#### At Last Democracy Has Found Its Voice

Looking back at the president's speech in Buenos Aires, one can see that it was important not so much for what it said as for the spirit that it evoked.

For here, at last, democracy answered the challenge of the dictatorial governments. Here, at last, was sounded a rallying call for all men who believe that the way of freedom and liberty can muster the strength and the unity which will carry it though the world's great crisis.

Something of the kind has been needed very badly for a long time. Actual fighting between the democracies and, the dictatorships has not yet begun, and-with the blessing of heaven-it may never begin; but the verbal war has been going on for several years, with the dictators on the offensive all along the line.

It was high time that some spokesman for demo-cracy took the world stage and stated the case for freedom in sharp, unmistakable terms. That is what President Roosevelt did at Buenos Aires, and the way in which he did it was tremendously important.

For we have been hearing, year after year, that a dictatorship was the one and only possible solution to the kind of stress that besets human society in this difficult post-war era.

Over and over again the dictators have announced that democracy was played out, too confused to find a voice, and too divided to use it fi it did find it. They have declared that the people can escape from their troubles only by sacrificing their old ideals of freedom, trusting their lives to strong and ruthless leaders, and preparing to fight and die for their rights.

And the democracies, year after year, took it and make no answer.

Now the answer has been made, and it is crushing in

There is, after all, something almost insane about seekng the remedy for profound economic maladjustment in nationalistic measures which make the maladjustment worse. There is something even more stupid about trying to get out from under the wreckage of the last war by preparing to fight a new one. These are the only remedies dictatorship offers; can democracy possibly do worse than

It cannot. With all its weakness, its blindness, and its stupidity, democracy offers the world a saner program, a more workable program. And at last democracy has spoken out about it.

Co-operation in place of sullen rivalry, conciliation in place of hatred, negotiation in place of saber-rattlingthese are the things in which democracy puts its faith.

It believes that this "inevitable" war need not be fought, that men need not give up all their liberties, or were sent to each room. Bob any of them, to survive; that the great world interchange tried to talk to the stolid Mexican of goods and services can yet be restored to its old vigor and usefulness.

It is good to have that program announced by a voice to which all the world must listen.
