New Type Legislature Is Up for Appraisal

It is not strange that Nebraska, reviewing the recently recessed initial session of its experimental, one-house, nonpartisan legislature, is unable to decide whether the idea was worth the trouble.

On the balance sheet after Nebraska's new streamlined legislature adjourned, were many other things in its favor and many other things which showed no improvement over the old two-house legislature.

For instance, the 43 members of the unicameral body introduced only 570 bills in this year's session, as compared with 1042 bills introduced by the 133 members of the bicameral legislature in 1935. However, 220 laws were enacted this year, the greatest number since 1921.

The 1937 legislature cost \$50,000 less than that of 1935, but its members adopted a \$54,000,000 budget for the next two years, exceeding by \$18,000,000 the budget set up in 1935.

Taking 98 days to complete its work, the unicameral neared the record for lengthy sessions, and disappointed its disciples who had predicted that a one-house assembly would work with greater speed.

On the credit side, the unicameral passed new rules of procedure to assure "legislation openly arrived at"; set up a planning commission to obtain detailed facts on budget needs of state institutions; paved the way for the previously rejected Federal Child Labor amendment by initiating a change which would permit voters to pass on amendments to the U. S. Constitution, and moved to shorten the state ballot.

An important point of the debate which followed the first unicameral session was that greater criticism developed over the non-party nomination and election of members than over what those members did when they got down to law making.

Democratic and Republican leaders alike protested this loss of party responsibility. Although the rolls showed a Democratic majority, it was claimed that Gov. R. L. Cechran, a Democrat, had difficulty in obtaining support for his legislative plans.

This objection easily could be the stumbling block for Nebraska's noble experiment. Fortunately, there is no real evidence that America or any other free nation would fall under a political hierarchy if the familiar two-party system were abolished. The two-party credo is more or less a national legend which has been neither proved nor disproved conclusively.

Nebraska is pioneering in uncharted government procedure, but there is nothing, thus far, to indicate that any insurable hazards lie ahead. Imperfections that have already developed seem to be within the power of the people to correct. At least, the unicameral, nonpartisan plan of state law making deserves a longer trial, and that, apparently, is just what the citizens of Nebraska intend to give it.

### Investigating Committees Appointed To Investigate Almost Everything

AUSTIN. — Investigating committees appointed by the Texas House of Representatives have everything under surveillance from stream pollution to cement monopolies.

There are five committees working in the House. They haven't reported since their appointment and likely will work until fall. The Senate has one permanent investigating committee. Subcommittees look into different matters.

The committees are investigating:  
1. Administration of the education department.  
2. Activities of Captain E. N. Stanley as Railroad Commission Oil and Gas Division Engineer in East Texas.

3. An alleged cement monopoly in Texas.  
4. State's eleemosynary institutions.  
5. Nepotism in state departments.  
6. Pollution of Texas rivers and streams.

The investigation of Stanley, who resigned from the Oil and Gas Division and then returned after engaging in private oil business, was placed with the education department investigating committee as a money-saving measure and because most of the proceeds from oil and gas taxes pass to the state's available school fund.

Rep. Bowen Bond of Fairfield, chairman of the education investigating committee, said that every witness his committee has called revealed facts demanding the summoning of two or three more witnesses.

It's sort of a vicious circle," Bond said. "We likely will work all summer."

Rep. Ben F. Cathey, veteran legislator from Quitman, who heads the anti-nepotism committee, said that his group was uncovering evidence of many members of the same family working for the state but that his committee, too, would have to work all summer.

The cement investigation is led by Rep. Ross Hardin of Prairie Hill, who has frequently branded various legislative groups as "smelling committees." The committee is investigating a charge that large Texas cement manufacturers submit identical bids to the state highway department. Progress in the committee has been slow and likelihood of a report during the special session appeared slender.

Rep. Leland Johnson of Waxahatchie, heading a three-man com-

mittee investigating alleged cruelties at state institutions for the insane, blind, deaf and otherwise incapacitated, said he expected the committee to have an early report.

The stream pollution investigation was instigated by Rep. Conde Hoskins of Gonzales, who heads the committee. Hoskins told the House that waste oil and refuse from cities are being dumped into rivers and streams, killing the fish and ruining the water for resort purposes.

A sixth committee has been asked. It would delve into alleged illegal practices in the East Texas oil fields. Pipe lines and refineries would be investigated to determine whether or not they are using "hot oil" on which taxes have not been paid.

Each of the committees was given \$500 on which to investigate. All the chairmen say their funds are almost gone. What will happen to the investigations when representatives no longer receive expenses and remuneration was only a matter of speculation.

Most expensive committee in several sessions was led by Rep. Augustine Celaya of Brownsville. Two years ago it investigated "hot oil" practices and uncovered innumerable tax evasions. It spent \$11,000 but it was estimated that \$500,000 was saved the state in tax revenues.

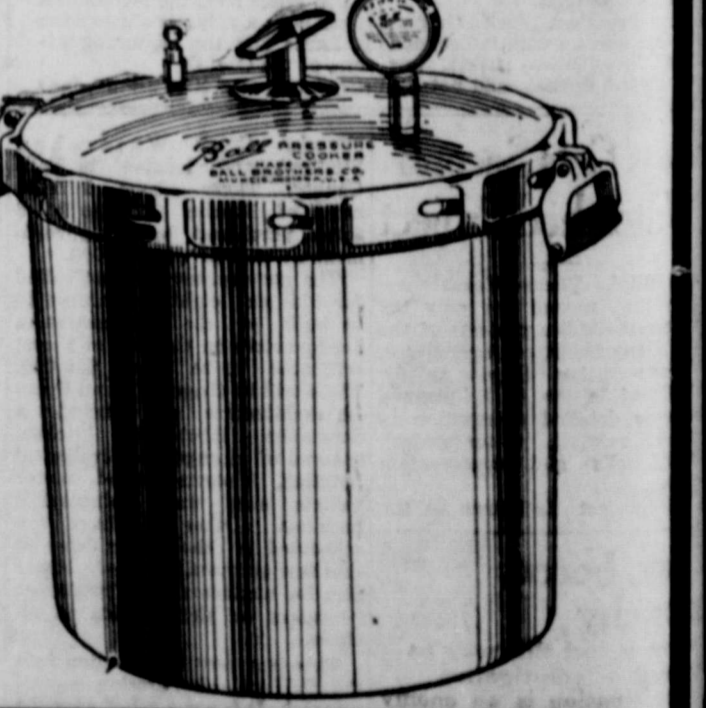
