Seed of that happy phenomenon, Thanksgiving, was sown back in the legendary days of our earliest settlers when, around the third Thursday of one cold, snowy November, they came to the conclusion that their half a loaf was better than none-and gathered to praise the

By grace of public proclamation and a national weakness for turkey, that earnest little beginning has grown into a custom of sturdy proportions.

And as a custom, it is such a good one that it stirs conjecture of what might happen if it lasted the year around.

Imagine all the cliques and classes, all the social and economic subdivisions of the nation giving up their private ambitions in order to keep the Thanksgiving spirit at high tide for, say, 12 whole months.

Strife and turmoil would disappear magically. The labor wars would fold up and collapse; there would be no more high tax worries, no more carping at Nazis and Communists. There would be no concern over Japan's war on China, or the high cost of living, or the neighbor's roving chickens, or Siwash's fifth football defeat of the year.

In plainer words, life would be just too nice, too sweetly smooth to be real in a modern era which requires lots of realism-and the ability to fight back when it's called for

Today's human beings aren't striving merely for enough corn and meat to carry them through a hard winter. They have to contend, as well, with a welter of newpolitical, economic and social schemes which may remold life vir tually over a week-end.





COLLEGE STATION - Cattle umbers and the purchasing pow er of cattle follow cycles varying from 4 to 6 years in length, ac cording to W. E. Morgan, econo mist of the Extension Service division of Texas A. & M. College

When the purchasing power of cattle is high, production is stimulated, and cattle numbers in crease, Morgan points out. the other hand, when purchasing power is low, production is cur

In 920, there were about 49 million head of cattle in the U.S. Morgan says. In that year a steel was worth, in terms of what the ranchman could buy with the pro-ceeds of the sale, 79 per cent as much as it was in the years 1910 to 1914. In 1930, 10 years later there were 38 million head of cattle in the country and a steer was
