# **Auto Industry Shows** Way to Revival

When famine comes and food is not to be had, an animal has to live on the fat which he stored up in the good days of plenty. Likewise with an industrial corporation; Gold." With simple beauty and in hard times it must draw on the surplus laid up in good

Nowhere was this done to a much greater extent than in the American automobile industry. The giants of that trade entered the depression with full war chests; as a result, they were able to carry on in very fair shape, and and of the abundant life one may Bryan. although they did cut production and production costs have through trusting Jesus. they provided a pretty substantial amount of employment in the lean years.

Now, of course, the swing is the other way again, and it is worth while to look at a few figures.

At the end of 1928, before the depression struck, the five principal automobile companies (exclusive of Ford) had current assets of 464,557,000. By the end of 1932, these assets had dwindled to \$302,773,000. Today, according to the Wall Street Journal, \$545,645,000.

These figures will stand a little consideration. In the first place, the auto industry has been the bellwether for that section of industry which believes in gaining profits through a wide volume of business carried on at a comparatively low profit margin. It has never relied on a protective tariff or on mutual agreements to keep prices up. It has pioneered in passing on to the consumer the production savings made possible by technological im-

Furthermore, since the end of the depression (assuming, for the sake of argument, that the depression actually is over) the auto industry has been the scene of a great unionization drive. The great producers have been signed to union contracts. Pay scales have been raised. Along with this, the prices of raw materials have gone up.

Yet the price the consumer pays for a new auto has gone up only a little. It seems fair to say that the auto people have boosted prices reluctantly and moderately. They have not, in other words, been in a great rush to pass increased costs along to the public.





NATION NEEDS RELIGIOUS HOMES Text: Deuteronomy 6:4-5; 11:18-25

Hebrew scriptures would seem to be almost unique in the ancient world in the high idealism that they attached to family relationships. # Painter Turns to Beer Stein Repair

By United Press NEW ORLEANS.-In a small workshop in the rear of his home Frank Galliano, former boxer, painter and soldier, daily works at an unusual occupation-mend-

ing broken beer steins. By means of a specially pre-pared cement, and an ingenious filing machine fashioned from a pair of shears and a few boards, Galliano and his wife, Anna, turn out weekly approximately 200 restored beer glasses.

Strict silence is observed during the operation in what he calls the 'Original Beer Stein Hospital." The first step is to file even the broken edges of the glass with his special filing machine, then place the stein on a table where a new base is glued on

A few days of drying in the rack and then the glass goes back to its owner, secure against ice tub, paming beer and dishwater.

"It all started several years ago when I used to paint signs in beer parlors," Galliano said. "I won lered what they did with all the rokėn glasses.

Then the idea struck him and he fashioned his own tools. Gradually he improved his methods until now he handles business not only from New Orleans but from many South Mississippi towns.

"I haven't found a stein yet I ouldn't repair," he boasted.



# Painter Turns to Beer Stein Repair

NEW ORLEANS .- In a small orkshop in the rear of his home Frank Galliano, former boxer, painter and soldier, daily works at an unusual occupation-mending broken beer steins.

By means of a specially pre pared cement, and an ingenious filing machine fashioned from a pair of shears and a few boards, Galliano and his wife, Anna, turn out weekly approximately 200 restored beer glasses.

Strict silence is observed during the operation in what he calls the "Original Beer Stein Hospital." The first step is to file even the broken edges of the glass with his special filing machine, then place the stein on a table where a new base is glued on.

A few days of drying in the rack and then the glass goes back to its owner, secure against ice tub, foaming beer and dishwater.
