Nun's retirement saddens community

As the 1987-88 school year draws to a close, so will a chapter in the history of the Nazareth school system. It's an ending that saddens the residents of this small Catholic community.

Sister Herman Joseph is leaving her classroom for good.

After teaching more than 600 students during the past 33 years, Sister Herman Joseph Berkemeyer, a Benedictine nun who teaches first grade at Nazareth, will retire.

In some way, small or large, she has touched the lives of almost every person in Nazareth, and news of her retirement has been met with sadness and pleas to "stay just one more year."

"In two more years I'll be 80," Sister Herman Joseph said. After a

brief pause and sigh she added, "I feel tired. I guess it's time to go because my health isn't very good anymore."

"Someone heard about my retirement and said, 'Why not stay here (after retiring) and do substitute teaching?' I don't think I would like it. If I couldn't teach my class I just wouldn't want to go back."

The decision to retire was not an easy one, and she is reluctant to retire, according to Sister Adrian Wewers, second grade teacher at Nazareth who has worked and lived with Sister Herman Joseph for 20 years.

"It's going to be hard for her to accept the fact that she won't be teaching next year," Sister Adrian said.

"Last year she was considering

retiring, but decided against it. I remember that at the time she (Sister Herman Joseph) said 'If Ronald Reagan can run this country at 77 years of age and take care of the whole United States, I can take care of my 23 kids'," Sister Adrian said.

Born Christine Sinobia Berkemeyer on Oct. 11, 1910 at St. Vincent, Ark., Sister Herman Joseph entered St. Scholastica's Convent in Fort Smith, Ark., on Nov. 4, 1928. She made her final profession of vows on June 24, 1934.

Sister Herman Joseph began teaching when she was 18 years old at St. Vincent's Orphanage in Arkansas. After 17 years there, she left and taught in Fayetteville, Ark., for four years before moving to Na-

135 to graduate

The county's three high schools will graduate 135 seniors tonight (Thursday) and Friday.

Texas Railroad Commissioner Kent Hance will be the featured speaker at Dimmitt High School's graduation Friday night at 8 in the school's auditorium. The valedictory address will be given by Greg Gentry with Chanin Ross deliver-

ing the salutatory speech. 76 students will graduate.

A 1961 graduate of Dimmitt High School, Hance is a former state senator and US Congressman. He was an unsuccessful candidate for the US Senate and governor. Hance is drawing national attention because of recent attendance at meetings of the organization of

Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC)—an unprecedented move for any US oil industry spokesman—and for his push for a national energy policy.

Hart High School will graduate 36 seniors tonight (Thursday) at 8 at the Hart School Auditorium. Jaime Lopez will deliver the salutatory address and will join Cynthia George in reading the class history. Daniel Lacy will deliver the valedictory address. Awards will be presented by William E. Ammons, principal.

In Nazareth Friday night, 23 seniors will graduate at 8 in the Nazareth school cafeteria. Stacy Albracht will deliver the valedictory speech and Barbie Steffens will give the salutatory address. Msgr. Harold Waldow, former pastor of Holy Family Catholic Church in Nazareth, pastor at St. Laurence Cathedral in Amarillo, will be the featured speaker.

Final vote set on annexation

Annexation of 3.8 acres for construction of a 24-unit housing complex for senior citizens faced no opposition at the two public hearings this week, and it will come up for a vote at the June 20 meeting of the Dimmitt Aldermen.

Located on the east side of Northwest Fifth Street, the property was recommended for multi-family dwelling status by the City Zoning Board earlier this month.

S&S Properties of San Marcos is the developer of the project.

Broken telephone cable led to discovery

Every time there's a heavy rain, you can expect that stretch of unpaved road that runs down the southern slope of the Frio Draw to wash out.

That's what it did during the spring of 1987. Rainwater rushing toward the draw carved tons of earth out of the road and its adjoining ditches. Some of the erosion cuts were four or five feet deep.

During the night, the erosion caused a bad accident when a car plunged into one of the cuts. In addition to the damage and injuries caused by the accident, the car cut an underground telephone cable that had been exposed by the erosion.

