





Mexico Keeps Busy Without Revolutions

More and more people are becoming interested in the economic struggle that is going on with a surprising lack of audible fireworks in the sister republic across the Rio Grande.

A year ago learned observers visited Mexico by the dozen and returned with the word that it was only a matter of time until the land of manana would become another Spanish battlefield, another testing ground for communism.

That hasn't happened because Mexico seems able to get all the excitement it wants these days from labor troubles, agrarian divisions and expropriation experiments. President Cardenas apparently has kept peace among his people by the simple scheme of making peace more exciting and unpredictable than war.

Admittedly the agrarian erperiment has not worked out even remotely to the extent so fondly hoped for. 

That may be true, but the law has certainly resulted in some extraordinary labor situations-such as oil workers striking and demanding, among other things, a twomonth paid vacation for every workman with rail transportation for himself and his family to any destination in the world and back.
