Tung Oil Seen Profiting Dixie

HATTIESBURG, Miss. — The one-crop South today appeared started on a campaign to become the greatest tung oil production section of the world.
Already Pearl River county, Miss., produces about three-fourths of all the tung oil produced in the United States. And the state has about 50,000 acres under cultivation.
The climate of Mississippi is said to be especially adapted to cultivation of the tung tree. Nurserymen in southern Alabama and Florida also have had marked success recently with young plants.
The tung oil tree has grown for centuries in China, where coolie labor extracts the valuable oil from the poisonous nuts.
The United States formerly purchased \$15,000,000 worth of tung

oil annually from China. The oil is used in the manufacture of high-grade paints and varnishes, and especially in the manufacture of lineolums and electrical insulation.
However, so great is the demand for the oil, that if every farmer in the U. S. cultivated tung trees, they would still be unable to supply the demand for the product.
Already tung growers realize \$75 to \$100 an acre on their trees. The market price is about 15 cents a pound. Tung trees produce 1600 pounds of oil to the acre, whereas cotton produces only 150 pounds of oil, peanuts 300 pounds and flaxseed 225 pounds.
Tung trees need no long and tedious process of grafting, it is explained. Beginning with the third season there is a steady return from the groves, and the yield increases yearly.
Because of the poisonous nature of the trees they are free of insects and need no expensive spraying. Killing frosts have not affected trees in south Mississippi. The

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON — There has been such a terrific din of protest against plans for the Thomas Jefferson memorial here that it now seems almost inconceivable that the sponsors can ever get away with it.
The project has been bombarded, strafed, bayoneted, blasted and fiddled by nearly all the local folk, reinforced by members of Congress. Add a large number of recent visitors who became engaged on hearing that their beloved Japanese cherry blossoms would have to be destroyed if Jefferson were to be properly honored in accordance with the official blueprints.

Objections have been aimed at three chief points:
1. The design, which is that of a Greek temple closely resembling the Pantheon.
2. The site, which calls for a rejiggering of the Tidal Basin around which the cherry blossoms bloom annually in a thick unbroken line, and for reconstruction of a large area which Washingtonians consider especially beautiful in its present form.
3. The fact that the architect, John Russell Pope, was chosen at a star chamber session rather than in open competition.
Responsible for all this was the official committee headed by Congressman John Boylan, a veteran Tammany man and real estate operator. For years he evidenced his intense admiration for Jefferson by annually introducing a bill for a memorial, and finally under a Democratic administration, obtained authorization for \$3,000,000 for that purpose.

Given full power by Congress, Boylan and his commission have been able to dictate. They can be checked only by refusal of the state and Nazi party, and relief work at disasters.

The "Deutschland" can accommodate 180 beds. It carries a central power plant in one of its cars, cabinet and iron workshops, water and fuel tanks, laboratories, radio and film equipment in others. The unit, which serves as the office of the train's director has a movable stage that can be raised through the top of the car to a height of 21 feet. The train's speed is 40 miles an hour.
The second motor caravan, the "Bayern," comprises 100 separate units. This section carries the kitchen. So vast are its facilities, according to the German news agency, its soup kettles served 350,000 meals in a single day at the National party day in Nurnberg last year. The kitchen is being equipped to provide three meals a day to 250,000 persons.
The trains last served at the harvest Thanksgiving festival, at Buckeberg in the fall of 1936. After a strenuous season they returned to home base, Munich, where overhauling and renovating began.

Woman Survivor of Lusitania Learns About Benefactor

FERNDALE, Mich.—A woman passenger on the ill-fated S. S. Lusitania recalled on the 22nd anniversary of the great wartime tragedy, May 7, how she owed her life to Alfred G. Vanderbilt, New York socialite who died in the disaster.

Recently, Mrs. McDougall read a magazine article by one of the Lusitania's survivors which related that Vanderbilt had given his life belt to a hysterical woman passenger.

"I was the only woman on the deck at the time," she recalled.

