





But somehow, in this modern world, all this has gone by the boards. For several generations now it has been man's lot to look as drab and as uninspiring as the tailor can make him. His daily garb is dull and somber; his evening attire is positively funereal; and if he had a brief rebellion on the golf links, and went in for gaudy hose and baggy knickers, even those have given way to plain gray flannel slacks.

This isn't good for him. The strutting instinct lies deep, and it can't be choked off without setting up unwholesome pressures. It is more than a desire to get a night out occasionally that leads the modern man to join lodges and dress up in gold and purple. The ancient urge to look dazzling, to make a vain and gaudy show for himself, is still

Beards are surely a modest beginning. By themselves, they won't do the trick. But they are a step in the right direction. That step once taken, men may at last assert themselves and regain the old right to look as colorful (if not, perhaps, so attractive) as their womenfolk.





## Bumblebee In Ear Of Horse Was Not Fatal As An Auto

By United Press CHICAGO.-There was a day when a bumble bee around a horse's ear was a traffic problem

around this countryside. Yes, the record shows there were traffie accident, reckless and intoxicated drivers - even speed laws in the "horse and buggy' days. But the National Safety Council reported many "horsetraffic" accidents were charged off to the nature of the beast and doubts that serious thought was given to elevated highways or pedestrain under-passes as practical ways of avoiding them.

Accidental deaths involving horses and horse-drawn vehicles, said the council, never numbered not approach that figure until 1907 when about 3,700 were so killed. In 1908 the total slumped to 3,650 and then rose to its all time peak of 3,850 in 1909. In the same years, 1907 to 1909 inautomobile traffic accidents killed 294-393 and 632, respectively.

At no time, the council reported, did the death rate per 100,000 of population, for horse-and-bugaccidents, rise above 4.2. By 913, with 1,258,062 motor venicles registered, automobiles overhauled the horse and buggy as a dealer of traffic accident eath, killed 4,227 and set a death rate of 4.4. In the years when horse-traffic accidents were deadliest there were 142,000 automobiles registered in 1907-197,500 in 1908 and 312,000 in 1909.

Annually, from 913, the motor to 23.6 in 1932, but has risen each year since. Motor traffic killed 36,369 in 1935 and more than 37,000 in 1936.



New Administration-Library Building .- University of Texas





With only a few minor details yet to be attended to, the new unit of the Administration-Library Suilding of The University of Texas, located in the center of the main campus at Austin, is ready for occupancy. The cost of the two units comprising the imposing structure, including fixtures and furniture, totaled approximately three million dollars. Not a penny of this sum came from the taxpayers.

From an architectural standpoint, the tower, 308 feet high, with its 28 book-stack stories, is its outstanding feature. Its higher elevation causes it to rise several feet above the Capitol dome. In addition to book stacks, its space will be devoted to offices for a number of members of the faculty.

The new unit of the building contains the offices of the president, registrar, auditor, comptroller, librarian and dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. Among the many attractive features are two rooms, exposed on three sides, and entirely glass-enclosed, for pleasure reading.

Students who attend the 1987 summer session will be the first to have opportunity to use the building in its completed form.





# College As Aid To Job Shown

By United Press

NEW YORK .- A college diploma gives its owner a 16 times better chance of getting a well paid job, and reduces his chances of landing on relief rolls to less than 1 per cent, according to a survey of employment statistics prepared for Life Insurance Week, to be observed May 17 to May 22.

Proof that college education is the best unemployment insurance was offered by a survey of unemployed families made by the American Federation of Teachers. Only 1 per cent of the 3,980 heads of families on relief studied had so much as one year of college training; 12.4 per cent of the family heads had one or more years of high school, and, in 86.6 per cent of the cases studied, the education of the father was within common school limitations.

Based on an analysis of available employment statistics, the American Management Associa-tion reported that the 7 per cent of the young men of 22 years of age who comprised the college graduating classes of 1930 will take over about 57 per cent of the available openings in the business world of 1940. 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
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
