NEGRO IS HELD IN SLAYING OF SHERIFF

LeRoy Kelly, negro, at Littlefield.

LEBOCK, March 22.—Sheriff A. Loyd, 48, of Lamb county, was in a Lubbock hospital today with bullet wounds suffered Saturday night, as he attempted to arrest LeRoy Kelly, negro, at Littlefield.

Loyd was shot in the head and shoulder. Kelly was wounded in the arm. The negro later was captured and was brought to the jail here as a precaution against possible mob action, because of intense public feeling at Littlefield.

Loyd was the second sheriff killed in the last two weeks by negroes. Sheriff J. Alex Brown of Marion county was assassinated at the Marion County jail at Jefferson on March 10. Charley Brooks, negro jailbreaker, was captured last Thursday and admitted that killing.

Sam Hudson, chief deputy sheriff at Littlefield, said murder charges would be filed against Kelly after the funeral services for Loyd are held tomorrow.

Few Offering Aid In Highway Survey

With approximately 7,000 vehicles affected by the registration law, car owners of Eastland County have returned to the Highway Planning Survey only 63 of the post cards that were handed to them at the time they paid their 1937 automobile license fees at the office of C. H. O'Brien, County Tax Assessor and Collector.

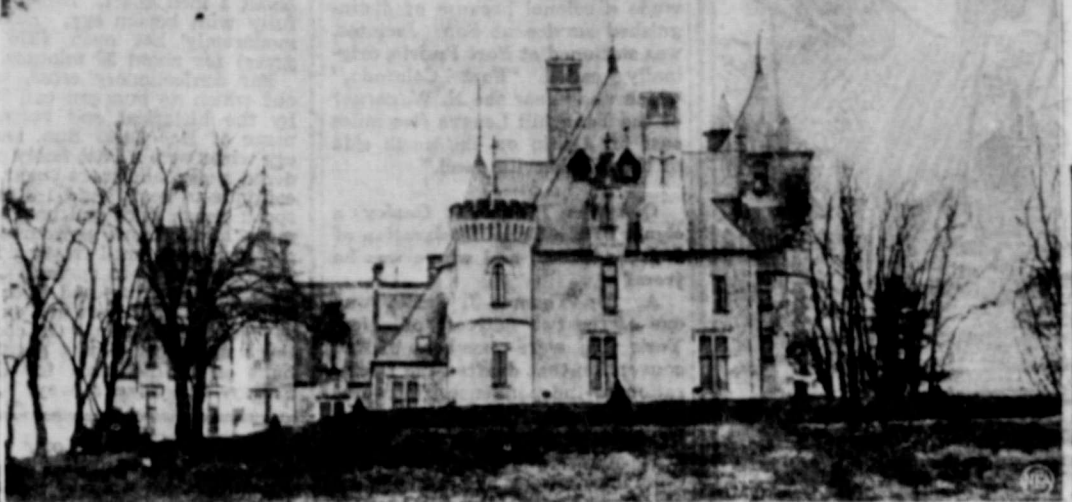
Car owners of Eastland County have failed to respond to pleas of the Highway Planning Survey to provide information on which the highway programs of the future will be based, a tabulation of returns received to Wednesday disclosed. The number of car owners sending in information on cards received when they registered their vehicles is insufficient to provide an accurate picture of the road needs of this county.

The information which is being collected will be used by the Highway Department and the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads in planning the future construction and maintenance of roads and highways in this county and in this section of the state. Local motorists should be sufficiently interested in improving of the road system of this county to ask for these cards at the time they pay their license fees and should fill in the cards and mail them, because information collected by the Highway Planning Survey will be used in designating federal funds which soon will be spent on improving the secondary road system of Texas.

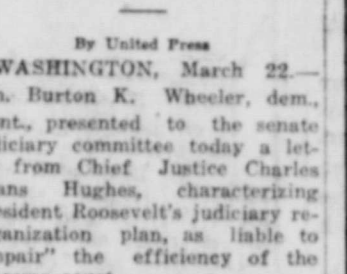

Pomp and Circumstance of Britain Is Useful

Having lived through the love affair of a king, the British empire ought to have little trouble surviving the coronation of his successor. But the current argument over who shall be the residuary legate to the royal nightshirt, or pajamas, does seem to be one of those minor crises that would rattle the rafters of a less sturdy nation.

