(8 servings) Three cups fresh tomato pulp, 1 cup chopped celery, 1-2 cup chopped chives, 1-2 cup water, 5 tablespoons flour, 1 1-2 tea-spoons salt, 3 eggs, 1 cup soft breadcrumbs, 2 1-2 cups crumbled

breadcrumbs, 2 1-2 cups crumbled potato chips.

Boil celery and chives and pepper together for 4 minutes, using only 1-2 cup water. Blend together flour, salt, and egg yolks to make a smooth paste, using a little of the tomato juice if needed. Then add this to the rest of the tomato pulp. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold in. Line a 2-quart baking dish with a thick layer of potato chips. Pour in the mixture and arrange a few whole chips over the top. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 30 minutes or until firm to touch.



## Found Affected by Couple of Glands By United Press ST. LOUIS.—High blood presure is due to a lack of balance

between the sympathetic system governing the circulation of the blood and the energy-controlling adrenal and thyroid glands, according to Dr. George W. Crile, one of the founders of the Cleveland Clinic. Dr. Crile told the American

College of Physicians meeting here that a close relation between the two is found in all animals and in man.

He said the relation exists because the glands, in speeding up oxidation and increasing energy through a substance poured into the blood stream, create a demand for an increased supply of at no spheric oxygen brought to the tis sues by the blood stream. Relief from high blood pressure consequently may be obtained by reducthe activity of either the glands or the sympathetic system, depending upon which is the of fending mechanism.

Dr. Crile reported that in 84 operations, high blood pressure had been reduced by first reduc-ing activity of the sympathetic system. However, he said further bservation of the patients would e necessary before a final judgment on the value of the operations could be made.




