### America Should Prepare to Fight-For Peace!

One gets the impression, reading the news from Europe these days, that the world is standing on the threshold of a great and terrible changes; that European civilization is taking the social fabric which it has woven with such pains from the days of Charlemagne and is preparing to rend it down the middle, bringing to a close a whole cycle of human progress and making way for something new, chaotic, and utterly unpredictable.

Is that too dark a picture? Then how else can the dispatches from overseas be read?

Already the civil war in Spain is more than a civil war, and is rapidly becoming an actual conflict between two opposing concepts of social organization, stemming directly from Rome, Berlin, and Moscow.

Germany and Japan form an anti-Communist alliance, and it is openly hinted that they will go to war in the spring. Britain arms with feverish haste, Moscow boasts of 7000 war planes, and every correspondent agrees that the only reason a new world war has not yet begun is that the nations are not quite ready for it.

No American can contemplate that prospect without prayerfully asking what his own country's course should be when the break-up begins. What must we do, when the rest of the world resorts to violence to make earth-shaking changes? Can we keep out of it-and, if we can, should we?

We can, if we insist upon it; we should, if we can.

In 1916 we heard a great deal of hifalutin talk to the effect that we owed a high duty to the rest of the world, that it was somehow ignoble and unworthy for us to sit peacefully at home when great issues were being settled by the sword overseas. If and when this new European bust-up comes, we shall certainly hear more of that kind of talk.

We ought to prepare our defenses ahead of time. Let us get it clearly in our heads that if Europe goes to war you to let you know we have and nuts. 


