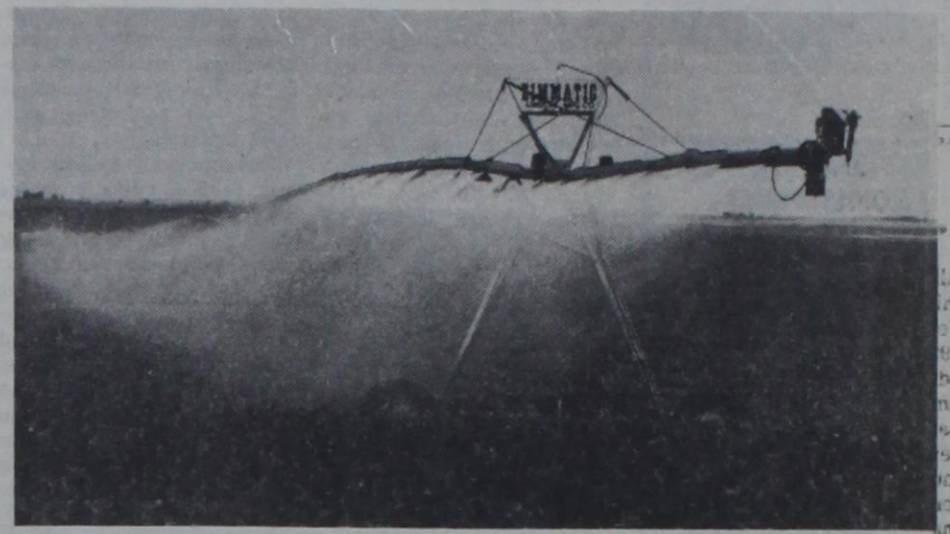

## Notice to Homestead Owners In the Nazareth Independent School District

The Nazareth Independent School District hereby announces that all persons are entitled to receive an exemption of \$5,000 from the market value of their residence homestead for the purpose of school taxes. In addition, all persons who are 65 or older or under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance are also entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 from the market value of their residence homesteads for the purpose of school taxes.

## Unscrupulous insurance agents unfair to SC

Persons eligible for Medicare Health Insurance benefits who seek to supplement their coverage by purchasing additional private insurance should be sure that they are not buying coverage already provided by Medicare, warns Ray Purcell, Manager of the Plainview Social Security office.

Purcell says that Dallas Regional officials of HEW's Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), the Federal agency that administers the Medicare and Medicaid programs, are concerned that many elderly Medicare beneficiaries are being sold duplicative or overpriced supplementary insurance policies.

According to Jerry Sconce, HCFA's Regional Administrator, some Medicare beneficiaries are being taken advantage of by a few unscrupulous insurance agents, often posing as representatives of

Medicare or the Social Security Administration. Sconce has recently contacted State Insurance commissioners asking their cooperation in identifying and controlling such sales practices.

The problem is a costly one, said Sconce, citing a recent report by the U. S. House select committee on aging which estimated that senior citizens are "being taken" for \$1 billion a year by a few insurance companies and their agents. The committee report also noted that some companies which specialize in selling this type of insurance return an average of 50 cents on the premium dollar while others return as much as 90 cents for similar coverage.

Sconce urges senior citizens considering buying a supplemental plan to be sure that they are not duplicating existing Medicare coverage and to seek out policies that pay a high return in benefits.

He further warned that any insurance salesman representing himself as connected with Medicare or Social Security should be viewed with suspicion since no Federal employee is authorized to engage in this activity.

Sconce urged the public to report any such misrepresentation to the local Social Security office and to the State Insurance Commissioner.

Burning stubble causes erosion hazards

## Stubble burning defeats Conservation program

The time is here again to decide on what to do with the residues left from irrigated and some dryland wheat residues.

True, the quickest and easiest way out of this problem would be to burn off the crop residue, but have you considered the cost?

Today, more than ever, the farmer must consider all alternatives before carrying out a particular phase of his farming. This requires looking at long range effects that burning can have on the land.

Stubble burning is considered by conservationists to be a practice that defeats the purpose of the Conservation Program. 1. If you burn you become ineligible for cost share under any conservation programs. 2. Living organisms in the first three inches of top soil are destroyed. 3. Fertilizer value in the residue is lost. 4. Organic matter in the soil is reduced. Our soils need all the organic matter it can get to improve water intake. 5. Erosion hazards are increased from both wind and water. 6. Also it is very important not to forget the air pollution problem and the fire hazard to both property and wildlife. Many species of wildlife including pheasants, require stubble for protection and habitat.

