Japan to Conquer China
If there is one American who is entitled to be heard
in connection with the tangled situation in the Far East,
it is former Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson.
Mr. Stimson was some six years ahead of President
Roosevelt in the belief that this country should take peace-
ful but effective measures to restrain the Japanese militar-
ists, Unfortunately, the British let him down with a dull
thud when he tried to translate his belief into action, and
his effort to preserve peace and the sanctity of treaties in
the Orient falled.
But he knows the Chinese-Japanese situation as few
Americans know it; and when he wrote a lengthy letter
to the New York Times the other day, setting forth his
ideas on the course America ought to follow, he said some
things which all Americans ought to ponder.
No one, says Mr. Stimson, can argue that we should send
troops and wasships to the Orient to resfrain the Japanese
invasion by force. The American people would never con-
sent to such a step; even if they did, China must work
out her own salvation, and her problem cannot be solved
by outside intervention.
But that, he continues, does not mean that we must fold
(ur hands and passively watch the Japanese complete
