Abdication Did Not End Colorful British Story

King Edward VIII has abdicated, and quit his native land; a new king is in power, and the British Empire once more is sailing along as majestically as it ever has.

But the story by no means is over. Before it has ended, questions that are still whirling confusedly in people's minds will have been answered; and only time can give those answers.

Most of the conjecture, naturally, centers about the ex-king who, in his Prince of Wales days, won the love of his subjects and the affectionate interest of the rest of the world.

Where will he spend the remaining years of his life? In Denmark? Austria? America? Or will he try to escape aching, nostalgic longings in some remote part of the world?

Will he be content to resume his onetime role of part-time playboy or, perhaps, lead the life of a gentleman farmer?

Or is it possible that some day, using the influence he still has with Empire subjects, he will again serve Great Britain? Remember the words in his abdication address—"If, at any time in the future, I can be found of service to his Majesty in a private station, I shall not fail."

After he has married "the woman I love," will his cup of happiness always be so brimmingly full as to make up, in great measure, for his tremendous sacrifice?

And, as for Mrs. Simpson, will she live up to one of the greatest responsibilities that any woman ever has had to assume? Is she prepared, as she should be, to do more than her part to guide their marital bark through shoals of unhappiness? Or will this marriage end as did her others?

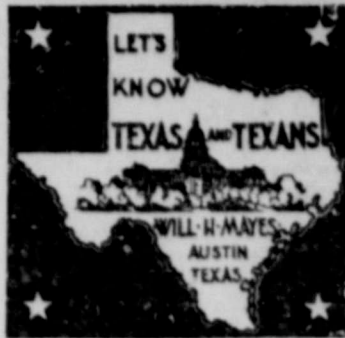
If necessary, is she willing to be, for the rest of her life, either the Duchess of Windsor—or just Mrs. David Windsor—wife of a gentleman farmer; and give up forever the fascinating glamour of continental society?

Will she long retain the beauty of face and figure that fascinated one of the greatest "catches" in history? Or, if her charms soon fade, can she, by dint of life and womanly graces, hold the affection of her husband?

And, finally, can the new king, George VI, symbolize the grown so effectively as to strengthen the slender bonds between Great Britain and her dominions beyond the seas.

No, the abdication of Edward and the proclaiming of George as new king have not closed the story which rocked the world in the last few weeks. That was only the anti-climax. From now on, people the world over will eagerly follow the fortunes of the royal brothers, to see how it all comes out.

LET'S KNOW TEXAS AND TEXANS. WILL H. MAYES, AUSTIN, TEXAS. In this column, answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and its people.

Q. Who commanded the Santa Fe expedition, where was it concentrated for the march, when did it start, and why was it an inopportune time for such an undertaking? L. L. E.

A. Gen. Hugh McLeod, brother-in-law of Pres. Lamar, was in command of the forces that started from Frushy Creek, near Round Rock, June 21, 1841. Besides lacking sanction of the Texas Congress the time was ill-chosen, because on the next day, Gen. Arista's commissioners arrived at Austin to propose an armistice and to aid in ridding Texas of the brigands that infested the country.

Q. Was the Santa Fe expedition solely for "trade" purposes, and, if

so, why was it outfitted with military equipment? L. L. K.

A. Pres. Lamar proclaimed its purpose to be both to open direct trade with Santa Fe and to induce New Mexico people living within the claimed limits of Texas to unite with Texas and acknowledge its jurisdiction over them. He explained that the expedition was armed as a defense against Indians and bandits, but not for subjugating the people, though authorized to use force against Mexican officials, if necessary, and if the people desired to unite with Texas.

Q. What was the most influential early newspaper in North Texas? G. H.

A. The Northern Standard, founded in September, 1842, by Charles DeMorse, who came to Texas in 1835, served in the army and navy, was adjutant general to Gen. Rusk, and in 1886 was defeated by Gen. L. S. Ross for the Democratic nomination for governor. DeMorse died in October, 1887, and his daughter discontinued publication of the Standard in 1888.

Q. The law of April 6, 1830 was passed by Mexico to keep Texas under better control. What were its provisions? S. R. B.

A. It attempted to provide for: (a) military occupation of Texas; (b) imposition of customs duties; (c) exclusion of slavery; (d) prohibition of further immigration from the United States. These were mainly the provisions to which the colonists objected.

Q. Where was the Peters Colony

organized and where were its Texas grants? G. H.

A. It was formed in Louisville, Ky., by W. S. Peters, Harry J. Peters and others, and under contracts with the Republic of Texas as located about 10,000 persons in North Texas between 1845 and 1857, the first being on Farmers Branch in Dallas county, where a marker has been erected recently and where plans are under way to establish a State Park.