While it is true that there are few immediate disastrous results from stubble burning, we must look at the end results. Over a period of years the continuous burning of stubble can reduce your ground to the consistency of concrete. Tests have shown that after a few years the yield dropped drastically and took several years to bring it back to production. Our heavy soils already have a moisture penetration problem which could be greatly accelerated by the practice of burning.

Now for a few positive ways to handle heavy irrigated wheat straw. A shredder can be used to take the place of one plowing. This should be done before the wheat stubble is plowed. It breaks up the straw for a faster decay rate. The stubble should be left on or near the surface of the soil for at least six to eight weeks. It will decay faster than if turned under and will protect the soil from high summer

## Mail size rules take effect in mid-July

After July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than 3 1/2 inches high or 5 inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Postmaster Bill Sava urges customers to "use up your undervalued envelopes and cards before July 15." That is the date when the Postal Service's new size standards become effective.

The regulations also prohibit flimsy cards. In the future they must be at least seven-thousandths (.007) of an inch thick. An official postal card, for instance, has a thickness of nine-thousandths of an inch.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam mail processing machinery. As a result, the letters of others can also be damaged.

The new standards also affect oversized and odd-

shaped pieces of mail, Sava said.

For first-class mail weighing one ounce or less, there will be a surcharge of 7 cents for pieces more than 6 1/8 inches high or 11 1/2 inches long.

For more information, the postmaster suggests customers check with a post office window clerk.

