Showmanship of Chief G-Man Breeds Strife

In a little over four years, 174 kidnapers have been sentenced to prison for terms totaling 2229 years; 33 have been sentenced to life imprisonment, and four to death. In that time, the word "G-man" has become one of fear to evil-doers, and G-men have taken over the glamour with which youthful imagination once regarded one gangster.

For these accomplishments, J. Edgar Hoover, for 12 years girector of the federal Bureau of Investigation, deserves utmost praise. And yet, for all his splendid work and that of his men, he has been, time and again, a target

In practically all these attacks, the G-man chief has been accused of what footballers call "grandstanding." The difficulty in which he is at present involved is an ex-

The story, according to New York authorities, is essentially this New York police succeeded in tracking to his hideout one Harry Brunette, bank robber and kidnaper of a New Jersey policeman. They notified federal agents, and a time was agreed upon for the raid and capture.

Before the police knew what was going on, Mr. Hoover and his men arrived and sprung the trap, capturing the criminal after a long gun battle during which, incidentally, a G-man's gas bomb set fire to the building.

Robbed of the glory that they believed they had earned, New York authorities have protested against Mr. Hoover's "movie technic." This incident was said to have given rise to the latest in a long list of complaints by New York police over the "showmanship" of the director, who, besides his sleuthing, writes prolifically for magazines and frequently lectures.

And it is not hard to conceive that the police complaints may be justified. The capture of the criminal, of course, was the important thing. But it is only human to rebel when the reward for one's work is snatched by some-

Tactics such as those cited by the New York officials certainly will not help build necessary co-operation between local and federal police in the war against crime.

Mr. Hoover's flair for showmanship is a trait that has been valuable to the country, if only because it has helped make the G-man a dread symbol of retribution to criminals, a hero to childhood.

But showmanship, like anything else, can be over It may have added to Hoover's reputation, but it hardly seems necessary, for instance, that he personally should have led the Brunette raid, when one or another of his lieutenants probably could hav done it as well.

Mr. Hoover is a sleuth, and sleuths generally assume an air of mystery. It might not be a bad idea for the Gman chief to abandon the super-showmanship, take a page from the book of Zaharoff or Greta Garbo, and done a cloak of mystery. It certainly would keep him in the public eye at least as much as he has been.


And it might improve the co-operation among federal, local, and state police, to the further consternation of the underworld. Too much showmanship may undo much of the good already done.

If they miss the table and roasters in November and survive until February or March, they become stewers. Broilers weigh about 2 1-2 pounds after being plucked, fryers weigh from 2 1-2 to 3 1-2 lbs. Good broilers and fryers should be full-breasted, free of pin-feathers and bruises.

A roasting chicken is from 6 to 9 months old. They are in season—that is, they should be bought fresh, not cold storaged—from September to January. It should be well-fleshed, with round plump breast. To serve 6 persons, use a 4 lb. bird with stuffing 4.

Stewers or fowls are hens over the steamed rice, broccoli, deep dish apple pie, hard sauce, coffee, milk.

Tresh from December to June. If you like to can chicken, use stewers.

Baked Fowl (for 6 servings)

One fowl, 1 large onion, sliced, 1 cup sour cream, 1 tablespoon butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 1-2 cups water, paprika, salt and pepper.

Cut fowl into 6 pieces. Melt butter in pan and brown fowl on all sides. Place in greased casserder over it. Sprinkle with flour and add water. Bake in moderate over for about 2 hours, until tender. A few minutes before removing from oven, add sour cream and paprika.
