COUNTERFEIT GANG BROKEN IN THIS AREA

DALLAS, Dec. 5.—Arrest of a gang of alleged counterfeiters which had flooded West Texas towns with spurious 25 cent pieces was announced by Leo Williams, secret service agent. Six were taken before U. S. Commissioners at Lubbock and Abilene and pleaded guilty of counterfeiting. Each was placed under bond of \$2000. Two of the men, John Cheaney and Alex Sellers, were arrested at Sweetwater. They allegedly had counterfeit coins in their possession. Agent Tom Hanson arrested Filmore Decker and his son, Willie, at Cisco. The men allegedly had spurious coins and the molds in which the coins were made, in their possession. Sheriff Jesse Smith of Terry county arrested Jackson Burgess and Ernest Felts at Brownfield and seized a complete counterfeiting plant. Although operations of the gang extended over a period of only 15 days, hundreds of coins were alleged to have been passed.

Mayor Expains Federal Court Suit Taking Control of Plants

CABINET MAY DECIDE UPON KING'S AFFAIRS

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin tonight called a cabinet meeting for Sunday at 5:30 p. m. The call was issued after he returned from an audience with the king. LONDON, Dec. 5.—Prime Minister Baldwin made another appeal to King Edward to give up Mrs. Wallis Simpson, or his throne while Winston Churchill, chief of the king's champions in parliament, pleaded with the cabinet to quit its efforts to force Edward to abdicate. The prime minister's automobile was just swinging through the gates at Fort Belvedere, where the king is in seclusion, when Churchill issued a manifesto criticizing the Baldwin government for presenting the king with an ultimatum without giving parliament a chance to debate its action. Churchill is believed to be the member of parliament the king would ask to form a new government in event of Baldwin's resignation. While popular sentiment seems to be growing in favor of the king's desire to marry Mrs. Simpson and retain his throne, both sides were standing their ground. The first definite indication that Edward might be giving various consideration to abdication came from Paris. Dispatches from that city said Edward had telephoned Herman Rogers at Cannes in Southern France to tell him Mrs. Simpson would arrive at 11 p. m. at the Rogers villa. In the same conversation the king was quoted as saying he would join Mrs. Simpson in exile, if that event he decided to abdicate. Baldwin's latest trip to Edward's home was made at the end of a day in which the prime minister had conferred with his cabinet and others high in government affairs. Meanwhile civil service organizations and other groups roaming the streets of London made it plain the king's position was gaining sympathy with the working class. Many believed he had a good chance to win if he stood firm.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Dec. 5.—A "Simpson-for-queen" club has been formed at Harvard University by the Crimson, college daily. Requirement for membership is filling of a ballot marked yes or no, accompanied by 10 cents.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—London newspapers, unanimous in realizing the importance of the entire crisis precipitated by King Edward's determination to marry an American divorcee, demanded the utmost in public enlightenment today. They asked that the king himself make a statement to the people of his empire.

DALLAS, Dec. 5.—One American woman is not so certain Mrs. Wallis Simpson would have King Edward, "even as a gift." The woman is Mrs. Oswin King, of Dallas, a former Baltimore girl, who knew Mrs. Simpson when she was 18. She is convinced that "if Wallis can't be queen consort I don't think she will marry King Edward. Her background is just as blue blooded in the American way as his is in the English way."

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The All-union Congress of the Soviet today adopted a new constitution guaranteeing new liberties and privileges. The constitution was designed to make the U. S. S. R. a "democratic republic."

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DALLAS, Dec. 5.—The Southwestern States Parole and Probation conference will urge legislators in six states to adopt uniform laws on probation and paroles, it was decided today. Gov. James Allred, organizer of the conference, was elected president.

PARIS, Dec. 5.—Premier Leon Blum's cabinet was given a vote of confidence today by the chamber of deputies after a debate on foreign policy. Although communist members abstained from voting action by the communists was considered a setback for the government.

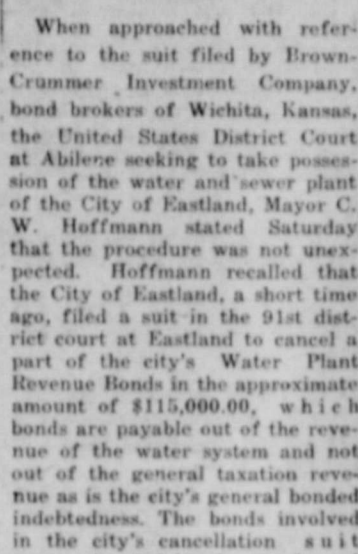

HOUSTON, Dec. 5.—Homey Pierson of Dallas, deputy supervisor of the Oil and Gas Division of the State Railroad Commission, and three other officials of that body, have been dismissed, the Houston Press said today. Others named were Omar Burkett, deputy supervisor at Eastland, Cam Murray of the motor bus division at Abilene, and John D. Donaldson, Waco, with the motor bus division. All have been employed by the commission for 12 years, having been appointed by Commissioner Lon Smith. The order dismissing the men was signed Thursday by Commissioners E. O. Thompson and C. V. Terrell. Dismissal of the four resulted from disagreement between Smith and Thompson, which caused Smith to oppose the chairman's reelection last summer, the Press said.