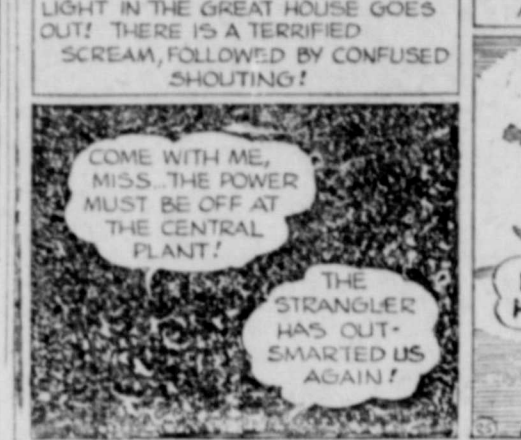

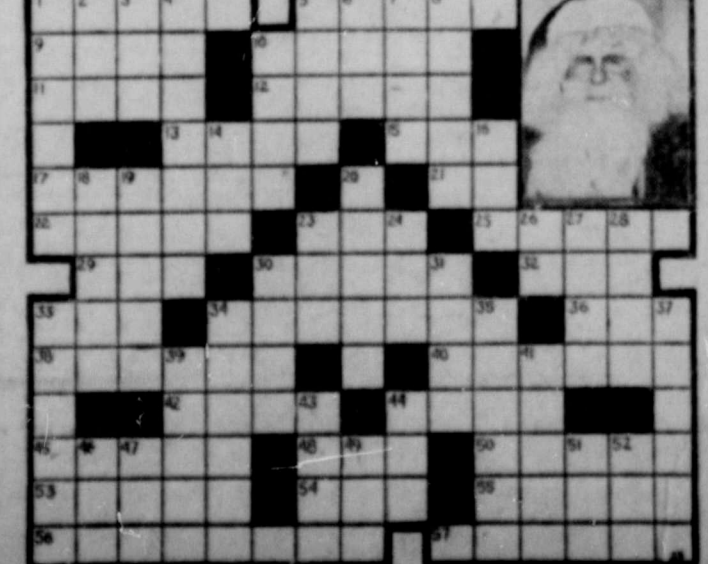

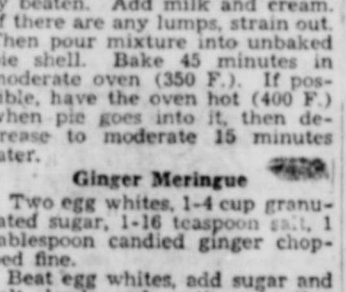

Text: John 1:1-18

THE lessons during the coming year take us over large fields of Bible interest far apart. After a quarter's study in the Gospel of John, we shall in the second quarter turn far back to study personalities and incidents recorded in the book of Genesis. In the third quarter, we shall proceed through the book of Exodus to the story of God's part in the making of a nation. Then, in the fourth quarter, we shall return to the New Testament for a series of studies in the Christian life.

The first lesson for the year is from the prolog of John's Gospel. The philosophical and mystical exposition of the reality of the eternal Christ, the Word that was in the beginning identified with God in character and origin, the source of life and light, the Word that became flesh incarnate in Jesus of Nazareth, full of grace and truth.

John the Baptist was witness to this Bearer of Life and Light, whose way he had come to prepare, and John, the author of this gospel, sets forth in this remarkable book to bear witness both before and after the earthly ministry of Jesus. He has set himself the great task of recording the things that Jesus did and said, the fullness of which, if they were all told, he suggests, would more than fill all the books of the world.

Through characters and incidents, he unfolds sentence by sentence, chapter by chapter, the testimony to Jesus, the Son of God, and to the reality of the salvation that He brought to men.

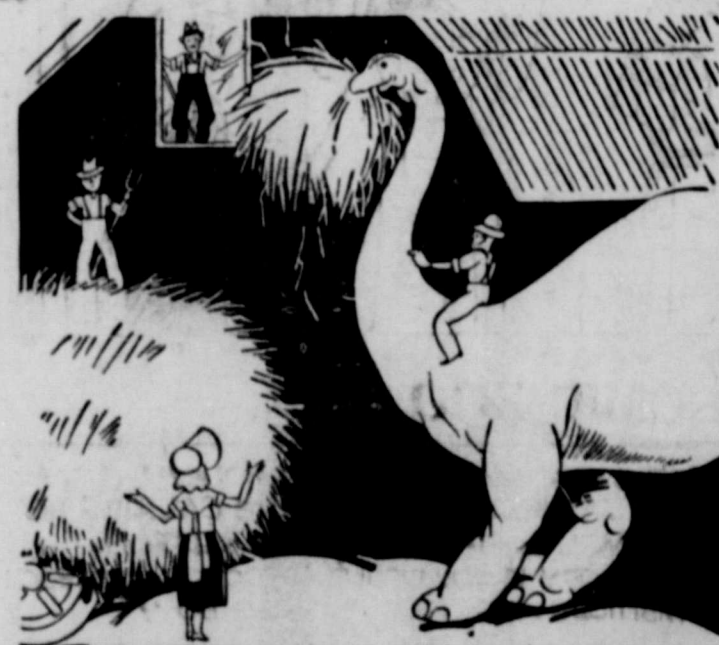
