## LOYALISTS IN NEW DRIVE TO BURGOS TODAY

**By United Press**  
Spain.—The loyalists continued their successful campaign in Spain today driving toward Burgos, the rebel capital in the north, and pushing the southern rebel army back toward Cordova.

The military strategy of Col. Jose Miaja, defender of Madrid, has proved extraordinarily effective. The rebels are superior in trained troops, airplanes, weapons and munitions. The poorly trained loyalist forces, however, are numerically far superior.

Miaja's strategy has been to keep the rebels busy on a dozen scattered fronts so that they cannot concentrate for a massed drive on Madrid and Valencia.

## Raymond Henry Overjoyed When Informed His Case Is Reversed And Remanded by Austin Court

"I can't hardly explain how I feel," faltered Raymond Henry when told at the Eastland county jail the case in which he was convicted and assessed 50 years in connection with the death of H. L. McBee was reversed and remanded Wednesday by the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin.

"I've been looking for it ever since it was argued" added the over-joyed, thin-faced and slender "hanging skeleton" case defendant.

Henry said "I was pretty sure" the case would be reversed and remanded since it was submitted the Court of Criminal Appeals December 23, 1936.

News of the court's action was telephoned by Frank Sparks, one of his attorneys, to County Jailor Ross Crossley, who informed Henry.

Henry, receiving the Eastland Daily Telegram and a state paper each day, had every Wednesday, decision day for the high Austin Court, eagerly scanned the columns to see if action had been taken in his case.

A year ago Monday Henry was found guilty "with malice aforethought" in the alleged slaying of McBee, Rising Star highway worker, whose widow he married. The case was heard in 88th district court, the same tribunal in which a jury could not agree in the fate of Henry's wife, Mrs.

Della Henry, upon a similar charge. The jury in the woman's case reported its inability to agree November 12, 1936.

The case drew public attention initially after what were identified as the remains of McBee were discovered hanging from a post oak tree near Rising Star in December, 1934. In February, 1935, Mr. and Mrs. Henry, who soon after her husband's disappearance May 1, 1935, was married to Raymond, were indicted.

Re-indictments against the couple were returned March 3, 1936. These alleged the slaying of McBee with a sharp instrument. The first two bills were dismissed after return of the second indictments.

Jack Smith, who also was charged in the case, committed suicide previous to Henry's trial. A justice of the peace verdict explained the death as resulting from a self-inflicted razor blade wound in his throat.

A charge of murder against Jack Smith's brother, Lynn, was reduced later to that of an accomplice.

L. H. Flewellen of Ranger and R. E. Grantham of Cisco were attorneys for Henry in his trial, having been appointed by 88th district court. In the progress of the trial they were joined by Sparks, who assisted in the appeal and was attorney for the woman in her trial.

## COUNTY SCHOOL MEET OPENS IN RANGER AS THOUSANDS ASSEMBLE

Thousands of school children from all over the county gathered in Ranger early Thursday morning for the three-day Eastland county interscholastic League meet which began this morning and will continue through Saturday afternoon.

Two unusually pretty trophies for the winner of the meet and the winner of the track and field event have been purchased by Ranger organizations and are now on display in the Chamber of Commerce windows.

The Ranger Chamber of Commerce has furnished a gold trophy on a bakelite base for the winner of the entire meet, including literary and track and field events. The trophy has a curved gold background, behind a figure holding up a laurel wreath of victory. Atop the trophy is a golden eagle with outspread wings, the whole arrangement having a modernistic touch. The school which wins this trophy in succession will earn permanent possession of trophy.

The Carl Barnes Post of the American Legion has donated an equally pretty trophy for the winner of the main athletic event of the meet. It stands about 18 inches high with a silver figure of a runner mounted on top of the base. ## TWO UNIONS ARE SEEKING NEW MEMBERS

HOUSTON, April 1.—The American Federation of Labor launched its first direct attack in Texas, on the Committee for Industrial Organization today through Holt Ross, Southern Representative of the A. F. of L.