The American, brought up in a land where no tradition goes back much more than a century, has a hard time understanding the survival of these trappings of medievalism. He is unable to figure out whether his cousins over the sea are playing a game or taking it seriously; so, in the end, he lapses into that spirit of exasperated admiration with which he is accustomed to observe the doings of the English.

Lord Anceste, joint hereditary lord great chamberlain of England, for instance, renders divers services to the king before the coronation, and is entitled to a rakeoff. By tradition, he may have 40 yards of velvet to wear at the coronation. He may lodge at the king's court. He may lay claim to the royal and bedding, and he can carry off the royal pajamas.

All these claims the noble lord has just reviewed, in all solemnity, before a royal court of claims. And a crass and crude Yankee may be pardoned, perhaps, for asking just what this is all about, anyway.

Somehow the British find all of this flummery worth paying for. It serves some useful purpose, or they would not go on doing it. The question is, what purpose?

Probably its chief value lies in the fact that this pageantry is a symbol of solidity. When the empire takes time out to stage a comedy like this, you can rest assured that nothing very serious is wrong. People don't occupy their minds with games when they are worrying about tomorrow's disasters.

Along with that goes the reminder of age and the stability which age brings. No one can smile at the pompous arguments over King George's bedding without at the same time reflecting that king, government, and people do share in a society which goes back in an unbroken line for many centuries. The implication is that it will continue for many more.

Now that is the sort of thing we in America lack utterly. We get along well enough without it, for we still have that youthful cockiness which keeps us looking ahead and prevents us from caring very much about the backward glance. We would not dream of robbing Jim Farley, for instance, in 40 yards of crimson velvet for a presidential inauguration, or of asking the Supreme Court to say whether he might take Mr. Roosevelt's nightie home with him afterward.

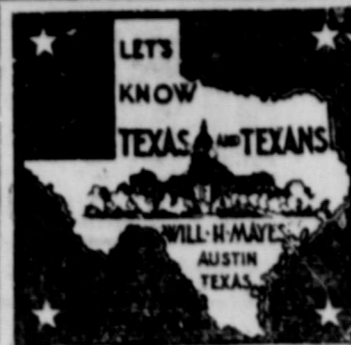
But we ought to be able to see why the English find it worth while to do just that. It isn't all a game. Beneath its comic surface this horseplay has a very real and solid use.

In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

Q. Where was Captain Robert M. Coleman stationed after the battle of San Jacinto?

A. Captain Coleman, who was made a colonel because of distinguished service at San Jacinto, was stationed at Fort Prairie, originally called "Fort Colorado," which was "near the N. W. corner of the Tannehill League five miles east of Austin on the north side of the Webberville road."

Q. Was Thomas J. Gazley a signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence, and where was he from?

A. Dr. Thomas J. Gazley was one of the two natives of New York who were members of the convention that drafted the Declaration of Independence. He represented Bastrop, where he then lived, later serving in the Texas army and the same year moving to Columbus, where he was county judge; was a member of the Second Congress of the Republic. He was born in New York State, on Jan. 8, 1801, came to Texas in 1832 as a physician and died near Smithville in 1878. His remains were recently reburied in the State cemetery.

Q. When was the University of Texas opened?

A. The academic and law departments were opened at Austin in the fall of 1883, the medical department at Galveston in 1887.

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

FOR Good Friday, hot cross buns are as essential as a new bonnet is for Easter. And a large tureen of codfish family style usually appears at the same time.

Hot Cross Buns
(Two dozen)

One cup milk, 1-4 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons butter, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 yeast cake, 1-3 cup lukewarm water, 1-2 teaspoon cinnamon, 3 cups flour, 1 egg, 1-3 cup seeded and quartered raisins.

Scald milk, add butter, sugar and salt. Dissolve yeast cake in lukewarm water. Then add to milk mixture with cinnamon and flour. Beat egg well and add.