That's what brought Stanley Wilcox to the site. Wilcox, a serviceman for West Texas Rural Telephone Co-op in Hereford, was tracing and rerouting the underground cable when he came upon one of the most curious sights he had ever seen.

Lying exposed in the ditch running along the west side of the road was a cluster of gigantic teeth.

"There were eight of them in a row, and each tooth was eight to 10 inches long, about four inches wide and about 5/8 of an inch thick," Wilcox said.

"The enamel on them was so good that I knew they had to be teeth. But I showed them to several people—I hauled them around in my pickup for two weeks—and they'd say, 'Naw, those aren't teeth.'

"So I got hold of Stan Fry (a Hereford dentist) and showed them to him, and he said, 'They're definitely teeth.' He kept one of them that was loose and separated from the rest.

"The teeth weren't in a jawbone. It was just a

cluster of them stuck together. I guess it was just sediment holding them together."

Wilcox sent the rest of the teeth to Dr. Jack Hughes in Canyon, professor emeritus of archeology at West Texas State University. He also contacted Dennis Lomas, who had helped unearth several prehistoric animals near Portales and Clovis. Dr. Hughes and Lomas both were fairly sure the teeth were those of a mastodon.

Later, Wilcox—who was raised in Dimmitt—told his cousin, Don Moke, about his find. At the next meeting of the Castro County Historical Museum Association, Moke mentioned it to Lon Woodburn, association president.

"Lon Woodburn and H. C. Nelson came out and talked to me about it, and I took them and showed them right where I found the teeth, and we flagged the spot," Wilcox recalled. "Lon also went over to Stan Fry's office and took a picture of the tooth he had."

"H. C. and I also intended to go to Canyon and see those other teeth," Woodburn said, "but H. C. died that September, and that sorta killed the whole thing for me. H. C. and I were pretty close, and after he died I just sort of put the whole thing out of my mind."

The mammoth might not have been found had a group of Italian men not decided to visit the site of the old Hereford POW Camp, where they had been prisoners during World War II.

After learning that the Italians would be here the latter part of April, the Castro County Historical Commission pushed ahead on one of its projects, the restoration of the memorial prayer chapel near the

camp. They wanted at least to get it cleaned up before the Italian visitors got here. The commission called in Eddie Guffee, director of the Llano Estacado Museum in Plainview, to supervise the project. Woodburn volunteered to help.

The spot where Wilcox had found those massive teeth was just two miles southwest of the POW camp. After Woodburn met Guffee, he remembered the teeth.

So, a month ago, on April 25, Woodburn took Guffee to the spot.

"They had just poured the new concrete apron around the chapel, and Eddie and I were driving up that road in the pickup," Woodburn said. "I think we were going to lunch, or had just been to lunch. When we got to that spot, I told him, 'Right over there is where that boy found those teeth.' We stopped and got out, and right off of the road where we stopped, Eddie saw the tip of that tusk, and boy, his eyes bugged out!"

After completing their work at the chapel that afternoon, Guffee and Woodburn borrowed a spade from Larry Sadler and started digging out around the tusk.

Guffee said he didn't dare expect to find more than a piece of tusk, "but the more we dug, the more elephant we had."

After digging down to where the tusk joined the skull, they realized they had a rare find. They covered up the artifact and vowed to keep the discovery secret for the time being.

"You can't go broadcasting something like that, for obvious reasons," Guffee said. "There are procedures

that have to be followed."

For three evenings, after finishing their day's work at the chapel, Guffee and Woodburn—aided by Harley Dyer on the second day and by George Bagwell on the third—kept digging farther, following the tusk to the skeletal tusk-cap, then uncovering the second tusk, and finally digging down to the skull. Each evening they would cover the hole back up.

Guffee notified the Texas Historical Commission that he had a confirmed archeological discovery and was about to excavate, and that the finding was on public land. That brought it under the jurisdiction of the Texas Antiquities Committee.

"Of course, the problem everywhere was no money," Guffee said. "Nobody had any money to pay for a dig. You know what the legislature has done on appropriations."