COLEMAN, Dec. 5.—Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon for Mrs. H. J. O'Hair, 68, former member of the University of Texas board of regents, and former president of the Texas Women's Press Association. Mrs. O'Hair died Friday night of a year's illness.

COMANCHE, Dec. 5.—Winfred Lester, Comanche farmer, was convicted of murder without malice today and given a five-year prison sentence for the fatal stabbing of Hubert Huff last August.

Colored Football Teams Will Play in Eastland For Charity On Friday Afternoon, Dec. 11

A big colored football game, with the proceeds going to charity, will be played at Welch field in Eastland next Friday afternoon, December 11, at 2:30 p. m., it has been announced here. The two teams have been called the Ranger Black Bulldogs and the Eastland Black Mavericks. The proceeds from the game will go to the Ranger Elks lodge, for use in their charity fund, and the Eastland Lions club, for the same purpose. The two organizations are cooperating in promoting the game, which is expected to draw a large attendance. No lineups of the two teams are as yet available, but reports of intensive recruiting, secret practices and tricky plays have been heard both in Eastland and Ranger and a thriller, filled with plenty of fun for everyone, is in store for those who attend. The admission price for the game has been set at 35 cents for adults and 15 cents for children of school age. Tickets have been printed and are to be sold by the two sponsoring organizations in both the towns throughout the next week. Everyone is being urged to buy at least one of the tickets, and all who can do so are urged to attend, as this will be the only colored football game to be played in this section of the state this year. "Kid" Horton of Ranger has been named as captain of the Ranger Black Bulldogs, and he has been reported as whipping his team into shape for the game. No word has come out of the colored training camp at Eastland as to who will ramrod the Eastland Black Mavericks, but strong competition for the Ranger team has been promised, while several threats as to how high the score will run have been heard. VATICAN CITY, Dec. 5.—Pope Pius was confined to a chair today because of an affliction in his right leg which made it impossible for him to walk. It was announced at the Vatican that all audiences with the Pope have been "indefinitely suspended" but no one should worry about his health. It was learned that the Pope's knee was swollen, caused by uric acid, but that the other leg was not affected. The Pope's personal physician denied there were signs of paralysis.

Highway 89 Completion Contract Bids to be Accepted on Jan. 4

Milburn McCarty of Eastland announced Saturday receipt of information from State Highway Engineer Gibb Gilchrist that bids for completion of Highway 89, Ranger - to - Weatherford cutoff, will be accepted Jan. 4 at Austin instead of Dec. 31 as originally planned. "Inasmuch as Christmas holidays come as they do this year," said Gilchrist's letter, "we have set the date for letting state projects January 4 instead of Dec. 31, and bids for Highway 89 will be received that date." McCarty, who is president of Highway 89 association, said plans are to stage a celebration in Ranger following the completion. McCarty was named president and H. V. Galloway of Ranger secretary at the organization of the association to promote the project at Abilene Aug. 14, 1935. A celebration was held at Eastland May 30, 1935, following the completion of the road in its present status. The road, McCarty states, decreases by 14.21 miles the distance between a point south of Strawn and Weatherford, and eliminates four railroad crossings, lacks topping. Letting of contract for completion of the road in its entirety by Dec. 31 was ordered by an order passed by the highway commission on April 20 of this year. McCarty stated "those who have been most active in completion of Highway 89, including present and past members of the highway commission, will be among those invited to the forthcoming Ranger celebration."

6,629 See Mavs Play This Season

The Eastland Mavericks' nine football games this season were seen by 6,629 who paid admissions totaling \$3,899.65. Eastland's percentage of the gross receipts was \$2,071.39. Largest attendance was at San Angelo, where 2,840 obtained tickets. Attendance figures at other games: Cisco at Eastland, 648; Mineral Wells at Eastland, 467; Big Spring at Big Spring, 578; Abilene at Abilene, 1,192; Ranger at Eastland, 721; Eastland at Breckenridge, 873; Sweetwater at Sweetwater, 1,077; and Eastland at Brownwood, 1,233. Attendance at the Mineral Wells, Big Spring and Breckenridge games were believed decreased by rain.

