Demonstrators of Hens Show High Egg Production

COLLEGE STATION—The average production per hen in flocks of Texas poultry demonstrators was 149.8 eggs, according to the annual report submitted by E. N. Holmgreen and Geo. P. McCarthy, poultry specialists of the Texas Extension Service. The general average for the State is approximately 90 eggs per hen. The high production of demonstrators' flocks is due to correct rations, increasis due to correct rations, increasis is due to correct rations, increas-ed care, healthier birds, and to the act that demonstrators culled out

34.4 per cent of 'heir hens.

Records on production feed costs, rations, and improvements were kept on poultry flocks by 2,479 persons in cooperation with county agricultural agents during 1936, and 1,238 persons kept similar records on turkey flocks, the

lar records on turkey flocks, the report shows.

The flocks of poultry demenstrators produced more than four and a half million dozen eggs which returned \$918,539. The turkey demonstrators and cooperators sold 155,219 birds, of which 85 per cent graded No. 1.

In 4-H Club work, 1795 members were enrolled in chicken projects with a cash income of \$49,548 while 100 4-H Club members carried turkey projects and mark-

carried turkey projects and mark

eted 4,465 birds.

The mortality in turkeys during the growing period averaged 35 per cent, while this figure in poultry was 71.1 per cent. Demonstrators in poultry received an average of 23.4 cents a dozen for eggs during the year compared with an average of 17.5 cents in 1935 and 12.7 cents in 1932. Feed costs of producing a dozen eggs average. producing a dozen eggs averages 11.5 cents, and hens made an av-erage profit of \$1,35.

COURT REFORM WILL BE VOTED

By United Press

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9 .- Sen ate Majority Leader Joseph Robinson forecast today that Congress would enact President Roosevelt's judiciary program, but admitted modifications probably will be made.

Robinson's statement was accompanied by a personal suggestion the retirement age for Supreme Court justices be set at 75 instead of 70, as Mr. Roosevelt suggested.

This would reduce the number appointments the President could make to the supreme court three. However two more jus tices reach the age of 75 within a few weeks.

The President's proposal calls for a new justice for each present member who reaches the age of 70 and fails to retire. This would give Mr. Roosevelt six supreme

court appointments. The Wagner Labor Act came before the supreme court for argument arising on speculation whether the present or new tribunal will

Abolition of Poverty Would Enrich U. S.

If the republic should decide to take seriously Mr. Roosevelt's inaugural plea for abolition of poverty, it is going to have an interesting time of it during the next generation or so.

It may not make much money out of it, but it will keep awfully busy. For abolishing poverty is not a matter of getting money into pockets so much as of putting shoes on feet, coats on backs, houses on vacant lots, and good food in pinched stomachs. And we just naturally have not, as of today, enough of these things to do the job.

All of which simply means that if we are going to go ahead and abolish poverty-which is just another way of saying that we would equip everyone in America with all the necessities and a fair smattering of the luxuries-we are going to have a boom such we never dreamed of be-

Between the desire and its accomplishment there is, of course, a huge gap. How a program of this kind can be made to pay is a wide-open question. No producer, be he a truck gardener or the head of a big automobile corporation, is going to expand production unless he thinks he wil get some money for it.

But the interesting thing, at this moment, is the con templation of the stupendous jump in production which will take place if we do go ahead and make abundance available to everyone.

There is enough work there to keep the vast building industry busy for many decades.

It is easy enough to see what would follow. Furniture factories, makers of boots and shoes and clothing, manufacturers of all kinds of household appliances and gadgets, producers of electricity, farmers, stock raisers, cotton growers, shepherds-all these people would find an unprecedented demand for their output.

Makers of capital goods would be busy night and day equipping them; mines and forests and railroads and shipyards would be busy as never before.

It makes a pretty picture, and it isn't spoiled by the cynical question about who is going to pay for it all. For the important fact is that this tremendous market does exist, potentially-and so does the productive capacity to

Since those things are true, it is inevitable that we shall eventually find a way of hooking demand to capacity. For there is where our industrial future really lies.

Not in overseas markets, but below the equator, or on the far side of the Pacific-but right at home, where the richest nation in the world has a dazzling chance to treble its riches by distributing them.



Two packages salad gelatin (aspic), 2 cups boiling water, 2 cups thick tomato puree, 1 table-spoon finely minced onion, 1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley, 1 package cream cheese, 1-2 cup cream, whipped.

Dissolve the salad gelatin in boiling water. Add tomato puree. Pour half of this tomato-gelatin mixture into a heart-shaped mold which has been dipped first in cold water. Chill until firm. To the other half, add onion and parsley and chill until it begins to thicken.

Mash cream cheese with the whipped cream and add to the thickened gelatin, stirring in until the roughly mixed. Pour into mold on top of plain tomato gelatin and chill until firm. This salad, served with minced chicken sandwiches and coffee, would constitute an adequate tidbit for