Still, Mark Denton of Austin, staff archeologist with the Antiquities Committee, came to help. En route, he picked up an excavation team in Lubbock—Ron Ralph and Barbara Bertucio, who were working on the Lubbock Lake Landmark Historical Site; Bryan Small and Ted Hartwell of The Museum of Texas Tech; and Allison Young, a graduate student in museum science at Tech. All of them joined the dig out of curiosity or for professional experience—which means they donated their time.

The excavation team started digging Friday, May 13, working most of the day to enlarge the area of the dig and mark off the site in 30-inch squares. That evening, the team gave the go-ahead to "go public" with it the following day.

NISD approves transfer students

The Nazareth School Board met May 11 and agreed to accept transfers as presented subject to state approval, payment of all current lunchroom bills, class overflow and exemplary behavior.

The board said that any transfer student who creates discipline problems will immediately be dropped from the rolls and will be required to seek entry into their own school district.

They adopted a policy prohibiting the wearing of tennis shoes by students who attend formal school functions and graduation and/or promotion exercises.

Bernie Tackitt gave a report on the bank and the board approved

his budget, in the amount of \$5,800, for the 1988-89 school year. The band and Tackitt were commended for their excellence this year.

Mary Jane "Candy" Jones was hired as the new fourth grade teacher while Sandra Nelson will move from fourth grade to first grade and Brenda Shipley will transfer from remedial reading to kindergarten.

In other action, the board canvassed the election returns and approved them as presented. J.C. Pohlmeier was re-elected as president, Mary Lynn Olvera was named secretary and Alphonse Kleman was chosen as vice president.

70% of DHS grads will attend college

Of Dimmitt High School's 77 graduates this year, 37 plan to enroll in four-year colleges and universities and 17 will go to two-year colleges. That's 70% of the class.

Three others will enter trade or vocational schools, eight will go into military service and the remaining 12 will seek employment after their high school graduation, according to DHS Counselor John Thomas.

By percentages, 48% of the class will go to four-year colleges or universities, 22% will go to two-year colleges, 16% will seek employment, 10% will enter military service and 4% will go to trade or vocational schools, Thomas said.

Texas Tech is the most popular choice among universities, with 15 DHS grads planning to enroll there. Other university choices are West Texas State, 9; Texas A&M, 4; Wayland Baptist, 3; Angelo State, 2; Lubbock Christian, 2; Abilene Christian, 1; and Stephen F. Austin, 1.

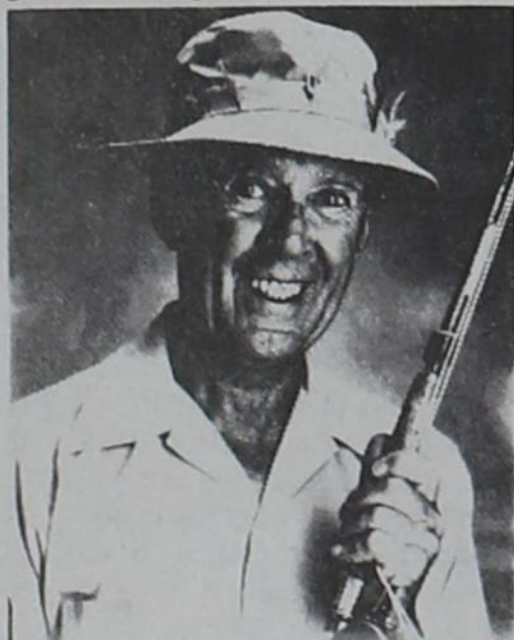
Most popular choice among two-year colleges is South Plains at Levelland, which will get 10 of this year's DHS grads. Three others will attend Frank Phillips College at Borger, Amarillo College, Clarendon College, San Antonio College and Howard College will get one DHS grad each this fall.

Among trade and vocational schools, one grad will attend Texas State Technical Institute in Amarillo, one will go to cosmetology school and one will attend Texas Schools, Inc.

Of the eight DHS grads planning to enter military service, seven will go into the Army and one into the Navy.