Two Resign From State Department Of Education Jobs

AUSTIN, Dec. 5.—Important changes in the state department of education remained unexplained today as state superintendent L. A. Woods was enroute to Chattanooga, Tenn., after refusing to comment on the resignation of Miss Lillian Peek, head of the home economics department. The United Press learned that W. E. James, who has been first assistant to Supt. Woods, will not continue with the department after the first of the year. James declined to make any comment.

Did Texas Preacher Foresee Wally Crisis?

England's crisis resulting from the King Edward-Mrs. Wallis Simpson affair, was possibly foreseen by an evangelist nine years ago at Baird, Texas, Miss Edith Hinton, secretary of the Eastland Retail Merchants association, recalled Saturday. While in Baird Miss Hinton heard a Baptist evangelist predict that England would experience a crisis after the death of King George. The evangelist had at the same time predicted the rise in power of Mussolini.

Rescue Crews Dig For Entombed Men

LAS VEGAS, Dec. 5.—Rescue crews dug desperately today to reach three miners trapped 700 feet below ground in a mine here. Three others were rescued uninjured.

ITALIANS LAND AT GIBRALTAR REPORT SAYS

GIBRALTAR, Dec. 5.—Persons claiming to have witnessed the event, today told the United Press 2,500 Italian black short volunteers landed at Algeiras, Spain, Friday, on a large new ship. MADRID, Dec. 5.—Rebel planes today dropped a new shower of bombs on Madrid adding to the long list of civilian dead. The government announced 92 were killed and 200 wounded in Friday's raids on the capital. There were two killed and five wounded today when 30 planes roared overhead. Officials claimed two rebel planes were brought down in the air fight. Saturday afternoon the rebels directed a barrage of shrapnel over the capital, in a 15 minute interval, 15 such shells exploded. Loyalists admitted the last four days fighting have been "costly" but they claimed a victory as their original lines of defense held intact.

Former Superior of McDonald Has Been Chosen Aide

Bert V. Bollinger, formerly of Eastland county, who has been appointed chief clerk by W. H. McDonald, state land commissioner-elect, was once the Eastland man superior in the accounting division of the Texas and Pacific Railroad in West Texas. Later Bollinger was an assistant during the administration of Moore Lynn as State Auditor and is now chief clerk of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission. McDonald, who has already moved to Austin, will take the oath of office Dec. 16, has indicated he will retain one third of the present staff of over 90. The commissioner-elect has also announced that on Jan. 1 he will appoint Carl White of Port Arthur, publisher of a labor journal, as director of the Lower Colorado River Authority. The term of Will Collins of Llano, newspaper publisher there, is expiring. On Dec. 16, McDonald will receive bids on the award of mineral leases on several thousand acres of submerged land in Corpus Christi and Galveston bays. Bollinger will succeed Major John W. Hawkins, McDonald's unsuccessful opponent.

Bids Asked On Paving of Street

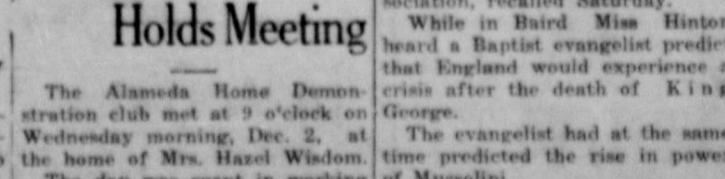

WATER, SEWER PLANTS PUT IN COURT CHARGE

Eastland water and sewer plant Saturday were under the jurisdiction of United States Court, Fort Worth following granting a temporary restraining order an investment company which claimed it represents owners municipal bonds totaling \$1,000. Federal Judge T. W. David granted the restraining order request of Brown-Crummer investment company of Wichita, Kansas. The investment company affile to the federal court that two four water and sewer bond issues are delinquent. The federal court's order strains Eastland from spending money derived from the water and sewerage plant except for current payrolls and from amending suit filed recently in 91st district court by which the city sought cancel two bond issues. Eastland officials were ordered to be in federal court at Lubbock Monday, Dec. 14, to show reasons why a receiver should not be appointed for the municipal plant. The Eastland National Bank, the city's depository, has been named also as a defendant and to place municipal funds deposited there under jurisdiction of Northern District Federal Court. Mayor C. W. Hoffmann, C. Wellman, H. O. Satterwhite, C. Lucas, city commissioners, and F. Little, city manager, are defendants. The validity of two Eastland bond issues was attacked in suit filed recently in 91st district court. The suit asked cancellation of "City of Eastland Water and Sewerage Bonds, Series 1927," and City of Eastland Water and Sewerage Revenue Bonds, Series of 1928. The two issues aggregated \$1,000,000. The city held issuance of the bonds was illegal as they claimed they were authorized by the commission which did not put proposals to vote of citizens.

