**Q. What was the wording of the objectionable election provision in the 1869 constitution?**

A. It provided that "All elections for state, district and county officers shall be held at the county seat of the several counties, until otherwise provided by law; and the polls shall be open for four days, from eight o'clock a. m. until four o'clock p. m. of each day."

**Q. What had been the construction placed on the provision of the 1869 constitution and what did the Supreme Court hold in regard to it?**

A. The generally accepted opinion was that the entire provision was intended to govern only another method was provided by law. The Supreme Court ruled on Jan. 5, 1874, that the same provision divided it into two parts and only that part preceding the colon could be changed by legislation. Because of that decision Gov. 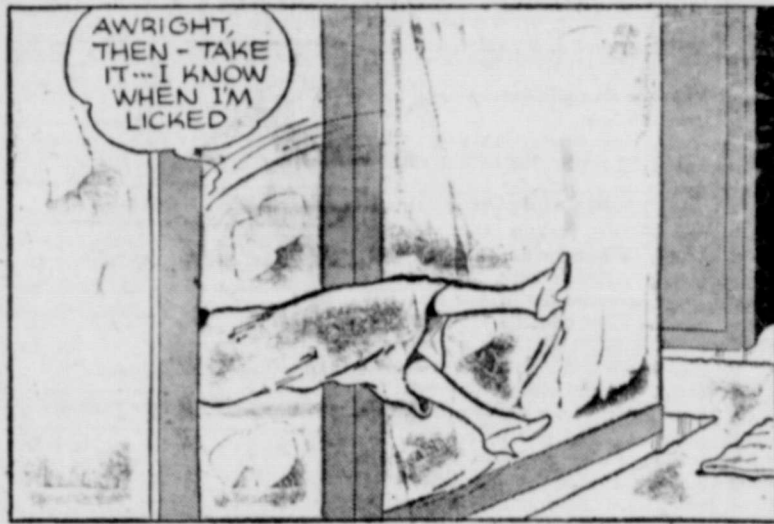

and pork, 2 cups whole corn, 1 can tomato paste, 1 can tomato soup, 1/2 lb. cheese. Onions in shortening, meat in shortening where softened. Cook noodles or until well done. Bake in layers, about 45 minutes.

**Vegetable Salad Bowl**

**With Dressing**  
1/2 lettuce, 4 shelled hard-boiled eggs, 2 peeled tomatoes, 1/4 cup sliced cooked onion, 1/4 cup sliced cooked cucumber, 1/4 cup sliced mixed pickles, 1/4 cup sliced olives, 6 radishes.

**Dressing**  
1/2 cup garlic bud, 1/2 cup salt, 1/2 cup tarragon vinegar, 1/2 cup prepared mustard, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon mayonnaise, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 salt, speck of pepper.

**Yellow Jacket Icing**  
1/2 cup Mrs. Tucker's shortening, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/2 cups Gold Chain flour, 1/2 teaspoon KC baking powder, 1/2 vanilla.

Cream shortening thoroughly. Add sugar gradually, creaming well after each addition. Add eggs one at a time, beat after each addition, until very light. Fold in flour and baking powder sifted together, add vanilla. Bake 350 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes.

**Icing**  
2 cups sugar, 1/4 cup corn syrup, 1/2 cup hot water.  
Cook to soft ball stage, then pour on the stiffly beaten yolks of 4 eggs. Continue to beat until begins to get fudgy, then add 3 tablespoons of cream and 1 teaspoon vanilla.

**Mix It Cake**  
1 cup Gold Chain flour, 1 cup sour cream, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon KC baking powder, 3 tablespoons cocoa, 2 eggs, speck of salt, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

**Honey Icing**  
1 cup honey, 2 egg whites, 1/4 teaspoon KC baking powder. Beat 10 minutes.

**Pastry**  
1 cup Mrs. Tucker's shortening, (creamed), 1/2 cup water, 1 teaspoonful salt, 3 cups Gold Chain flour, 1/2 teaspoon KC baking powder.

Measure flour after sifting. Blend dry ingredients thoroughly with creamed mixture. Place in refrigerator to ripen.

**Banana Pie**  
Filling: 2 ripe bananas, run through ricer, 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Stir through 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup broken nuts.

Beat 2 egg whites stiff, fold in banana mixture and pour in pie pan lined with pastry. Cook first 10 minutes at 450 degrees, reduce to 350 degrees to finish.

