Ranger's Best Rodeo to Draw Thousands on Labor Day

PS ASKED D WITHDRAW HER VESSELS

Section of Command is Likely, Experts Are Predicting.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 4.—Alarm of an immediate menace to the lives of more than 2,000 Americans in the bombarded International Settlement and the French concession of this beleaguered city, the United States tonight issued with Great Britain in demanding that Japan remove her warships from Shanghai.

The intervention followed a list of explosives on the foreign sea, chiefly from Chinese big ships attempting to sink Japanese warships which for weeks had been anchored near the center of the Anglo-American and French districts.

More than 2,000 civilians, including Americans, had been killed in the foreign area since Aug. 12. China was requested to withdraw her armies almost simultaneously.

Both China and Japan were expected to reject the command. It insisted that the other side fire first.

That would leave the U. S., British and French naval commanders and diplomats a showing of two alternatives.

One is to evacuate as completely as possible.

Second is to expel both the Chinese and Japanese by force.

It was agreed that the latter was a thinkable since the combined forces of the powers is much less than one-tenth of the Chinese alone in the Shanghai area.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 4. (Saturday)—Japan's formidable war machine around Shanghai was stalled today by a vicious Chinese counter-offensive, but its leaders shared it would strike again in with increased ferocity.

The Japanese threat, proclaimed by the imperial navy's third fleet, promised fresh perils as great as any this stricken city has met in the three weeks bloody.

REVOCATION OF PERMITS CONTESTED

Threatened with revocation of their beer permits by the attorney general's department and county officials, five retailers in justice of peace precincts 7 and 8 Saturday had filed suit in 91st district court to prevent that action.

B. H. Atchison, Breckenridge jurist, issued an order granting an injunction to restrain the revocation of permits to Attorney Milton Lawrence of Eastland, representative of the beer dealers.

To make the order final was the necessity of posting of bond by the beer dealers before issuance of the writ of injunction by District Clerk P. L. Crossley. No bond had been posted Saturday morning.

No date has been set for a hearing of the case upon its merits, when the wet or dry status of the justice precincts will be determined.

Criminal District Attorney Earl Conner, Jr., previously had announced that the attorney general's department would file suit for revocation of permits in the precincts, basing the proposed action upon the theory that the areas were dry at the time of the enactment of the 18th amendment in 1919.

Judge Atchison issued the injunction order restraining interference with the beer dealers until the status of the precincts are determined because both Eastland jurists—George Davenport of 91st district court, in which tribunal the case was filed; and B. W. Patterson of 88th district court—were not available.

Criminal District Attorney Conner Friday night communicated with Sam Lane at Austin, an assistant in the attorney general's department, who stated an attorney assigned to the liquor control board would be on hand this week to discuss opposition to the suit.

The case was styled "T. A. Minton et al vs. Bert Ford, administrator of the Liquor Control Board, et al."

There are three dealers in precinct 7 and two in precinct 8.

Precinct 7 includes Rising Star and the other political subdivision Desdemona.

Conner stated the case is the first of its kind under the new liquor control act which was effective Sept. 1.

County Judge W. S. Adamson, like Conner, also is a nominal defendant in the case.

BROWN GETS FOUR NODS OF OILMEN

Interest in Brown county was hiked this week with the filing of four applications to drill in the Railroad Commission office at Eastland.

Dow Puckett is to drill No. 1 C. L. McCartney, Taylor-Smith No. 600 survey, four miles south of Brownwood, as a 1,600-foot test. It is 750 feet from the north line and 150 feet from the east line of the 100-acre McCartney farm.

Farrell and others plan to start No. 1 C. J. Watley, section 821, Taylor-Smith survey. The well will be drilled to 1,500 feet unless commercial production is found at a lesser depth.

Location is 165 feet from the west line and 450 feet from the south line on the 1,500-acre Watley tract.

Mrs. M. E. Bishop filed application to drill No. 4 A. B. Shields, J. C. Brown survey, 295 feet from the east line and 570 feet from the south line of the 60-acre Shields farm. Depth is proposed as 525 feet.

Another of the shallow operations, E. N. Schaffner is to drill No. 11 C. W. Anderson, Stephen Jones No. 282 survey, one mile west of Cross Cut. This well is announced for 165 feet.

Erath county was chosen by Errol C. Holt, filing application for No. 2 P. A. Smith, Thomas Stubblefield survey, 18 miles in a northerly direction from Stephenville. Eight hundred feet was announced as the depth, according to the intention.

Cotton Loan Forms Are Due Sept. 13

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—After conferring with Jesse H. Jones, president of the Commodity Credit Corporation, today, Senator Connally said that application forms for cotton loans would reach Texas by Sept. 13 and that in the meantime banks will make such loans to producers.

Connally said Jones assured him that "forms of loan application will be in the mail by Sept. 10 or Sept. 11. In the meantime banks are authorized to make such loans to cotton producers with the assurance that the Commodity Credit Corporation will take up such loans from the banks upon request."

Explaining the program, Connally pointed out that the Government will pay farmers the difference between the selling price of their cotton and 12 cents a pound, but the subsidy will not exceed 3 cents a pound.

"The Secretary of Agriculture today assured me that producers who have already sold cotton of the 1937 crop will be eligible to receive such benefits," Connally declared.

State Treasury's Deficit Shows Hike

This compared with an August 26 statement of \$10,738,066 deficit and a deficit of \$10,421,000 at the end of the state fiscal year August 31.

