ROOSEVELT'S TALK BRINGS VARIED VIEWS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—Administration officials looked to the League of Nations today for the speedy and "concerted action" demanded by President Roosevelt to stop aggressor nations preying on peaceful neighbors.

LONDON, Oct. 6.—The British Cabinet, taking the lead among European governments, met today to consider President Roosevelt's speech and decide whether it offers hope for real United States cooperation in stopping a world crest toward war.

At Geneva the League of Nations Assembly, frankly spurred by the speech, prepared to vote late today to call a conference to consider action to end the Chinese-Japanese war and leave no doubt of the feeling of league members that Japan is the aggressor.

Statements throughout Europe discussed the speech on as a development of world importance and reacted to it in their own way.

In fascist countries it brought sharp retorts. In democratic capitals it was greeted with joy.

TOKYO, Oct. 6.—Japan, stung by President Roosevelt's speech on peace disturbers, retorted today with a statement made through a foreign office spokesman.

"We hear lately heated arguments on the question of unequal distribution of resources between the have and have-not countries. If the have refuses to concede the rightful demands of the have-nots peace will be very difficult to maintain.

The spokesman added quickly, "But Japan does not make demands on this point as her right. Japan's only demand is that her people be permitted to enjoy freedom of movement and happiness, which is rightful hers."

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 6.—Floyd Merrett, 29, Goose Creek produce merchant, was released from a hospital after treatment of stab wounds he suffered in an altercation with a stranger last night.

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YOU'RE MAKING FARCE, JUDGE TELLS BLANTON AS TESTIMONY IS ENDED

ABILENE, Oct. 6.—Eighth day of testimony in the plea of privilege hearing in Thomas L. Blanton's \$100,000 libel suit against Congressman Clyde L. Garrett and his secretary, J. W. Cockrell, came to close Tuesday with no indication as to when the case will go to the jury.

Harsh excitement of the past two days quieted down as Blanton, plaintiff, counsel and witness in the hearing, began redirect testimony from the stand.

Recess was taken at 4:30 p. m., as sounds caused by the formation of the West Texas Fair parade on nearby streets distracted attention of those in the courtroom.

At one point, as Blanton read a lengthy passage from the congressional record to the jury, Rep. Garrett went to a window and looked out at the floats below.

Blanton was reprimanded by the judge Tuesday morning, after refusing to say, "I feel I'm being intimidated by the court."

Judge Long reminded the plaintiff, "I'm trying to make you abide by the rules of this court. You're making a farce out of me and everybody connected with this case."

"I wouldn't intentionally violate a rule of this court," replied Blanton. "I have the greatest respect for your honor."

"As to that, I have the gravest doubt," the court replied. "I've been very patient, but we're all tired and I've just about reached the end."

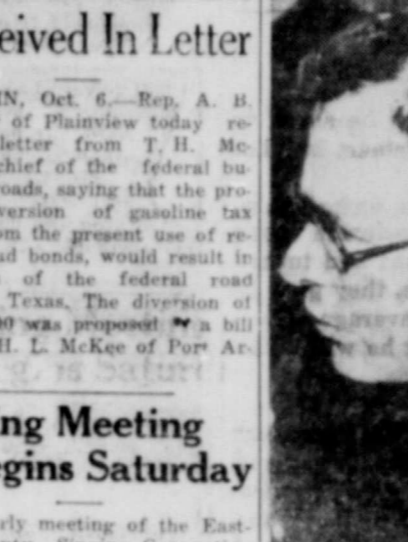

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OMNIBUS TAX BILL APPROVED BY COMMITTEE

AUSTIN, Oct. 6.—An omnibus tax bill to increase state revenue \$10,000,000 a year weathered its first battle without change today and was recommended for passage by the revenue and taxation committee of the Texas House of Representatives.

As proposed, it would spread the measure, drawn by a sub-committee, was argued continuously for 13 hours before final passage.

Rev. H. H. Stephens of Ranger was chosen vice president and general organizer. Rev. Robert E. Bowden of Eastland was named secretary-treasurer.

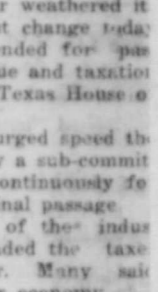
A committee was named to check up on the case contesting the recent prohibition election, which has been appealed to the Eleventh Circuit of Civil Appeals.

Helping Unions Drive Out the Racketeers

The touchiest subject any politician can be asked to
handle is the matter of out-and-out racketeers in labor
unions.

It's a subject that comes up pretty often, unfortunately.
In a good many big cities thugs and musclemen have
moved in on certain old established unions and turned
them into rackets. Ruling by bomb and gun, they give
labor a fearfully costly black eye; yet the average office-
holder is afraid to touch them for fear that he will be la-
beled "anti-labor."

This sort of timidity is just what enables the racketeers
to stay in business. It ought to be obvious that the rank and
file of any labor union would be tickled to death to have
the authorities get the racketeers off their necks; and
once in a while some nervy public official comes along and
proves it.

Somewhat less than two years ago, a special prosecu-
tor named Thomas E. Dewey, went into New York City
to try to break up assorted rackets. It was not long be-
fore he turned his attention to the unions; and immedi-
ately he was loudly assailed as a unionbuster and a
foe of organized labor.

Unperturbed, he went right ahead with his work. He
found one of the worst messes in the various restaurant
unions, where gangsters were in complete control. An-
other mess, almost equally bad, was uncovered in the
painters' union.

During the succeeding months Dewey sent the restau-
rant unions' racketeers to prison and enabled the rank and
file in the painters' union to do their own housecleaning.
And just the other day he was called in to witness the
signing of a contract between the Childs Restaurant chain
and a joint committee from the waiters', waitresses' and
cafeteria workers' unions.

"It was a happy moment," he said afterward, "when
I was privileged to witness a contract between these
unions and one of the nation's largest restaurant chains,
and to know that through that document a union I was
accused of trying to wreck was about doubled in member-
ship. What I had done was to release that union from the
domination of the racketeers, so that those men in it who
had been fighting racket control might once again take its
affairs in hand."

And on the following day, Dewey appeared before
3000 members of the painters' union and was cheered to
the echo as a true friend of labor.

The point of all of this is obvious. When racketeers get
control of a labor union, no public official is going to lose
labor's friendship by putting the racketeers in prison; on
the contrary, he is going to win it. For when gangsters do
take over a union, they do it against the will of the honest
rank and file; and the officeholder who is too dumb to
realize this or too timid to act on its merits—and gets
labor's deep contempt.
