For it is obvious that when an army showers flame nd explosives on a city, as the rebel army has been showring them on Madrid, it is out to break, by any means, re populace's will to resistance.

To that end it can count the murder of an infant, the irning of a hospital full of expectant mothers, or the deruction of a school building and its pupils as an achieveent equal to the capture of a trench or the destruction an airdrome.

It may be that this frightful philosophy can exist only a bifter civil war, where to the ordinary brutality of war ere is added a fierce personal hatred, a bias which akes the opposition look like fiends against whom any rm of frightfulness is permissable.

But even there the excuse is a poor one. For warfare this kind is the fruit of a mental attitude which can have place in a world calling itself civilized. The were exence of armies and governments which can fight in this ay is a threat to the wellbeing of the entire world.

There has been a good deal of talk about the "collapse civilization" which another war would bring. That lapse would not come through the physical destruction towns, factories, and transportation systems, or through mere total of violent deaths.