CHICAGO, Sept. 4.—Chicago health officers today appealed to recovered victims to donate blood to the campaign to halt the spread of infantile paralysis.

Dr. Herman Bundfelen, president of the Chicago board of health, warned of an approaching shortage of convalescent serum made from the blood of persons who have recovered from the disease.

Recovered victims will be paid \$10 a pint for their blood.

It was during the "Boom Days" in Ranger when the following story happened: A man was standing in line at the postoffice at closing time. The window was dropping and he called out that "he had been standing in line for three days, all day," and had been unable to get his mail." Ott Cooper, eldest son of V. V. Cooper was postmaster at the time and Mr. V. V. Cooper happened to be in the lobby of the office. Cooper happened to give the man, according to Cooper, all the letters one man could carry. This happened in 1919.

Mr. Cooper has forgotten the name of the party who received the letters but stated that one letter was read to him and it was from the man's family whom he had not heard from in one year. The letter had been transferred so many times it was impossible to read to him and it was veiled.

Such were the boom day experiences in Ranger.

The old postoffice was located on North Marston just north of the West Texas Clinic.

Cooper further stated in those days there were twenty clerks, each clerk having three letters to take care of in mail calls.

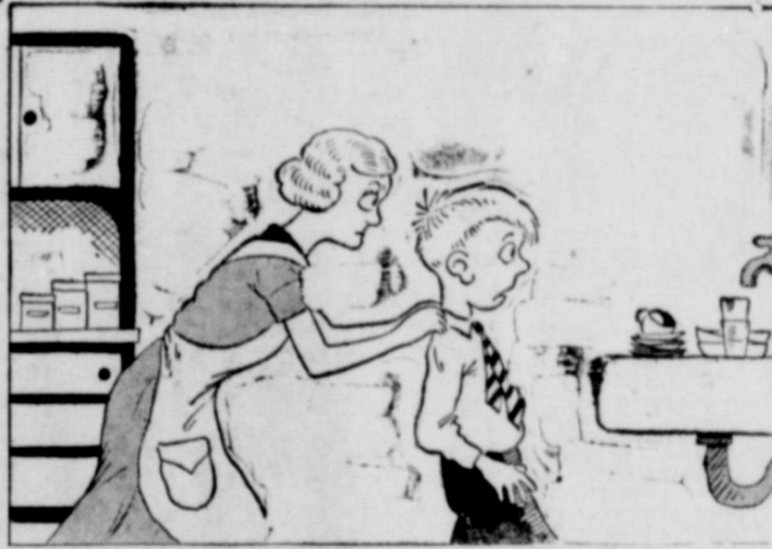
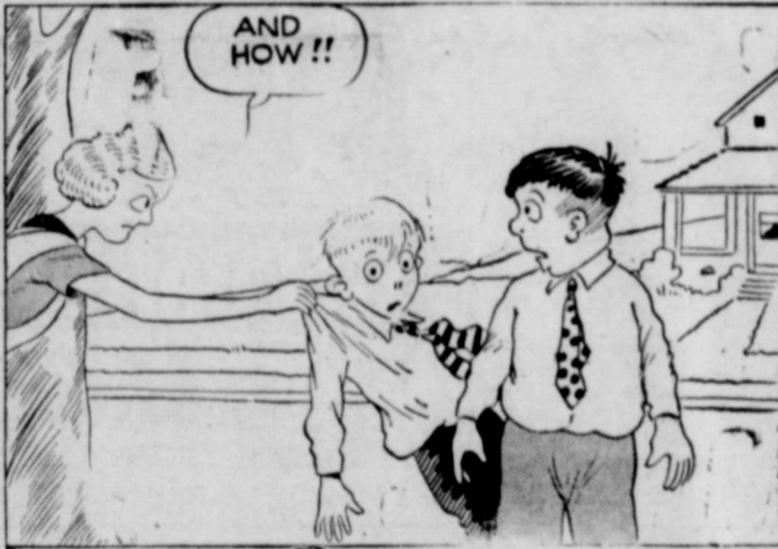
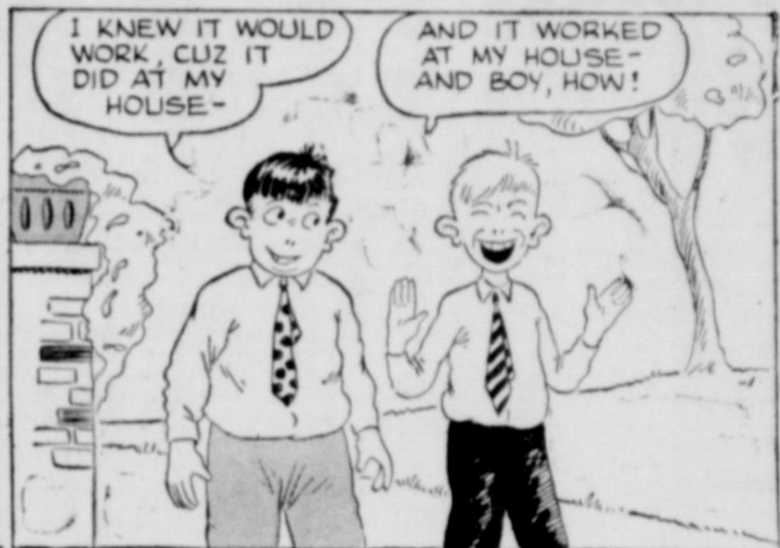
