Large scale unionization gains are reported in the wake of the steel settlement, which greatly added to the effectiveness of the slogan, "It pays to organize." The slogan, "It pays to organize." The C. I. O. will move at once into the huge textile industry.

Even more consequential, perhaps, is the campaign by Labor's Non-Partisan League to put over Roosevelt's bill to expand the Supreme Court. After causing big industry to revolutionize its labor policy, the C. I. O. unions and others affiliated with them in the league will undertake to be the

league will undertake to be the deciding force behind a sweeping change in federal government.

It must be borne in mind that the Supreme Court fight is close. If Roosevelt's forces win, it is likely that the support of labor may subsequently stand out as islation at this session of Congress. likely that the support of labor may subsequently stand out as the deciding factor for victory. After November's election, certain leaders of Labor's Non-Partisan League sought to take almost full credit for labor. The boast wasn't taken very seriously because Roosevelt's margin was so wide it precluded the theory that he owed re-election to any one group. But now the Presione group. But now the President is in "the big fight of my life," and the fact that this time the Lewis labor group's support may be the decisive factor cannot be ignored.

Defeat for the President's plan wins by only three or four votes his debt to labor will be obvious. The league claims to represent the C. I. O. unions, other international unions, state federations and local bodies.



Can't U. S. Avoid War, Costly Naval Program?

In a highly uncertain world which seems to be at the mercy of the whims of military-minded paranoiacs, most Americans are heartily in favor of keeping their army and navy in a fairly high state of preparedness.

Nevertheless, before we get too deeply involved in the current armament race, it might be a sound idea to stop, look and listen for a moment.

Specifically, it might be a good idea to figure out just where we are going, and why, before we go any farther with our fabulously expensive naval building program.

The House of Representatives now is considering the annual naval supply bill This carries the staggering appropriation of \$526,000,000 to support and maintain the navy during the coming year. Eighty-one vessels now are being built or will be started within the year; two battleships, three aircraft carriers, 11 cruisers, 48 destroyes and

Added to the forces we already have, this will make quite a navy. What are we going to do with it?

There are only two other nations on the globe that have fleets of comparable strength: England and Japan. Unless we are aiming at one or the other of them, we don't need a navy that strong. Which one is it?

You have to do some deep and dark figuring to see a war with England anywhere within the realm of remote possibilities. We are withdrawing from Asia and insisting that what happens in Europe is no concern of ours; unless all signs fail, we are about to pass a neutrality bill which will keep us from insitsing on our traditional neutral trade rights in case of an English blockade of a foreign coastline. Where, then, are we going to head into trouble with England?

The case of Japan is different. "Everybody" says that there is real danger of an American-Japanese war, so it must be so; and yet a more suicidal war for both nations would be hard to imagine. Japan is our best Asiatic customer. We are getting out of the Philippines, and our annual trade with China would hardly pay for one of these fancy new battleships we are building. It is going too far to suggest that we can stay out of war with Japan if we

There is still another point. If American opinion is unanimous on anything, it is unanimous on the idea that our purposes are strictly defensive. We aren't planning to fight overseas; all we want is complete security at home. And, in that case, we ought to remember that we dont need ship-for-ship parity to be secure. A navy fighting in its own waters can hold its own, even when substantially outnum-

We ought to go over all these points rather carefully. We have one of the mightiest navies in all history right now. Is there any compelling reason why we should spend half a billion a year to make it still mightier?