"He came up to me, took off his life belt and handed it over. I remember that a steward shouted to Mr. Vanderbilt that there wasn't much time."

Mrs. McDougall said she had been in the ship's dining room when the first of the two German torpedoes struck the Lusitania. She went on deck to witness scenes of almost indescribable terror. Mothers were wrapping their children in blankets, tying life preservers around them and throwing the children overboard.

Mrs. McDougall recalled that a great wave washed Vanderbilt overboard shortly after she had given him his life belt. She herself tumbled into the sea when another wave broke over the promenade deck.

She lost consciousness and drifted for almost five hours in heavy seas. Unconscious, Mrs. McDougall was picked up for dead by sailors of the British cruiser Juno and taken to a morgue.

A man seeking the body of his nephew in the morgue pulled the sheet away from Mrs. McDougall's face. He noticed a muscular twitch in her hand and advised physicians. Mrs. McDougall was taken to a Queenstown hospital, where she recovered.

The most harrowing part of her experience, she related, occurred when the great vessel sank beneath the waves.

The ship went down nose first and the suction drew me toward it," Mrs. McDougall said. "It drew my head into a porthole. After a bit, I was freed from the porthole and came to the surface, floating among bodies that littered the sea."

Car Registrations Show An Increase

WASHINGTON.— Motor vehicle registrations in the United States reached a new all-time high in 1936, exceeding the 1935 registration by nearly 2 million and surpassing the former all-time high of 1930 by 1,700,000 vehicles, according to reports of state authorities to the Bureau of Public Roads of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Registrations in 1936 totaled 28,221,291—24,197,684 passenger vehicles and 4,023,606 trucks and tractor trucks.

Every state showed an increase in registrations over the previous year. Registrations in 16 states—Alabama, Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Louisiana, Michigan, Mississippi, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, South Carolina, Utah, Washington, West Virginia, and Wisconsin—increased more than 10 percent over 1935 figures. The average increase for the entire United States amounted to 7.6 percent.

England's Bank to Be Made Bombproof

LONDON.—Nine hundred men, toiling in secret, are making the new Bank of England an impregnable fortress that will defy fire, flood, burglary and air bombardment.

No workman engaged on the job is allowed to give information concerning the new building, and bank officials have sealed lips.

Behind its stately facades the new bank contains many wonders. Fifty feet below street level are the world's strongest strong-rooms, capable of holding \$750,000,000 in gold bullion. There are 50 underground vaults, each surrounded by a wall of steel and concrete eight feet thick. Dynamite would be useless against them and heavy bomb attacks would not shake them.

Massive steel doors, guarding the entrances to the vaults, are opened and closed by electric power. In the event of invasion or any emergency it would be possible to flood the vaults.

As a further precaution the new bank has also its own electric power station.

Just as if the future wasn't uncertain and perplexing enough already, Fortune Magazine now comes out with an article predicting the return of the male beard.

A barbers' journal, says Fortune, not only foresees such a return but advocates it. More significantly, Columbia University's eminent forecaster, Paul Nystrom, is quoted as follows:

"American men will blossom out in clouds of beards in a decade or two. Men's mass tastes change more slowly than women's, but they change, nevertheless. A new bearded age is on the way. Your sons will be wearing heavy beards."

In the face of such expert advice, the average male can do nothing but stroke his chin reflectively, gaze on the downy cheeks of his small son, and reflect that eventually those blooming cheeks will be hidden behind a glossy tangle of shrubbery in the style of a Civil War general.

But when you stop and consider the matter prayerfully, there seems to be no good reason why a renaissance of beards should not take place. And if that, in turn, leads men to regain a little of their old pride in personal adornment, we are going to have a more colorful and exciting world.

There was a time when men were every bit as pernickety about their looks as women, if not more so. An Englishman of Elizabeth's day, for instance, was as vain about having his beard frizzed and perfumed, and as careful about his great starched ruff and the lace fringes to his sleeves, as his great-great-granddaughter is about her new-born permanent. With it all, he was nobody's pansy, either; the men who followed Drake around the world, sought the northwest passage with Frobisher, and won the empire of India may have been peacocks, but they had hair on their chests.