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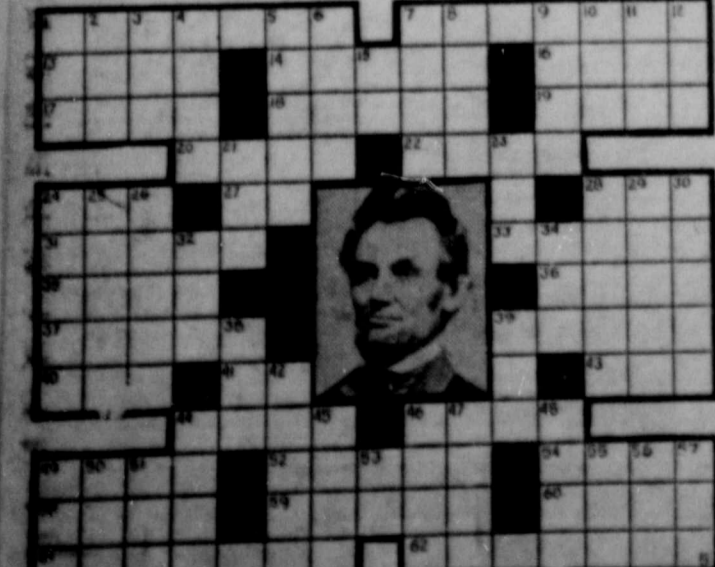
Old-Fashioned Winter Has Its Compensations

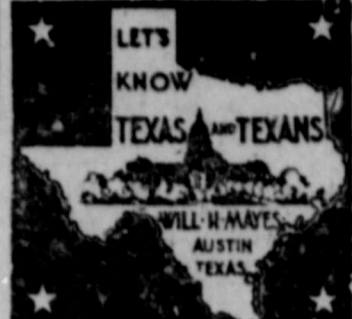

Terraplane Proves It Has Stamina

Details of the Grand Circuit automobile race 4250 miles in length through Argentina and a part of Chile, are just becoming available. The race is a car-wrecker of the first order, according to all participants. When it is realized that 113 started the race and only 26 finished, some idea of the contour of the country through which the race passed may be gathered. The fact that one of the lowest priced American cars, a Terraplane, won the race, is in itself remarkable, but when it is understood that this was the only 1936 Terraplane entered, the record is even more outstanding.

Paul Riganti, who won the race, is an old-timer and was a favorite of the public in this country from the very start. In this country we can hardly conceive of the interest that exists in South America in this road race. It is by all odds the most outstanding event of its kind in the world.

The race has been growing in importance for several years. Each year the circuit has increased in length, scope and number of participants, until last year the Andes mountains were crossed for the first time into Chile, making the race an international event. The race started in Buenos Aires and ended in the nearby city of La Plata. The route covered being as follows: via Cordoba and Mendoza

across the Andes to Santiago, Chili, south to Tenueco, Chili, and back over to the Comodoro Rivadavia oil field where it turns to skirt the Atlantic coast of Argentina, through Bahia Blanca and Mar del Plata, before reaching the finish.

Much of the course lies through heavy sand and soil roads. There is a great deal of clay, particularly in the neighborhood of Cordoba, which is very slippery when wet and very dusty when dry.

The course was covered in nine stages. Details of the race have become available through Will L. Smith, South American resident agent for the Sealed Power corporation, which provided prizes for the winners of the last four laps. Paul Riganti in his Terraplane, won this along with the race.

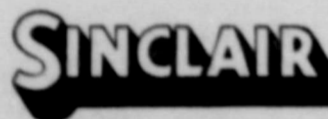

Evading Gasoline Taxes Draws Fine And Jail Sentence

SAN ANTONIO—Sentences of one year in prison and fines of \$2,500 each for evasion of federal gasoline taxes have been imposed upon three men by U. S. District Judge McMillan, sitting at San Antonio, Texas. The defendants pleaded guilty to tax evasions totaling approximately \$8,000 in connection with the operation of a refinery at Oilton, Texas, near Laredo.

Evidence in the case was obtained originally by the comptroller's department of the state and turned over to federal authorities, who supplemented it with further investigation. Several other cases of gasoline tax evasion investigated by the Texas comptroller's department and turned over to the federal authorities about two years ago have not yet been brought to trial.
