



Besides the canned food and upply for the table, I sold 9 buthels of English peas at \$1 per ushel, 185 pounds of cabbage at 1-2c per pound, 50 pounds of nions at 3 1-2c per pound, 100 ounds of dried beans at 5 1-2c per pound, 200 ears of roasting corn at \$1 per 100, and 150 pounds of tomatoes at 4c per pound. The total amount came to \$28.87.

Watering Hotbeds

"Excessive watering of tomato plants in a hotbed will produce spindling plants'," says Helen Hagar, garden cooperator of the girls' 4-H club at Mangum. "The watering should be done in the morning so that the plants will dry off before evening."

"The temperature of the hotbed

should be as nearly uniform as ed from the hotbed as soon as tape. Killing Talented Men— Is That Efficiency?

Another "treason trial" seems to be in the making at

Alexis L. Rykow and Nikolai Bukharin, until recently two of the most prominent men in the Russian scheme of things, have been expelled from the Communist party; if things go according to schedule, they will presently be facing the grim Soviet courts just as other equally distinguished Russians have done before them.

During the French revolution, someone remarked that "the revolution is devouring its own children." Never was the truth of this aphorism brought out more terribly than during the past year in Russia. Sixteen prominent revolutionists were tried, convicted of treason, and executed, last July; last January, 17 more were tried and convicted, 13 of them being shot. Now, apparently, the process is to be repeated once more.

One's first reaction to this sort of thing is to shudder with horror and conclude that Russia is at the mercy of a conscienceless band of assassins. And yet-ruthless as the Stalin clique undoubtedly is-we would miss the point of the whole thing if we dismissed it in that fashion.

What is significant about it all is that these outbursts of cold, calculated violence are part of the price that must he paid for a dictatorship. It was so in Germany, where Roehm and his followers were killed in the famous "blood purge." It has been so in Italy. That it is so in Russia, the treason trails bear eloquent witness.

For a dietatorship has no room for an opposition. The state must be completely responsive to a single will; as a lorical corollary, no one may question that will, or do anything which in any way weakens it or distracts it from

So a dictatorial machine must be completely ruthless. The men in charge of it are not dictators because they are bloodthirsty and unscrupulous; they are bloodthirsty and unscrupulous because they are dictators. If they lacked those traits, they would very soon cease to be dictators.

And this leads us to a point worth bearing in mind. The Fascist and the Communist share the notion that democracy is too inefficient and cumbersome to cope with the diverse problems of this modern world. They differ as to the remedy, but they do agree that only a dictator can "get things done" neatly and will dispatch. Whatever its faults, it is at least efficient.

But-is it? Is it efficiency, to live by a system which compels you to kill all the prominent men who do no agree with you? Does democracy, which is able to use the talents of the public men who happen to be in the minority, commit itself to any such outlandish and costly inefficiency as that?

Is not a dictatorship, with its spies, its blood purges, and its subterranean treasons, actually the most inefficient form of government that could possibly be devised?

Colonel Waggoner was so enthusiastic about horses and racing that he built beautiful Arlington Downs track at Dallas—grand stand, clubhouse, per lock stables and all—four years before betting was leg fized then he offered large enough purses to attract pretty good here's from around the country to run against his own and other texas ponies and conducted the only track in the U.S. with-

out betting.

It cost the colonel something like \$2,000,000 to erect the plant on his Three-D Stock Farm-land, and many thousands more to operate the track, but money meant little to him He was fabulously wealthy and owned more find than the state of Rhede Island.

His track is the finest of the four major plants in Texas, It has a mile-and-cixteenth strip, a glassed-in grand stand, a luxurious clubhouse and a seating capacity of 7500. Last year a "tote" was installed by his sons, Guy and Paul, who have inherited some of their father's love of horses.

The other three major tracks are Alamo Downs in San Antonio, Epsom Downs in Houston and Fair Park in Dallas. They aren't as elaborate as the Waggoner plant but they cost thousands to build and their owners are wailing over the fact that they will be good for nothing except chicken roosts if the repeal bill goes through.



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