As to their career goals, this year's DHS graduates are targeting 12 different occupational categories. Thirteen plan careers in business and management, nine in mechanics and repair, eight in education, eight in health and medical technology, seven in scientific and technology occupations, six in communications and arts, five in social services, three in marketing and sales, three in service occupations (food, personal, protective, etc.), three in clerical work and one in industrial production. Only two are planning careers in agriculture and none in construction, Thomas said. Nine of this year's graduates (12% of the class) are undecided about their future career choices.

We are fortunate to have Eddie Guffee who was willing to dig with no thought of compensation. Mark Denton and Ron Ralph will receive a salary from the state. The rest were volunteers. The students from Tech were glad to have the opportunity and experience.

DHS scholarships top \$50,000 mark

Dimmitt High School seniors received more than \$50,000 in scholarships during the school's annual Awards Assembly last Thursday.

DHS Counselor John Thomas said \$21,000 of the scholarship funds were generated locally through organizations, trusts and memorials, while \$29,850 came from colleges, universities, foundations and other "outside" sources.

Many of the scholarships awarded are renewable, making them worth up to four times their face value if the recipients meet certain requirements, such as maintaining a minimum grade average, staying in a certain course of study, etc.

Thomas noted that the scholarship total was the equivalent of more than \$650 per graduate. DHS has 78 graduating seniors this year.

During the scholarship-awarding segment of the Awards Assembly, Principal Alex Glass praised Thomas for his efforts in seeking out scholarships and endowments and helping DHS students apply and qualify for them.

Thomas in turn gave credit to local families, organizations and contributors for providing a generous local base of support for worthy students who want to further their education or training beyond high school.

"A scholarship fund is a great way to memorialize a person," Thomas commented. Nine of the local scholarships and several of those from outside sources were made possible by memorial funds.

The biggest scholarships went to: —Valedictorian Greg Gentry (Robert C. Byrd Honor Scholarship, \$1,500).

[Byrd Scholarships are funded by Congress, and Texas recipients are chosen by the Texas Colleges and Universities Coordinating Board. Thomas said 2,000 Texas honor students applied for Byrd Scholarships this year, and 340 were awarded.]

—Toni Gabel (Texas FHA-C. J. Davidson Scholarship, \$1,500, renewable four years).

—Pam Anthony (Dimmitt Young Farmers' Dana Wall Memorial Scholarship, \$1,000, renewable four years).

—Laura Waggoner and Patrick Killingsworth (Lubbock Christian University Scholarships, \$2,500 each).

—Warren McDonald (Frank

Phillips College Basketball Scholarship, \$3,500).

—Beth Miller (South Plains College C. M. Sanders Scholarship, \$2,000).

—Michael Cole (Wayland Baptist University Science Scholarship, \$1,000).

—Reagan Frye, Denise Schulte and Jayme Cotton (Easter Lions Club Scholarships, \$1,000 each).

The biggest local scholarship donor this year was the First United Methodist Church, which awarded \$4,800 worth—\$400 each to 12 seniors. The Methodist scholarships may be used at any college or university, and are renewable annually, subject to review.

Gentry, Schulte and Cary Buchanan received the most scholarships (five each), while Scott Sava received four and Anthony, salutatorian Chanin Ross, Jerry McMillon and Ricky Zimmer received three each. Four other seniors—Gabel, Frye, Waggoner and Jeremy Warren—received two apiece. Twenty-three seniors were single-scholarship winners.

Two DHS juniors also were named scholarship winners at the awards assembly. Aaron Odum and Kelly Goolsby both were awarded Wayland Baptist University Science Scholarships, Odum's valued at \$1,000 and Goolsby's at \$300, based on their showings at the Regional Science Fair this year.

Also, two former students who already are attending college were awarded scholarships. Tammy Ross Robb was named the recipient of the Koma Ratcliff Memorial Scholarship this year, and Todd Durham received a scholarship from the South Plains Industrial Arts Association.

FmHA taking emergency farm loan applications

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by freeze, hail, rain, flooding, high winds and lightning are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office in Dimmitt.

