Nothing is more tantalizing than a story that is only partly told. It is all very well to use the imagination to fill in the gaps, but there are places where this is not enough. There must be some special punishment reserved in the hereafter for writing men who arouse one's curiosity without satisfying it.

There is, for example, the little story about the monkey who went to the movies.

This story, originating in India, got on the cables the other day and was printed in divers American newspapers. It told how a monkey wandered into a motion picture theatre in Bangalore. He seems to have come in about 20 minutes after the picture started, walking unmolested through the main entrance and taking a seat in the popular-priced section.

He behaved, according to the story, "like any orderly film fan," remaining to the end of the picture and departing with dignity.

Now that is all very well as far as it goes, but it leaves a lot untold. What picture was it, for instance, that drew this adventurous monkey out of the jungle? Was it, by any chance, one of those miraculous things in which Johnny Weissmuller swings gallantly from tree to tree; and if so, did the monkey understand what Johnny was saying, and applaud? Was it one of those penthouse-and-chorus-girl pictures, with a villain who collects etchings and means no good? Or could it have been a gorgeous Hollywood musical, with phalanxed dancing beauties going through their maneuvers with the camera poised directly overhead?

It would be interesting, too, to know how the monkey reacted to the "trailers"—those combinations of adjectives and action which undertake to tell what is going to be shown next week. Is it going too far to say that he would seem to be the ideal audience for such things?

Far more vital than these questions, however, is the effect which an afternoon of movie-going may have on this ape's future. Will it render him dissatisfied with jungle life, infected with a taste for human society? Will he wind up by leading a jungle exodus, so that monkeys as a group take to dropping in on all kinds of human gatherings?

The thought is a shuddery one. A chimpanzee might wander into one of our more dignified clubs, drop into an easy chair, and go unnoticed for ever so long, mistaken for one of the members. A gorilla might stray onto a college campus and become a football hero before the error was discovered. And the imagination reels at the thought of a simian invasion of the House of Representatives. What laws might not get passed, before the correspondents were able to spot the invaders!

It is a thought-provoking business, that of the monkey at the movie. The Indian correspondent really should have told us much more about it.

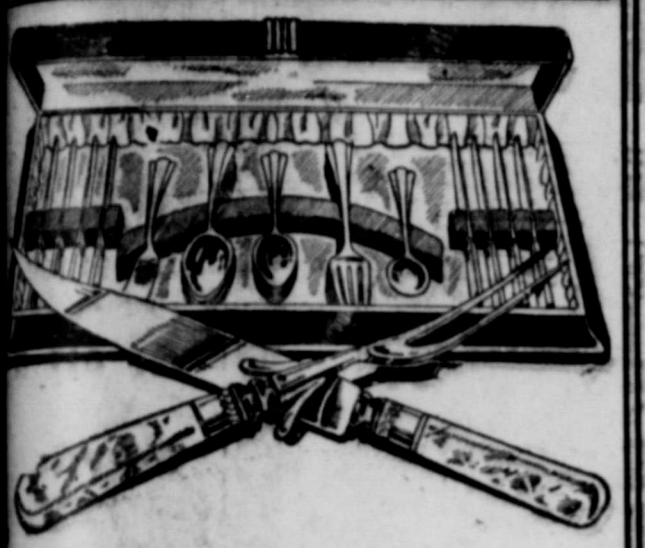

ling expose of the fanatical Voodoo worship of one hundred thousand New York Negroes.

In "Coronation Crisis," the first coordinated camera report of Britain's royal romance, March of Time scores brilliantly in its editing, the high point of which is the presentation of Edward's actual voice in his now-famed farewell address. Although England's crisis is now history, the picture loses nothing in timeliness, for it skillfully demonstrates the transition of English industry from Edwardian to Georgian merchandise, and, as the vast panorama of London's preparations for the May 12 ceremonies flash across the screen, it is evident that a British coronation is not only a colorful, religious pageant, but a gigantic trade boom for the Empire.

In reporting the longest, most hotly contested Constitutional amendment fight in U. S. history "Child Labor" vividly portrays its progress from President Coolidge who sponsored the issue, to President Roosevelt, who is determined to see it ratified. To present a broad view of the extent of the exploitation of children, the news feature sent its cameras into the sweat shops of the industrial East, the sugar-beet fields of the West and the lumberlands and the farms of the South. Yet it remains strictly impartial by bringing to the screen the leaders of both sides of the issue.

From dingy Harlem flats and obscure dens comes the photographic material for the third subject a startling bit of news-coverage dealing with the current drive of New York police and health authorities against hundreds of "conjure doctors" to whom poverty-stricken Negroes, seeking to improve their fortunes, pay good money for Voodoo powders, potions, advice and the right to indulge in the barbaric orgies of the African Congo.
