#### **Mankind Has Created** His Own Worst Perils

The safety experts look up from their desks to announce that our automobiles killed more people in January of this year than in any other January on record-thus compelling us to reflect that our greatest perils these days seems to be the ones we create for ourselves.

The traffic menace is strictly a man-made affair. There is no immutable natural law which makes it a menace-except, possibly, the law that two bodies cannot occupy the same space at the same moment. Since we created this menace, we could end it over night if we chose to do so-

But we dont choose. We refuse to give up the driving habits which tragic experience has proved to be dangerous; we refuse, for the most part, to permit our police to build an effective system of traffic control. And so we go on. killing people at a rate that would raise a heaven-shaking ery of protest if the deaths were caused by some plague or pestilence.

It seems to be mankind's fate in this modern world to create new dangers for himself as he destroys old ones. The automobile, which kills the people whom medical science saves from death by smallpox, yellow fever, and cholera, is one example; on a vastly greater scale, war is another.

Here, again, we face a menace that we ourselves creat ed. It is exactly like the traffic menace except that it is infinitely larger. Traffic threatens to kill us individually; war threatens to wipe out our whole civilization.

Suppose some natural force—a strange new disease, a turn of the ice age, or something equally elemental and yond human control-were coming up on the horizon the way war is coming up; something that bade fair to destroy entire cities overnight, to inflict the most excruciating suffering on millions of people, to kill women and children by wholesale, to disrupt the entire world's economic and social mechanisms, and to reduce every great nation on earth to bankruptey and chaos.

Would there not be the most frantic, determined effort by all the nations of the world to enlist their best brains, spend to the limit of their ability, and co-operate like brothers of the Golden Age, in order to avert the danger? Would not all quarrels, jealousies and suspicions be shelved until the danger had passed?

The answer is too obvious to need repeating; so, too, Is the distressing fact that although a danger precisely like the one described above does threaten the world, and threaten it imminently, we do nothing whatever to turn it de. Turn it aside? We made it ourselves,

In little things and in big things, it's the same story. We seem to be able to get around all our troubles except the cnes we ourselves have called into being.
