Skunks' Fate Teaches Need of Adjustment

The automobile age is proving a very bad thing for skunks.

The skunk is, by tradition, an independent critter. He has a sure and matchless weapon of defense. When he ambles through the countryside, he makes way for no one. It is always the other fellow who has to dodge.

But automobiles are differnet. And so-according to divers correspondents of a weekly scientific journalrural highways are cluttered with dead bodies of skunks out of all proportion to the relative abundance of those

Rabbits, racoons, foxes, and other wild creatures cross the highways frequently, but their natural wariness saves them from being hit by autos. But not the skunk.

In his eyes, the approaching auto is no better than anyone else; so he stalks calmly across the road and gets crumpled into a boneless heap before he realizes that here is one menace before which his ancient immunity fails.

Now it would be possible to become altogether too profound in drawing analogies from the pitiful plight of the skunk. And yet it is hard to read that little item without feeling that this good-looking and ill-smelling creature is not the only inhabitant of America that has suffered because of inability to make the necessary adjustments to

changing times. There was a time, for example, when the newness and vastness of our country made recovery from depressions automatic. If we sat tight and waited, sooner or later

things would snap back. The frontier would assimilate displaced wage-earners, exploitation of some new industry, or some previously untouched natural resource would set off a boom, and all

Does any American need to be reminded that we paid a terrific price, in the years following 1929, for our lighthearted belief that was still true? It was several years before we realized that it was a five-ton truck that was coming down the highway and not a simple-minded houn' dawg. We still can feel the bruises,

It was the same in the matter of foreign entanglements. to our necks in a European war before we knew just what was happening to us. We have been dismayed and confused over it ever since.

These are just two samples; more could be cited if space were available. What they point to is the uncomfortable fact that the world somehow has moved out from under us in the last few decades. It isn't the same sort of world in which our traditions were shaped; it demands constant readjustment.

FOR bachelor friends, for invalids, for anyone who likes a spot of jelly with his toast, home made jams and jellies are the best of all good Christmas surprises. You don't have to turn your house upside to make a batch of special jellies, either. Just a few jars of marmalade, a batch of jelly—presto, you've turned your kitchcall in the fancy paper and package brigade. Behold a festive array of home made presents—good to eat, handsome to look at and proof of your genuine good wishes.

Pineapple and Apricot Marmalade

One pound dried apricots, 21-2 cups crushed pineapple, granula-ted sugar, 2 tablespoons lemon

One pound dried apricots, 21-2 cups crushed pineapple, granulated sugar, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 tablespoon fresh lime juice.

Wash dried apricots. Soak covered in water over night. Then place over low fire and bring slowly to boiling point. Strain, reserving liquid. Mash fruit through sieve. Return to pot with the liquid. Add the crushed pineapple. Measure by cupfuls. For each cup of pulp and juice add 3-4 cup sugar. Add the lemon and lime juice. Bring the marmalade to boiling point and boil exactly 15 minutes. While still hot, pour into marmalade glasses and seal with paraffin.

Tell her in advance, you will send her the jellied Fruit Pudding in time for the party. Then all she will have to do is to have an ice cream sauce ready. You can make the pudding the night before, chill it, then send it over with your



Rabbits, racoons, foxes, and other wild creatures cross the highways frequently, but their natural wariness saves them from being hit by autos. But not the skunk.

In his eyes, the approaching auto is no better than anyone else; so he stalks calmly across the road and gets crumpled into a boneless heap before he realizes that here is one menace before which his ancient immunity fails.

Now it would be possible to become altogether too profound in drawing analogies from the pitiful plight of the skunk. And yet it is hard to read that little item without feeling that this good-looking and ill-smelling creature is not the only inhabitant of America that has suffered because of inability to make the necessary adjustments to

There was a time, for example, when the newness and vastness of our country made recovery from depressions automatic. If we sat tight and waited, sooner or later things would snap back.

The frontier would assimilate displaced wage-earners, exploitation of some new industry, or some previously untouched natural resource would set off a boom, and all would be well.

Does any American need to be reminded that we paid a terrific price, in the years following 1929, for our lighthearted belief that was still true? You don't have to turn your house upside to make a batch of special jellies, either. Just a few jars of marmalade, a batch of jelly—presto, you've turned your kitchen into Santa Claus' workshop. Call in the fancy paper and package brigade. Behold a festive array of home made presents—good to eat, handsome to look at and proof of your genuine good wishes.

Pineapple and Apricot Marmalade

One pound dried apricots, 21-2

One pound dried apricots, 21-2 cups crushed pineapple, granulated sugar, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 tablespoon fresh lime juice.

Wash dried apricots. Soak covered in water over night. Then place over low fire and bring slowly to boiling point. Strain, reserving liquid. Mash fruit through sieve. Return to pot with the liquid. Add the crushed pineapple. Measure by cupfuls. For each cup of pulp and juice add 3-4 cup sugar. Add the lemon and lime juice. Bring the marmalade to boiling point and boil exactly 15 minutes. While still hot, pour into marmalade glasses and seal with paraffin.

Jellied Fruit Pudding

NEW YORK-In further advising me that failing to name Ace Parker of Duke on NEA Service's first All-America team made ne hit in the Tobacco Triangle, Houston Lawing, capable writer of Greensbero, N. C., cites well the case of southern football.

He also gives Pittsburgh a tip in predicting that the Panthers will fall before the Blue Devils at Durham on the last Saturday of next November. That should be one of the greatest battles of 1937, for with Marshall Goldberg & Co., Dr. John Bain Sutherland scarcely can miss coming back with one of his most powerful Pittsburgh ar-

Lawing believes that Duke will be the south's greatest powerhouse next fall. Colgate doesn't need the warning after what happened at Durham this autumn, but Lawing also ventures the opinion that the Red Raiders will be repelled again next season.

There no longer is any doubt about the class of southern focuball, with this year's Louisiana State, Alabama, Duke, Tulane, North Cerolina, Auburn, and Tennessee teams on a par with any in the coup-

VANDERBILT, which fell before Southwestern, Louisians State, Tennessee, and Alabama, swept Chicago aside, 37-0.

But to get back to Parker, I haven't doubted for a minute of the last two seasons that the Duke quarterback was an All-America man. Everybody seemed to agree on Ed Goddard of Washington State, Sam Baugh of Texas Christian, Buzz Buivid of Marquette, and Sam Francis of Nebraska, however, so the first team places went to those fine backs, with Parker, Joe Riley of Alabama, and other splendid players put on the second squad.

If Parker was slighted in being listed in the second lineup, it might have been due to the Duke publicity department soft pedaling notices about him, as Lawing suspects. Whatever credit Parker receives on All-America selections will be based entirely on his performances, and not on publicity sent out by the Duke University news bureau.

LAWING has another complaint about the NEA teams. It is that Andy Bershak, North Carolina's brilliant junior end, received only honorable mention. He says that certainly the Tar Heel ace deserved to make at least the second team. He rates him next to Gaynell Tinsley of Louisiana State and Larry Kelley of Yale as a

leader in the nation.

The difference in the cases of Parker and Bershak is that the latter has another year. Rest assured, NEA operatives will keep an eye on him in 1937.

Parker without doubt was one of the greatest players ever produced in Dixie. He is a natural athlete, being a star baseball and basketball player in addition to a football acc. He excelled in football, however, and many of those who have seen him would rather have him in their backfield than any other individual in the land.

The regrettable part of picking All-America clubs is that there are not enough places to go around.