**Cherry Rolls**  
Sift together 1 1/2 cups of Gold Chain flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons KC baking powder. Cut in 2 tablespoons Mrs. Tucker's shortening, add 1/2 cup milk to make soft dough. Roll into a rectangle 1/4 inch thick. Cover with 2 cups drained cherries, roll as for jelly roll. Press edges together. Cut 1 1/2-inch slices. Place cut side down in greased pan. Boil 1 cup cherry juice, 1 cup water, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoonful Gold Chain flour, 1 minute, add 1 tablespoon

**Coffee Mousse**  
In double boiler, melt 1/4 lb. of sweet chocolate in 2 tablespoons very strong Admiration coffee infusion. Add 1/4 cup of confectioner's sugar and little by little, 1/4 lb. of butter, stirring well. Pour this mixture on the well-beaten yolks of 6 eggs and beat thoroughly. Fold in 6 egg whites beaten stiff. Top with whipped cream and cherry. Pile in your prettiest tall stem glasses and let chill in refrigerator.

**SECOND DAY'S PROGRAM**  
**Oven Fried Chicken**  
2 or 2 1/2 to 3 lb. chicken, 2 cups light cream or top milk, 2 cups finely sifted dried crumbs, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/4 teaspoon KC baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 4 tablespoons Mrs. Tucker's shortening.

Cut chicken as for fricasee. Dip each piece in light cream, then in crumbs mixed with salt and pepper and KC baking powder. Brown on all sides in hot shortening. Remove chicken to casserole, add remaining cream. Cook 350 degrees for 1 hour and 30 minutes or until tender. Uncover the last 15 minutes. Thicken gravy and serve over chicken.

**Broiled Fillets Mignon**  
Wipe fillets, lay on grill and broil. When partly done lay on a greased hot plank. Arrange potatoes to roses, stuffed tomatoes on the plank, finish in oven, then garnish with green beans and flowerlets of cauliflower dipped in cheese sauce.

**Kentucky Salad**  
1 1/2 tablespoons gelatin, in 1/4 cup cold water. Dissolve in 1/4 cup boiling water, then add 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 cup vinegar, 1/2 cup pineapple juice, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 tablespoon tarragon vinegar. Fold in 1/2 cup each of pineapple cubes and 1/2 cup celery. Serve on lettuce.

**Italian Cream Cake**  
6 eggs, beaten thick and light. Add gradually 2 cups sugar, 4 teaspoons lemon juice, continue beating. Sift and measure 2 cups Gold Chain flour, 2 teaspoons KC baking powder, add to mixture and beat again. Then add 12 tablespoons boiling milk, 1 teaspoon lemon extract. Bake in angel cake pan. When cold, cut into layers, fill with cream filling and decorate with whipping cream.

**English Cream**  
1 pint hot milk, 2 eggs or 4 yolks, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup Gold Chain flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla.  
Cook until like cream. Cool and spread between cake.

**Chocolate Ice Box Cake**  
Roll 1 lb. of vanilla wafers very fine, 1 pkg. sweet chocolate and 1 square bitter chocolate (melt-

ed). Beat 3 egg yolks, add 1 cup powdered sugar, add melted chocolate. Fold in 1 pint cream whipped and 3 egg whites beaten stiff, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Place crumbs in dish, then layers of chocolate mixture until pan is filled. Sprinkle crumbs on top. Place in refrigerator for several hours.

**Coffee Spice Cake**  
**With Mocha Filling**  
1/2 cup Mrs. Tucker's shortening, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup strong Admiration coffee, 2 cup Gold Chain flour, 2 teaspoons KC baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons mixed spices. Cook in layers 40 minutes.

**Mocha Filling**  
1 tablespoon butter, 1 cup con-

fectioner's sugar, 1 tablespoon cocoa, 2 tablespoons strong Admiration coffee, pinch of salt.  
Cream butter, add sugar, and coffee. Beat until very creamy and smooth.

**Lemon Cream Pie**  
Cream 2 1/2 tablespoons in 3 cups sugar. Beat into it lightly beaten egg yolks, grind 1 lemon, juice of 3 lemons, 1/2 cup thin cream, lastly the 1/2 beaten whites of 3 eggs, in pastry lined pie pan and for 10 minutes at 450 degrees, reduce to 350 degrees, cook firm. Sprinkle pie with two almonds.

**Tomato Biscuits**  
Sift 2 cups Gold Chain flour, 2 teaspoons KC baking powder. Blend 2 tablespoons Mrs. Tucker's shortening, 1 cup tomato soup, 1/4 cup milk.

Carefully mix together. Make into biscuits and bake 450 degrees for 12 minutes.

**Sponge Cake**  
6 eggs beaten until very light, slowly add 2 cups sugar, 4 teaspoons lemon juice and continue beating. Sift and measure 2 cups Gold Chain flour, 2 teaspoons KC baking powder, add to mixture still beating. Lastly, slowly add 12 tablespoons hot milk, 1 teaspoon lemon extract.