Mix thoroughly, add raisins and mix again. Cover. Stand in warm place to rise until light. Then shape into good sized biscuits. Place on baking sheet about 1 inch apart. Brush carefully with beaten egg. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees) for about 20 minutes.

For confectionery cross, without which no bun can call itself by the historical and respected name of Hot Cross Bun, beat 1 egg white with a little finely powdered sugar, add more sugar and continue to beat. Add 1-3 tablespoon lemon juice and beat some more, adding more powdered sugar if needed, until frosting is of the consistency to spread. Then with a pastry bag and with extreme care, make crosses on top of each baked bun. Of course, there is another way to get these buns on to the table for Good Friday—the baker's way. —Am

Freshen codfish in cold water to desired degree of salt. Drain and flake with fork. Butter in saucepan, add onion sauce. Cook in top of double boiler until smooth, about 10 minutes. Add codfish, juice. Cook another 10 minutes then add potatoes and par

Heat through and serve at once.

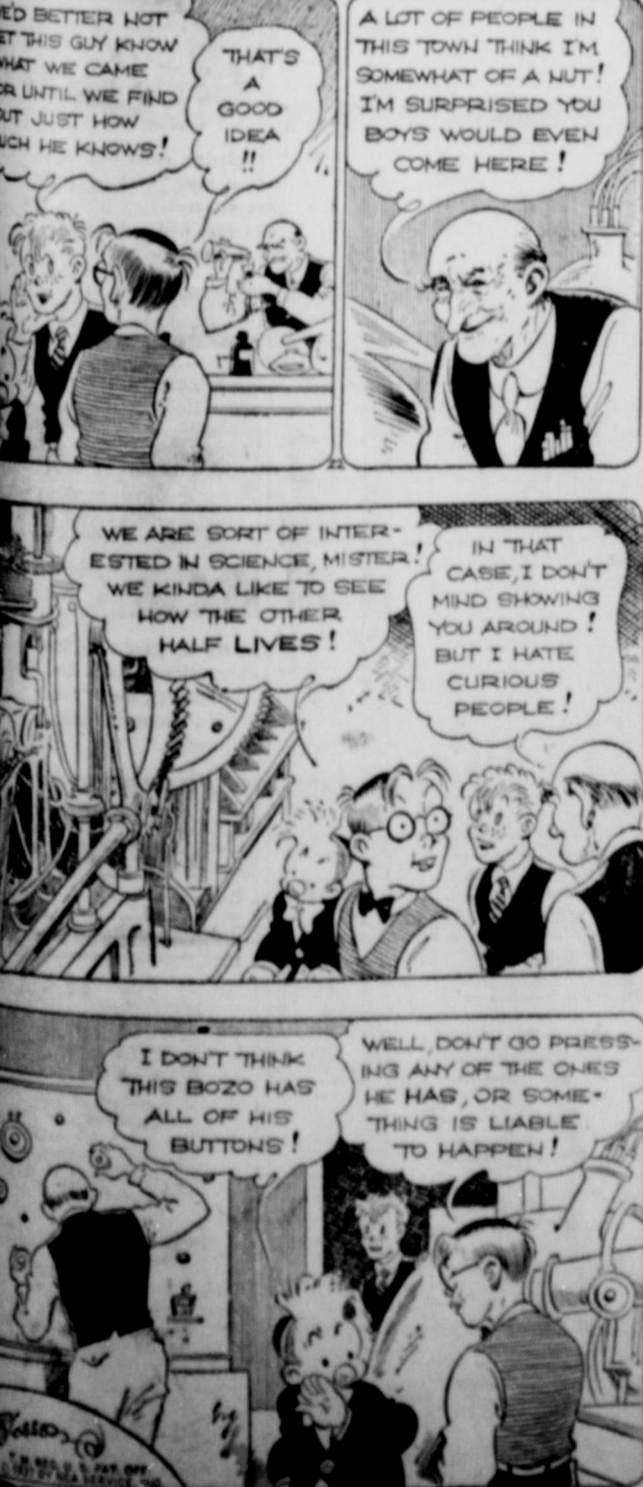

And when the day's work is done, no chauffeur calls for him. Instead, he drives his own car, a small coupe of the cheaper variety.


