"Dear Mr. Ramey: "We are glad to know that you find the Texas Almanac helpful but sorry that we cannot carry tables of weights because of limited space. However, US Department of Agriculture reports that honey weighs 11.84 pounds per gallon and mo'asses 11.72 pounds."



Bible Thoughts

"THE DEVIL IN DISGUISE" By Ronnie Parker

There are those who tell us that this is the age of the 'sexual revolution." While liberal theologians are crying that "God is dead" there are other "messengers of light" who champion the cause of the "new morality." In substance they are saying that:

1. Christian ethics change from age to age. That the code of ethics taught by Jesus is outdated and the 20th century must find a new morality

2. No act is right or wrong. They hold the position that acknowledges no absolutes except Christian love. Love is the criterion.

You can be sure that it is the Devil in disguise. Only the Devil and his followers would tell you that there are no permanently binding Biblical moral laws and ethical principles, and thus over-look the clear commands of the Bible. The "new morality" is not new nor is it moral. It is old immorality and the Devil has

been preaching it since time began. God has let us know clearly throughout the Bible of the things that are wrong, immoral and sinful, but in no place more graphically than in Gal. 5:19-20. "The activities of the lower nature are obvious. Here is a list: sexual immorality, impurity of mind, sensuality, worship of false gods, witchcrafts, hatred, quarrelling, jealousy, bad temper, rivalry, factions, party-spirit, envy, drunkenness, orgies, and things like that, I solemnly assure you as I did before, that those who indulge in such things will never inherit God's kingdom" (Phillips' translation). We had best listen to God! It is later than we think!






