Proposition 13, or whatever, adopted in California recently by vote of incensed taxpayers, has scared the living daylights out of public officials, at all levels, across the country. The need for frugality and common sense in the handling of public funds is no greater today than it has ever been, but people in public positions are running scared since Proposition 13 has given them an insight to public opinion about the handling of public money.

Our state officials have mounted their chargers and are riding to the rescue of overtaxed citizens, advocating a special legislative session, possible tax reliefs. The fact that those worthies would even consider being a little more careful with our tax dollars is commendable, but the fact that they had to wait for the voters of California to light the fuse would indicate that it would be better to continue to be calm about the matter and handle it as a routine business affair.

Since the Lieutenant Govmor, the Speaker of the House and other assorted state officials, have suddenly realized that the tax money they spend was at sometime somébody's hard earned money, they are at least making a public show that they are interested. To prove that they have the interest of the taxpayers at heart they advocate spending a ton of money by calling a special session of the legislature. Dimco Industries is the second vegetable processing plant to be located in Dimmitt, and will employ approximately 125 workers during peak seasons with an additional 150 to 175 field hands employed. The plant is expected to reach peak employment by mid-July.

The plant is owned by a corporation composed of Dimmitt farmers including Truman Touchstone, Jerry Watts, Carl Bruegel, Ben Holcomb and Allen McClure. Roy Lyles will be the plant manager.

# One harvest ending, another starts here

Another harvest, that of the stand and growing fast.' county's unusually large vegtable packing plants are getting into operation this week to handle the onion crop. Weather that developed the

most unfavorable aspects at almost every stage of the wheat's growth, except at about perfect, curtailed the 1978 crop which was already short because less acreage

time wheat was planted, then the hard freezes last winter thinned some strands and the rainy spell last month encouraged quick growth of weeds," Bill Clark of Dimmitt Agri Industries said in describing the blows struck successively by the weather.

But he said the quality of grain was generally good, and J.R. Brown of Flagg Grain said that was true in the west part of Castro County, where the test weight averaged above 60 pounds per bushel and the grain was very dry.

"Nobody really spent much on this crop, since prices were low," Brown added. "Most of the wheat grew with very little water and fertilizers, and the marginal fields were mostly grazed out, so yields showed up fairly good.

area was grazed out," Ronnie ers Grain at Hart. But he said yields of the harvested wheat quality was not so good, with the winter.

When harvest first began, test weights were down on wheat brought to Easter Grain More about: elevators, a spokesman there said, but the quality has improved. Little wheat remains to be harvested in that part of the county, or around Nazareth, according to Lucy Leinen of the Agri-Industries office there.

Fewer harvested acres caused the drop in the county's total yield in the opinion of Ed Woodard of the Bruegel & Sons elevators. Compared to last year's bumper crop, only about half a crop is being harvested, he said.

'Quality overall is good,'' he added. "Most of the wheat is at least of average test weight, the moisture content is low.

Digging of onions began this week in the county and LaMantia Cullum-Collier Co. vegetable sheds scheduled their work to start at noon Wednesday with onions, look ing forward to the start of potato harvest in about a week.

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

The pipe shattered the windshield of the pickup and caused \$2800 damage to the truck, but Summers was unin-



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

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

A continuing concern among our government leaders is the prospect of higher oil prices. The only factor holding off a wellhead tax on oil produced in this country is the present oil glut. The surplus of oil comes about from new and increased production of oil from Mexico, the North Slope and the North Sea.

This causes a problem for the OPEC countries, the primary source of crude oil. Saudi Arabia, the largest producer of oil and a staunch friend of the U.S. has been a strong influence both against a price increase and for continued payment in U.S. dollars.

Iraq, Kuwait and the United Arab Emirates have been pushing for a price increase to offset world inflation and have also been insisting on another form of payment other than U.S. dollars. Any switch from dollars to another currency or combination of currencies would collapse the U.S. dollar

overseas. Saudi Arabia can hold off a price increase by the OPEC countries by pointing out the huge surplus of world oil which could now extend into the 1980's. But it will be more difficult to prevent the OPEC some other form of payment

Oil is the largest single commodity in world trade. Saudi Arabia has over 80% of its foreign reserves and assets, around \$65 billion, in dollars. Any substitute of another country for the payment of oil would cause a severe decline in the value of those assets.

Fortunately, the law of supply and demand is at work. It forestalls any action by the OPEC countries which would work to the detriment of the U.S. But time, now on our side, may be running out. A couple of years is one thing. Twenty years is another.

The YACC program initiated by the U. S. Interior Department is furnishing conservation projects for young people unfamiliar with outdoor jobs dealing with wildlife, and habitat conservation.

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

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
