

# Trash and light fees go up

Dimmitt's aldermen Monday night approved increases in city trash pick-up fees and Southwestern Public Service Co.'s electricity rates.

53rd Year - No. 30

Starting with the May 1 billings, city trash collection fees will go from \$2 to \$3.50 per month for residential service, from \$5 to \$8 for commercial small-container service, and from \$10 to \$15 for commercial large-container pick-ups.

And beginning June 1, SPS's electricity rates will go up an average of 11.1%, with residential customers paying 14% more-pending the expected approval of the state's Public Utility Commission.


The city hiked its trash collection fees to bring the Garbage Dept.'s income more into line with its expenses. Garbage Dept. income from the old fees during the coming year were projected at \$56,652, but city officials could foresee expenditures of \$91,505 for the department in salaries, equipment maintenance, etc.

As indicated by letters, on page 10, a number of our readers feel that we have been negligent or derelict, in the performance of our duties as a community newspaper. For the 37 years that we have published this newspaper we have always championed all of the movements and endeavors designed to promote the betterment and development of our county and area, and we will continue to do so as best we can.

We are not writing a editor's note in response to each letter, but will try to explain our limitations in covering and assessing the news. We have to determine what is news and in what manner our media can be of maximum service to the community. In the case of the Castro County Constitutional Seminar conducted by Dr. Cleon Skousen of the Freeman Institute, we felt that the use of the news columns for publicizing the event three weeks prior to its being held was the best service we could render to its sponsors. That

we gladly did. We didn't deem it advisgive a detailed account of the seminar. The number of business will justify. That is just a matter of economics that applies to any business. There is no way that we could have had a reporter in place during all of the sessions of the seminar that took up the better part of two days. There were any number of events taking place during that time that it was our duty to cover and report.

To have done a creditable job on any type of seminar, running as many hours as the one held here Friday and Saturday, a staff member would have been tied up the better part of a working week. That is something that a small newspaper can't afford. Factual reporting, to have done justice to the seminar, would have required a resume from the time the lectures started until they were finished. 





Because of this shortfall of contributions, United Way has been unable to provide Kids, Inc. with its requested amount the past two years. This year, Kids, Inc. found itself unable to meet its projected financial commitments with the funds it was due to receive.

The directors of Kids, Inc. decided that one way to help it meet these needs was to assign player fees in the various sports. This is already done in most area towns. Hereford charges \$15 for its player fee. Lubbock charges a \$10 fee. Some towns charge much more.

Some people have asked why Kids, Inc. doesn't have a fund-raising drive. As a member of United Way, Kids, Inc. is not supposed to have a separate fund drive. If it did, there would be no need for United Way. At present there are several drives underway locally. These include Boy Scouts, American Cancer Society, March of Dimes and St. Jude's Childrens Hospital. I may have overlooked one or two others. Kids, Inc. has other sources of income it depends on each year to help pay its expenses. It has sponsors that help pay the expense of the uniforms each year. The signs on the fences in the ball parks require a yearly fee for each of the advertisers using them. These sponsors and advertisers call it advertising but, in reality, they are donating money to help Kids, Inc. A fund drive would involve asking these same firms

to raise the necessary money this year. If the community supports and helps the United

# **UETERAN'S SERUICES**

#### Concerning pension overments:

Many veterans and widows of veterans are now learning that they were paid larger disability or death pension benefits in 1979 than they were actually entitled to receive. These pension benefits are paid by the Veterans Administration to eligible wartime veterans and to the unremarried spouses of such

Most cases involving the overpayments are occurring where a veteran or widow elected to change from an old pension to the new one which went into effect Jan. 1, 1979. Under the old pension laws administered by the Veterans Administration, certain types of income were not counted, and there were certain percentages of some income which were disregarded. Under the new pension law, provided by Public Law 95-588, practically all types of income are counted when determining pension eligibility. In addition, the new law calls for "family income," where

dividual veteran or widow.

Under the new pension law, it is important that claimants keep the VA advised of any change in their income. This applies to all types of Social Security.

Under the new law, VA the current cost of living index, and when Social Sebenefits are also increased. Thus, the VA knows when Social Security benefits are law authorizes free medical increased, so a claimant is not required to advise the VA of income picture.

Since all other types of income are counted by the VA, with the exception of Supplemental Security Income (SSI), it is the claimant's responsibility to notify the VA when income is increased. Under the law, the necessary change in payment rates of VA pension must be taken on the first day of the month following the date on which the income was increased. Thus, if the VA is not notified immediately, an overpayment will be created in the VA pension account, and future benefits will be withheld until the account is cleared.

All new pension law recipients should be certain to notify the VA immediately when their income is increas-







food safe Prevent food poisoning as you buy, cook and serve food, advises Mary K. Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Extension Service.

Keep your

When you must care for food in a hurry, keep food cold, and keep food clean, Mrs. Sweeten advises.

Keeping foods hot is important because most germs that cause food poisoning are killed by boiling, broiling or roasting foods.

Never leave foods at room temperature longer than two hours because that allows germs to multiply in large numbers.

Keeping foods 40 degrees F. or below prevents germs from multiplying very fast, the specialist continues.

Store meat, poultry, eggs, milk and cheese in the refrigerator.

At the supermarket, always pick up highly perishable foods last, take them home and store in the refrigerator or freezer quickly.


The refrigerator life of meat varies from one to seven days with the highly perishable meats keeping only one or two days in the refrigerator and the nitrite-cured meats keeping up to a week.

Don't buy food in dented cans or cracked jars even if they are on sale. Never taste food which has a foul order, Mrs. Sweeten cautions. At home, keep utensils and

work areas in the kitchen clean and pets out of the kitchen.

If anyone does become sick with food poisoning, see your doctor. Tell the doctor how you stored, cooked and served food in the last few days.


But by the time the field narrowed down to the championship heat Saturday, they were back together in adjoining lanes, finishing 1-2 to make a clean sweep of the event.


Cleveland also captured the regional championship in the 100-meter dash with a time of 12.52. And Benton finished third in the long jump with a leap of 16-11.





So, while the savings account would have been depleted in less than three years, Social Security retirement benefits would

have continued until death. In addition, based on the worker's contribution, various dependents and survivors are able to receive benefits. These dependents include wives, children and, in some cases, parents. Even after the worker's death, surviving dependents can continue to receive a percentage of the original benefit. 



# Growing tomatoes? **Follow these tips**

plants can be a fascinating common diseases. and rewarding venture, or it can be frustrating.

for the first time, a few pointers can help you avoid some common pitfalls, says Dr. Sam Cotner, Extension Service horticulturist.

First, don't grow tomatoes unless you have an area that receives sunlight for at least six hours during the day.

Next, good soil is a must. Oftentimes, garden soil is poor but can be improved with the right amount of organic matter and fertilizer.

Select a variety of tomatoes with the maximum resistance to common diseases, advises Cotner. Bonus, Big Set, Better Boy, Spring Giant and Floramerica all carry multiple