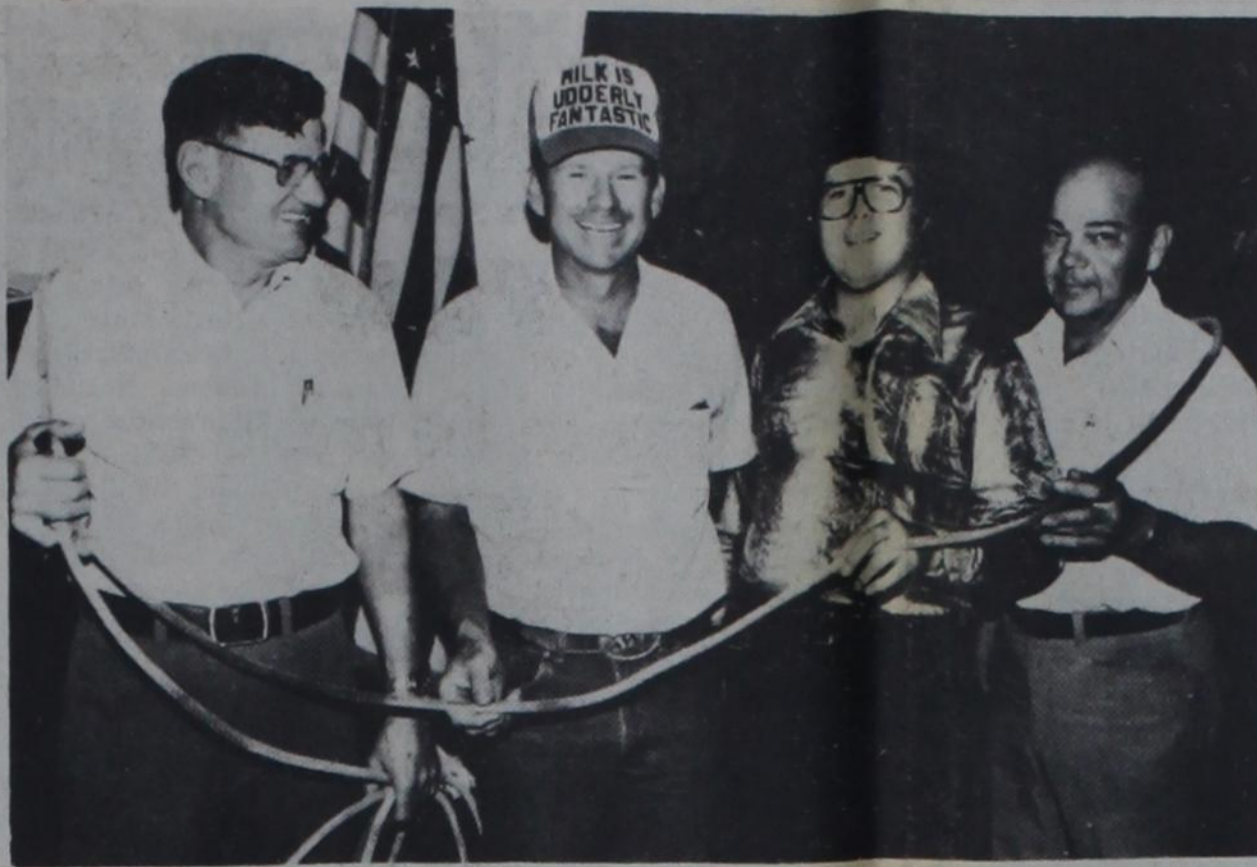

months the government was producing synthetic rubber. The facility was sold to private enterprise and we have had an abundance of rubber ever since. It is said that we have ample shale and coal to produce all of the fuel we will need for several hundred years. It is time to get with it.

I have an official rainfall chart for Castro County compiled by "Goose" Ramey, who was the original weather-watcher in the county, and distributed by the First State Bank. The chart gives the weather picture from 1920

through 1978. 1941 was the wettest year with a rainfall of 39.41 inches. The driest year of the 58 was 1956 with 8.25 inches of rainfall. The month with the least amount of moisture is January with .41 inch average, and the most rainfall is in June with 2.83 inches average. So far this year we have had 10.64 inches with 5.20 inches coming in June.