But somehow, in this modern world, all this has gone by the boards. For several generations now it has been man's lot to look as drab and as uninspiring as the tailor can make him. His daily garb is dull and somber; his evening attire is positively funereal; and if he had a brief rebellion on the golf links, and went in for gaudy hose and baggy knickers, even those have given way to plain gray flannel slacks.

This isn't good for him. The strutting instinct lies deep, and it can't be choked off without setting up unwholesome pressures. It is more than a desire to get a night out occasionally that leads the modern man to join lodges and dress up in gold and purple. The ancient urge to look dazzling, to make a vain and gaudy show for himself, is still working.

Beards are surely a modest beginning. By themselves, they won't do the trick. But they are a step in the right direction. That step once taken, men may at last assert themselves and regain the old right to look as colorful (if not, perhaps, so attractive) as their womenfolk.

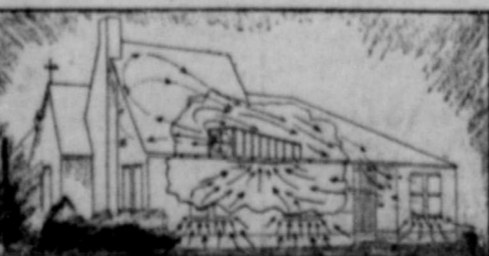

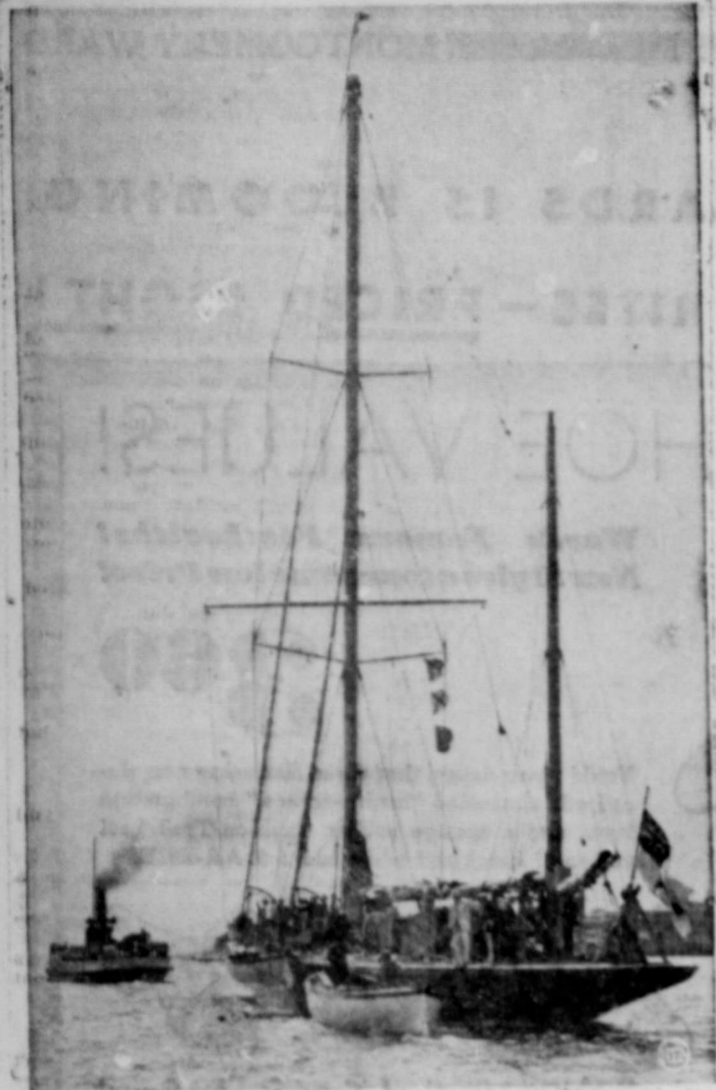
