 87; thence southward along U.S. Highway 87 to the northern boundary of Hale County; thence eastward along the county line to Farm Road 378; then southward along Farm Road 378 to U.S. Highway 70; thence southeastward 1 1/2 miles along U.S. Highway 70; thence due south to the Floyd-Crosby County line; thence westward along the county line to the intersection of the counties Hale, Lubbock, Hockley and Lamb, the point of origin.
3. The equipment, materials, and methods to be used in conducting the operation are a weather radar system, cloud seeding aircraft and flares for dispersion of silver iodide nuclei near cloud base.
4. The person who will be in control and in charge of the operation is Jostine G. Medina, Plainview, Texas.
5. The operation will extend during the period beginning about April 1, 1974, and ending about November 30, 1974.



Suffrage debate ends at convention

The Texas Constitutional Convention, picking up momentum after the conclusion of its work on the long stalemated Education Article, concluded floor debate on the article or suffrage in two days. Rep. Bill Clayton, (D-Springlake), reported that the delegates took action in two major areas, of concern to the people of the state; one with which he agreed and one which he opposed.

THE CONVENTION included in the article a section which will require that the eligibility for voting in bond elections be limited to property owners. Delegate Clayton stated that he strongly favored this section, pointing out that this will allow those who have to pay taxes which fund bond issues to be the voters who decide if the debt should be incurred in the first place.

The second issue of concern with which the convention dealt was action which gave the right to vote to felons. Clayton, who strongly opposed the change from the present constitutional ban which prohibits anyone convicted of a felony from voting, stated that he felt that the present system, which makes provisions for the granting of pardons on an individual basis, provides sufficient latitude for exceptions. Clayton noted that he felt a person who had committed a serious crime against society should have to take individual action to prove his rehabilitation and desire to become a voting citizen after serving his sentence.

The convention, which has used almost two-thirds of its allotted ninety-day session, began consideration of the Executive article on Friday.

greatly to this record breaking sale," said Lyle R. Alumbaugh, executive secretary of the Chester White Swine Record Association, Rochester, Ind., sponsor of the event.

A TOTAL of 139 head of Chester White breeding animals sold to herds in 13 states for a total of \$77,400. 40 boars averaged \$910.62; 87 open gilts averaged \$421.26; and 12 bred gilts averaged \$360.42.