Castro County is one of 40 counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from bad weather conditions.

Dean Sanders, FmHA county supervisor, said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5%.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30% loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Sanders

said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their losses.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until Dec. 29, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Sanders said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the USDA authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are US Citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which US citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Dimmitt is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Farm commodity marketing series set

The Castro County Extension Agricultural Committee will sponsor a marketing series for three consecutive weeks in June.

The series will be held one night a week from 7 to 10 p.m. for three consecutive weeks at the assembly

room in the county courthouse.

The first program, scheduled for June 6, will feature an overview of marketing alternatives by Jackie Smith, district ag Extension economist and the basics of the future's market, presented by Richard Dachenberg of Dean Witter Reynolds in Lubbock.

Producers may attend the entire marketing series or just a segment of the series they may be interested in, said Ralston.

 zareth in 1953.
 "In those days (1950's) Mother Superior told us where we would go. I remember there were three places I did not want to go and Nazareth was one of them," Sister Herman Joseph said.
 "I'd heard about the Dust Bowl and high winds and I did not want to come here," she said.
 However, as high winds howled outside the Benedictine Convent in Nazareth Sunday morning, Sister Herman Joseph added, "But I like it here. I like this place better than anyplace I've been. I'll never regret coming here. I've enjoyed it. I've been here longer than any other place and when I leave here it's going to be like leaving home."
 In 1962, She was diagnosed with cancer and was given only six weeks to six months to live. That was more than 25 years ago.
 "I really attribute my cure to a Dominican priest I met when I was

in St. Anthony's Hospital at Amarillo," she said. "He came in before I had my surgery and said he was going to Rome for St. Martin de Pour's canonization. 'I'll remember you when I'm there.'
 "I really believe that my cure was due to his prayers and St. Martin. When I don't feel good, I still recouse to St. Martin," she added.
 After successfully battling the cancer, she returned to Nazareth and to her first grade class.
 She will be witnessing some of her second-generation students graduate from high school this year.
 "You know, I looked out over the graduating class this morning (Sunday at Baccalaureate) and picked out some of my pupils. . . . It makes me feel good — old, but good," she said.
 "Each class is special to me," she said with a smile on her face. "I remember one little girl in my class

went home and told her mother that if anything ever happened to her, she wanted me to be her mother!
 "This year all of my kids wrote me a letter. They said 'I don't want you to leave.' You know, it's really special. I'm going to keep those letters. That makes you feel good—to know that you're wanted."
 Sister Herman Joseph revealed that the one thing she really enjoyed the most is the children she has taught, because "they go to school to learn."
 She believes in teaching the basics — reading, writing and arithmetic—when the children are just starting to learn.
 "I have tried to stress reading to my students," she said. "If they can't read, they can't do anything else. I think first graders should learn to read so later on they can read to learn. They can't even work arithmetic if they can't read because there are so many problems and signs.

"Today we have to teach so much in the first grade," she said with a resigned sigh. "We have health, science, social studies. . . . I think the most important thing is reading, writing, arithmetic and spelling—the language arts. For a while that's what we taught."
 Her efforts to instill in her students the desire to read and learn is appreciated by teachers who have her students later on.
 "Personally, I will miss her so much because I know her students will be able to read when they get to my class," said Sister Adrian.
 Nazareth Supt. Johnny Mason also praised Sister Herman Joseph's efforts.
 "She's a tremendous teacher, probably the best first grade teacher I've ever had. She has really been a positive force in starting these kids out," Mason said.
 The City of Nazareth officially showed its appreciation of her in 1981, when Mayor John Slavik signed a proclamation designating March 1 as *Sister Herman Joseph Day* "in appreciation for and acknowledgement of the deep, heartfelt gratitude and thanks for the leadership and example that she has shown over the years. . . ."
 Sister Herman Joseph plans to return to the St. Scholastica Convent to retire. She's uncertain of what she will do, but says she may try to help adult illiterates.
 "My superior wrote and said there is a crying need for teachers to teach adult illiterates. You have to take a course in that, you don't just begin teaching. If I'm needed, I'll take the course, but I don't really know what I'm going to do now," she said.
 Next fall when the bell sounds opening the 1988-89 school year, Sister Herman Joseph won't be teaching the first grade class the *Three R's*. The new first graders won't notice the difference. But everyone else in the school will.