"The time has now arrived when it becomes necessary for the public to know the truth about the A. F. of L. and the C. I. O.," Ross said in a radio address last night.

His speech was made after A. J. Hanson, president of the Houston Labor and Trades Council, announced a federation membership drive will begin on April 15. The C. I. O. plans an enrollment campaign for April 5.

Ross did not refer directly to the two opposing campaigns, but charged that the C. I. O. would "bring communist organizers in to Texas."

## COAL STRIKE THROWS MANY OUT OF WORK

A national stoppage of work, throwing 400,000 soft coal miners into idleness, marked the critical labor situation today.

The soft coal miners ceased work at midnight, when coal operators and United Mine Workers Union failed to agree on terms of a new contract. While April 1 is a traditional holiday in the coal fields, the technical stoppage of work went into effect at midnight.

Sit down strikes broke out in several General Motors plants, adding new complications to the auto labor situation where Chrysler, Hudson and Reo production is tied up.

Other developments:  
A strike of WPA workers started in San Francisco. Workers alliance officials said they expected 30,000 WPA workers to be affected.

1200 Pacific Northwest wood workers went on strike when wage negotiations were deadlocked.

Boston coal drivers balloted on acceptance of an agreement to end the strike which began yesterday. Several more New England textile strikes were reported as the Committee for Industrial Organization continued its textile union drive.

At Houston rival organizing campaigns of the CIO and AFL were expected to collide in the oil industry.

In Washington the house rules committee considered a resolution by Rep. Martin Dies, Dem., Texas, intended to outlaw sit-down strikes. The senate had before it the substitute Guffey Coal Control Bill, passed by the house. Senate passage of the Guffey bill before nightfall was regarded as possible.

## EDWIN GEORGE, JR., IS LATEST CANDIDATE FOR CITY COMMISSION POST

Edwin George, Jr., for a number of years a resident of Ranger, has announced his candidacy for a position on the Ranger city commission, subject to the action of the people in the election to be held in Ranger Tuesday, Apr. 6.

George, in announcing his candidacy as finance commissioner, stated that he was in favor of a reduction and re-adjustment of the bond and tax set-up of the city, and a lower water rate, especially during the summer months.

The latest candidate to throw his hat into the political ring is a well-known in Ranger. He is a former member of the city commission, having served on the commission in the capacity he is now seeking. He was formerly in the banking business in Ranger.

## Two More File For Places On Ranger Board of Trustees

E. A. Ringold, school tax collector and assessor, announced today that two more had filed for places on the school board, subject to the school election to be held here Saturday.

Those who have filed are B. H. Peacock, A. N. Larson and G. C. Lum Love. Larson is one of the trustees whose term is expiring and he is seeking re-election to a position on the board.

It was pointed out today that, contrary to the belief of some, candidates did not run for any position, but all candidates were opponents, with the two high men in the election being declared winners of places on the board.

There are two vacancies to be filled and today three had filed for places. Time for filing will close this afternoon at 5 o'clock in order that ballots might be prepared for the election.

## Senator Predicts a Great Cataclysm If Needs Not Faced

Logan made his statement during questioning of Dean Harry M. Stos of the University of Michigan law school, concerning the effects of President Roosevelt's judiciary proposals.

Logan said that he "didn't like his plan," but "firmly believed that national conditions were so critical as to justify emergency action."

Intrigue Undermines Peace Hopes Abroad

Uneasy rumblings from below the surface of Europe indicate that this is going to be a tense and nervous spring. The German army, it is said, has been warned to be ready for any emergency, and the warning is being taken to heart by the people of Hungary, Czechoslovakia, and Austria—who figure, naturally enough, that any activity of the German army is more than likely to be directed at them. But despite these rumors, there is little belief that any actual invasion is contemplated. The new technic of conquest doesn't work that way. A modern dictator is just a shade more subtle. In each of the small nations just mentioned there is an active Nazi party. And if Hitler in his wisdom should aspire to gobble up one of these countries, it would be this local branch of Nazidom that would do the dirty work. Instead of invasion, there would be a rebellion—a swift, carefully-planned coup d'etat, financed and directed from abroad. The German army might indeed mobilize, but it would mobilize simply as a warning, and not in the expectation of doing any actual fighting. Help would be given to the rebels, but it would be sub rosa, unofficial help, of the kind that is being given the Rebels in Spain.