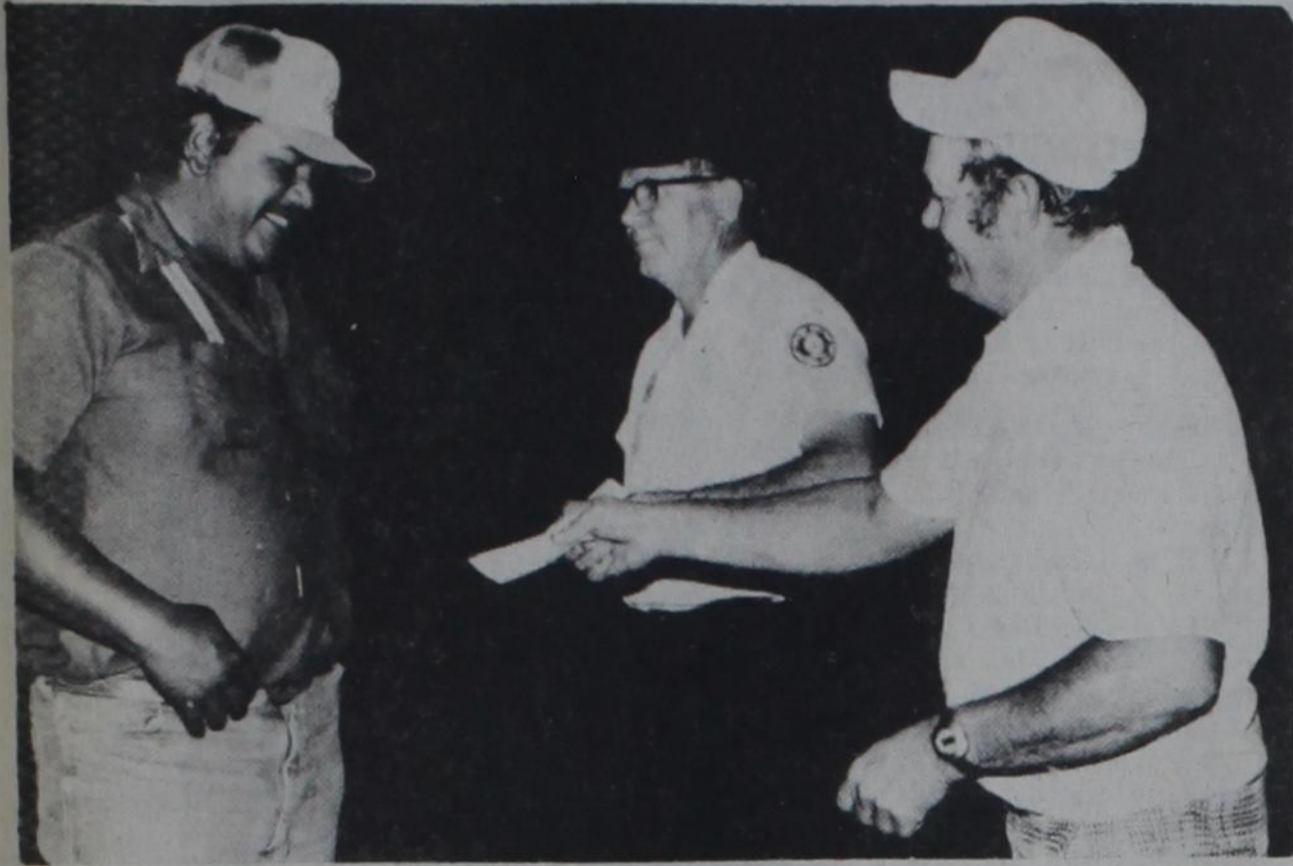

## VETERAN'S SERVICES

A cost of living increase in Social Security benefits went into effect June 1, 1979. This increase was 9.9%, and is the first such raise since the Veterans Administration pension reform bill went into effect January 1, 1979. Included in this pension was a provision for VA benefits to be increased at the same percentage that Social Security was raised.

Public Law 95-588, which went into effect January 1, 1979, provides a new pension program for wartime veterans and their dependent, and for surviving spouses and minor children. Persons who were receiving pension under a previous VA law were given the choice of remaining as they are or changing to the new law, whichever is to their advantage. Once an election has been made to receive under the new pension law, a person cannot revert back to an earlier law. Also, any such pensioner who makes the election prior to October 1, 1979, will be eligible for retroactive benefits back to January 1, 1979. Any election made after that date will become effective only from the date it is received by the Veterans Administration.

Since there will be a possibility of an annual increase in new law pensions because of the link with Social Security, it will be to the advantage of many VA claimants to change. Many persons, however, will have to remain under their older law in order to maintain the level of benefits they now have. All persons considering a change need counseling from their local Veterans Service Officer before making a final determination.

To know whether it will be to your advantage bring in a complete record of the total family income as in the new plan all income has to be reported to make determination. Our office days are on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

The Veterans Administration Regional Office of Waco, gives the following important information to Veterans whose loan entitlement has been used for mobile homes to receive a restoration of the same.

Veterans who used GI loan entitlement to purchase mobile homes prior to October 1, 1978, have additional entitlement available and may not know about it according to Jack Coker, Director of the Waco Veterans Administration Regional Office. Prior to enactment of this legislation veterans who obtained a GI mobile home loan used their full entitlement and their Certificate of Eligibility was marked "NO ENTITLEMENT AVAILABLE FOR USE."

"The Veterans' Housing Benefits Act of 1978 (Public Law 95-476) effective October 1, 1978, liberalized mobile home loan entitlement and the restricted use notation on eligibility certificates no longer applies," Coker said. Veterans are now entitled to the

difference between the amount of entitlement they actually used and the statutory limit of \$17,500. Some may even qualify for restoration of previously used entitlement if the mobile home loan has been repaid in full and the unit securing the loan has been disposed of.

Veterans who wish to have their "NO ENTITLEMENT AVAILABLE FOR USE" certificates updated should obtain VA Form 26-1880, Request for Determination of Eligibility, from any mortgage company, County Service Office, VA field office or regional office. The completed form with the certificate should be mailed to the VA Regional Office, 1400 North Valley Mills Drive, Waco, Texas 76710. "Restoration of previously used entitlement will also be considered automatically in connection with updating of certificates," Coker said.

Word from the Veterans Land Board of Austin received this week shows an increase to a maximum purchase price now of \$20,000 for a minimum of 10 acres, a one time benefit for Texas Veterans. A 5% down payment plus \$200 addition for fees is required. Terms of the contract is 6% interest under current funding with 40 years payable on or before without penalty. Payments are semi-annually. Details and procedures are available at our office or one may write the Veterans Land Board at the Stephen F. Austin Bldg., 17th & Congress, Austin, Texas 78701 directly.

The effective date of the increase was June 13th.

The first cost-of-living increase in Social Security payments since passage of last year's Veterans Administration pension reform bill will affect more than 2.5 million VA pensioners in a variety of ways, Jack Coker, Waco VA Regional Office Director, said recently.

The increase will bring a 9.9 percent boost in monthly payments for approximately 100,000 veterans and their beneficiaries enrolled under the new pension plan. For those who chose to remain under the old pension plan