 Nora Martinez reported Friday



 So Saturday, May 14 was the first day that the public or the press got to see what was going on in that bar-ditch 2-1/2 miles inside the Castro County line.
 By the time the skull was completely excavated, jacketed in burlap and plaster of paris and lifted out of the pit Monday evening, thousands had seen it, including most of the school children from Dimmitt and Hereford.
 Loaded onto a hay mattress on Don Moke's flatbed trailer, the mammoth skull spent Monday night in the Precinct 3 barn just west of the Easter intersection. The next day Guffee towed it to Plainview.
 "I drove about 15 miles an hour all the way," Guffee said. "I didn't dare shake it around too much. Through the rear-view mirror I could see a clod on

one of the timbers of the base support. I used that clod as a gauge. It never rolled off of that timber all the way to Plainview."
 Friday morning—after the artifact had spent two nights in a Wayland Baptist University barn—Krusse & Sons donated a crane to lift the 3,000-lb. package from the truck bed and deposit it in the basement of the Llano Estacado Museum.
 "That skull looked big enough out in the open," Guffee remarked, "but in the museum basement, it's huge—it's as big as a cow."
 Castro County had its first major archeological discovery. And it was safely tucked away.
 (Next week: We've caught a really big one. Now, what are we gonna do with it?)

Insect scouting workshop planned

Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in the area are urged to attend the annual High Plains Insect Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The first of two workshop sessions will focus on early and mid-season pests and will be held Friday, June 3, at the Ollie Limer Agricultural Center in Plainview. The center is on the US 87 business route south of the city.

The second session is scheduled for July 6 in Plainview, and will cover mid- to late-season crop pests in this area.

Conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the workshop was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs conducted by the Extension Service.

Since then, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields

for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yields.

The June 3 workshop will begin at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. Pat Morrison, Extension entomologist, outlining the scope of the training, general concepts of pest management and sampling. Aspects of pesticide safety will be presented by Mike Blanton of Farwell, Extension agent/pest management.

Dr. Jim Leser, Extension entomologist, will open the cotton pest section with information on thrips and beneficial insects. Cotton fleahoppers will be discussed by Mark Brown, Extension agent/entomology headquartered at Crosbyton. Dr. James Supak will present information on growth and development of cotton plants.

Allen Knutson of Dimmitt and Greg Cronholm of Plainview, both Extension agents/entomology, will provide information on early and mid-season pests of corn, sorghum, soybeans and sunflowers. Major plant diseases of South Plains crops

will be discussed by Dr. Harold Kaufman, Extension plant pathologist.

The workshop will conclude at noon with a hands-on session in

which participants will learn how to determine the percent square set on potted cotton plants and will identify insect specimens. Handouts will be available.

County will air-condition Expo Building

The Expo Building will be air-conditioned this summer.

The County Commissioners Court voted Monday to call for bids on proposals to adequately cool and vent the building with evaporative coolers.

The court also is working to move the Precinct 2 voting site from the courthouse basement to the Driver's License Office on the first floor of the courthouse.

Many voters in Precinct 2—the county's largest—have complained about the stairways required to get to the basement voting site, County Judge Polly Simpson said, and federal regulations require that all polls be accessible to those who cannot negotiate stairways.

The county's plan is to use the Driver's License Office as the polling place, and set aside the county judge's office and the commissioners' court room for vote-counting. The counting of absentee votes would be moved from the judge's office to the basement.

The Justice Dept. must approve the change, County Attorney Jimmy Davis said.

In other action Monday, the commissioners renewed a contract with KMK Computers for computer service, voted to join the Panhandle's 25 other counties in applying for federal funding for the Panhandle Region Narcotics Trafficking Task Force, and approved the transfer of \$2,625 to the Volunteer Firemen's Fund and \$1,000 to the Child Welfare Fund from the Charity Fund.
