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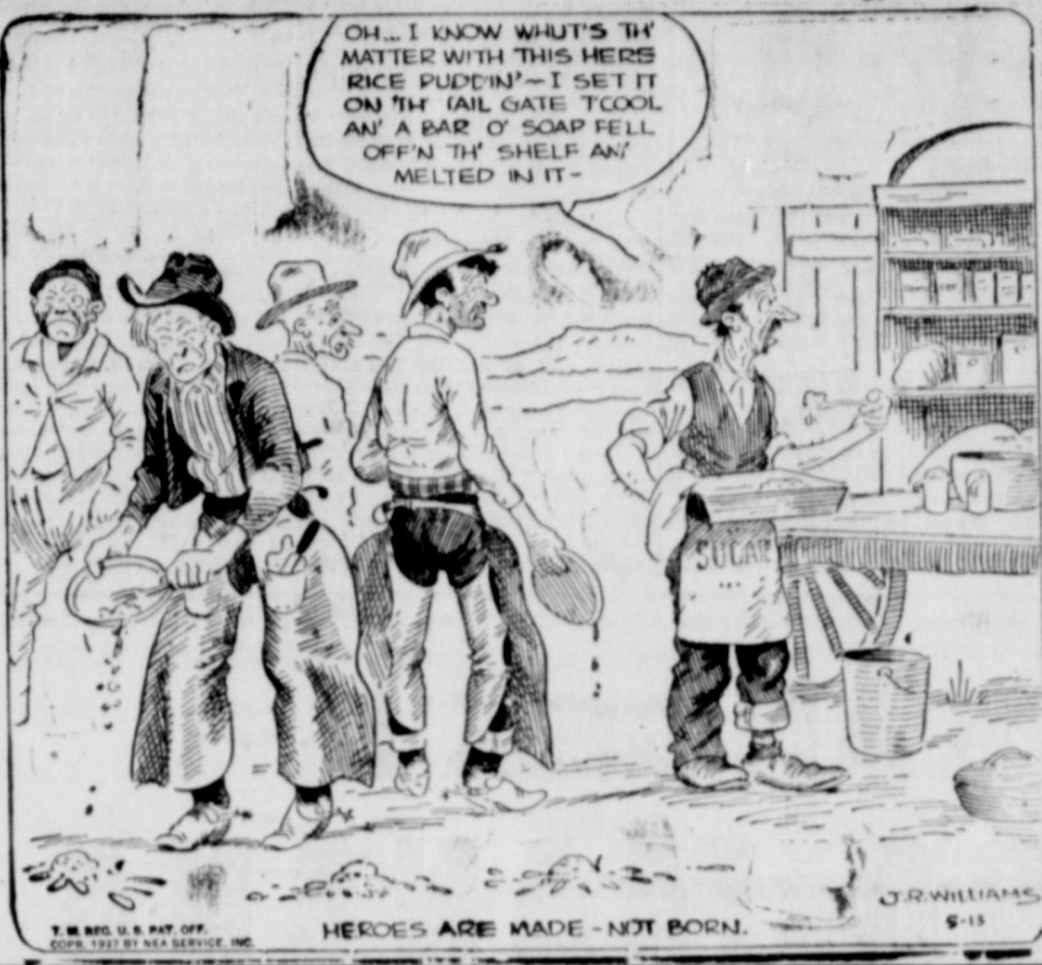

LET'S KNOW TEXAS - TEXANS

WILL H. MARYS, AUSTIN, TEXAS

In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. Address inquiries to Will H. Marys, Austin, Texas.

Q. What condition is reflected in the power increase in Texas? A. Power consumption in Texas for the first three months of this year was 15-1 per cent over that of the same period last year. Distribution of consumption maintained a fair average increase in all lines, indicating a general and steady growth of prosperity in commerce and industry throughout the state.

Q. Who was "Three Legged Willie" Williamson? A. Judge R. M. Williamson, native of Georgia, who came to Texas in 1827, and practiced law. In early life, a white swelling so stiffened one of his legs that he wore a wooden leg, from which he received the sobriquet; was an alcalde in 1834 and commanded an Indian campaign in 1835; was district judge at Bastrop; member of Texas Congress from Washington County from 1840 until annexation and then in State senate. Severe illness in 1857 weakened his body and mind until his death in Wharton County Dec. 22, 1859. Able lawyer, popular judge, brilliant orator, he was lovingly called "The Patrick Henry of the Texas Revolution."

Q. What provision did the Texas constitution of 1836 make for a judiciary system? A. It provided for congress to create a supreme court and not less than three nor more than eight district courts, the supreme court to consist of a chief justice and the district judges sitting together as a court.

Q. To what extent has the growing and shipping of Bermuda onion plants developed in the Laredo section of Texas? A. Growing Bermuda onion plants has become a major industry in the country around Laredo, nearly 2 carloads having been shipped out of the State this season. The white crystal wax and yellow varieties are in strong demand for cultivation in other states as well as Texas.

"GREEN LIGHT" AT ARCADIA IS SUPERB ROMANTIC DRAMA

A best-seller for two years, Lloyd C. Douglas' novel, "Green Light," has been translated to the screen, retaining all of its original strength and beauty and brought to life by a more than competent cast, in the Cosmopolitan production "Green Light," which opened yesterday at the Arcadia Theatre as a First National release.

Errol Flynn, whose first two pictures, "Captain Blood," and "Charge of the Light Brigade," proclaimed him one of the greatest screen "finds" of recent years, adds stature to his dramatic reputation with his handling of the role of Newell Paige, the young surgeon, who sacrifices his own professional integrity to cover the mistake of an older doctor. In shouldering the blame he incurs the hatred of Phyllis Dexter (played by the lovely Anita Louise) whose mother's death was caused by the fatal mistake.

To justify his life, and to prove to Phyllis, whom he loves, that he is trying to make up for the tragic mistake she believes he has made, he goes to an obscure laboratory in the Rocky Mountains and risks his life trying to discover a vaccine that will prevent the dread spotted fever.

Sir Cordie Hardwicke, who was knighted by King George for magnificent work on the stage, is superb in the role of Dean Harcourt, the minister whose advice and philosophy shape the lives of the other characters. And Margaret Lindsay, as Frances Ogilvie, who loves Paige but has to give him up, gives a convincing and sympathetic performance as does Henry O'Neill, as the older surgeon who is the cause of Flynn's martyrdom. Walter Abel fits competently into the role of Paige's friend and colleague.