As a picture of the danger that Europe faces, this sort of thing is far more discouraging than preparation for outright declarations of war would be. For this is conquest by intrigue, by double-dealing, by bribery, and by chicanery, and the mere suspicion of it is fatal to any hope for international harmony or domestic peace.

How can you trust your neighbor if you suspect that he is subsidizing traitors in your own household? And how can you have even a pretense of democratic government if you suspect that one of your leading parties is serving the ends of a foreign enemy? What earthly chance does Europe have for a peaceful life if the moles are forever burrowing under the borders like that?

A new internationalism is at work in the world today, poisoning the very air that the people of Europe must breathe. There is the Fascist international and there is the Communist international, each committed to interference with the affairs of its neighbors. War is taking on a new guise, with all the horrors of civil conflict added to the horrors that are inherent in war itself.

What hope is there for the peace of Europe, or even for the salvage of European civilization, as long as this state of things endures?

That foreign community in which huge coins of stone are used would not be the most propitious place to sing "Pennies from Heaven."

# Health Hints

# PNEUMONIA

As stated in a previous article, pneumonia is most often produced by some type of pneumococcus. Today we recognize thirty-two types of these organisms. Thus, pneumonia cannot be considered as a single disease, but as a group of specific infectious diseases and we have to identify the bacteriology of each one in order to attack it intelligently. Not all types are of equal importance, and some are met often seen. Types I, II, III, VII, VIII, are commonly seen. Type V is related to Type II and Type III is similarly related to Type VIII.

In the last few years it has been found that serum can be made from certain types which are of great help in treating pneumonia due to that specific type. To date serum has been made and is useful in treating Types I, II, V and VII pneumonias, however only Types I and II serum can be purchased on the market in this section of the country. The early use of serum has been found to lower the mortality greatly in these four types or groups of pneumonia. It is, however, quite expensive as yet. There is no serum for the other groups. Type pneumonia carries the highest mortality rate and there is no serum at present that is of any value in treating this type. Quite a lot of Type III pneumonia was seen last year, which accounted for the high mortality rate.

If the bacteria invade the blood stream of the individual, it means that his defense is low and the mortality is much higher.

The pneumococcus possesses a nucleus (central portion) and a capsule (outer portion surrounding the nucleus); the capsule produces the toxic substance which is type specific. It belongs chemically to the family of polysaccharides. Serum of the specific type precipitates or neutralizes this toxic substance and allows the white blood cells to attack the nucleus of the bacteria and destroy them.

Determination of the type, made by an examination of the sputum coughed up from the lungs of the infected individual, is comparatively simple laboratory procedure.

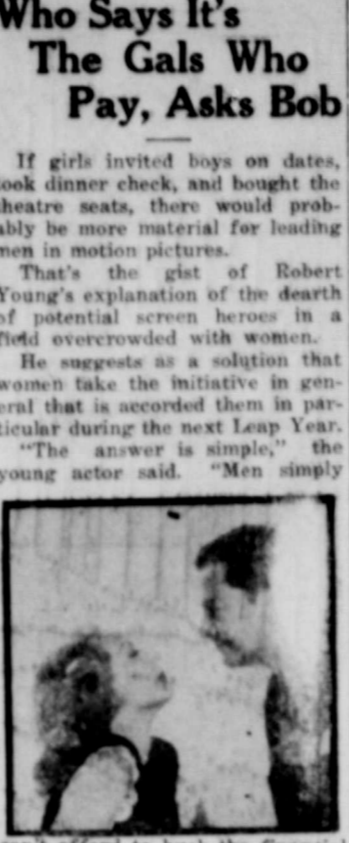