**Spice Cake**  
1/2 cup Mrs. Tucker's shortening, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 cup sour cream, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, nutmeg, allspice, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 2 cups Gold Chain flour, 2 teaspoons KC baking powder.

**Coffee Filling**  
2 tablespoons hot Admiration coffee, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 1/2 cups confectioner's sugar.

**THIRD DAY'S PROGRAM**  
Ham With Fruit-Nut Stuffing  
Stuffing: 4 cups braed cubes

(1/2 in), 1 cup honey, 1 cup crushed pineapple, 1 cup seedless raisins, 1 cup chopped nuts, 2 center cuts ham (thin).

Heat pineapple and pour over bread cubes. Add fruits, nuts and honey. Put stuffing between the slices of ham. Place in baking dish and cook until perfectly tender. Stud the fat with whole cloves. Garnish with fresh mint, pineapple and apricots filled with cooked raisins.

**Roast of Veal Jardiniere**  
6 lbs. veal rump, 1 large clove garlic, 1 bay leaf (minced), 1 good pinch rosemary, 1 good pinch thyme, 1 whole clove, 1 teaspoon salt, 3 or 4 pepper corns, 1/2 cup water.

Add water and seasoning. Cover and cook at low heat for 2 hours or until roast is very tender. Remove cover and add 1 1/2 cups carrots, 1/2 cup string beans, 1/2 cup green peas. After removing meat and vegetables, to your gravy add 2 tablespoons strong Admiration coffee. This adds to the flavor of the sauce.

**Fruit Cheese Glory**  
Take as much cottage cheese to serve as many as there are to be served. Add to the cheese a few tablespoons thick cream, 1 teaspoon sugar and salt lightly. Add to this finely cut dates, chopped figs, chopped preserved ginger (if you like it), 2 tablespoons chopped nuts. That goes in the lettuce bowl which is placed in the center of your cold platter. Arrange around this center piece orange slices, pineapple and halves

of pears. Serve a lemon French dressing with this delightful salad.

**Boston Cream Pie**  
1/2 cup Mrs. Tucker's shortening, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1 1/2 cups Gold Chain flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons KC baking powder, dash of salt. Cook in 2 layers at 374 degrees.

**Cream Filling**  
1/2 cup Gold Chain flour, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 cups thin cream, 2 eggs.  
Cook together until thick and creamy. Put between pie and top with whipped cream.

**Jelly Quick Cake With Lemon Sauce**

1 cup sugar, 2 cups Gold Chain flour, 2 teaspoons KC Baking Powder, 2 egg whites, 1/2 cup milk, grated rind of 1 lemon.

Sift flour and baking powder, dash to salt. Place egg whites in cup, fill cup to 3/4 full with soft butter. Remainder of cup with milk. Beat 4 or 5 minutes. Bake in small loaf. Serve hot with lemon sauce.

**Lemon Sauce**  
1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup butter, 2 egg yolks, juice and rind 1 lemon, 3 tablespoons boiling water, dash of nutmeg.

Cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Beat egg yolks until lemon colored, add to sugar and butter. Mix again. Then add lemon juice and rind and beat again. Add boiling water spoonful at the time, beating constantly. Cook over hot water until smooth and thick. Serve over cake.

**Malroco Tart**  
Line a pie tin with pastry. Mix together 2 cups grated apples, juice and grated rind of 1 lemon, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 2 whole eggs, 2 tablespoons melted butter, dash of salt, 1 cup of cream. Turn into plate. Set strips of pastry over top of filling in two directions. Bake until firm.

**KC Raisin Muffins**

until firm in your refrigerator. Slice with sharp knife. Serve on crisp lettuce and dressing.

Coffee Fluff

1 pint cream, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 cup cold milk. With this add 1 teaspoon gelatin dissolved. Pour 1 cup of hot admiration coffee, stir until thoroughly dissolved (do not thicken). When begins to thicken, fold in cream and sugar.

Cabbage Slaw

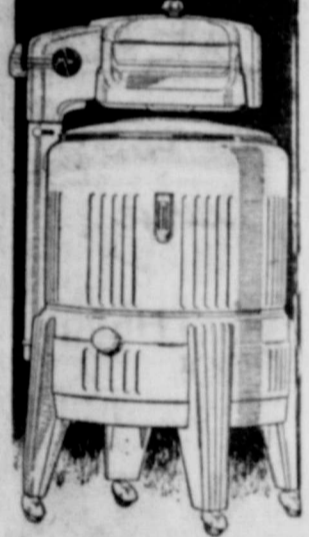

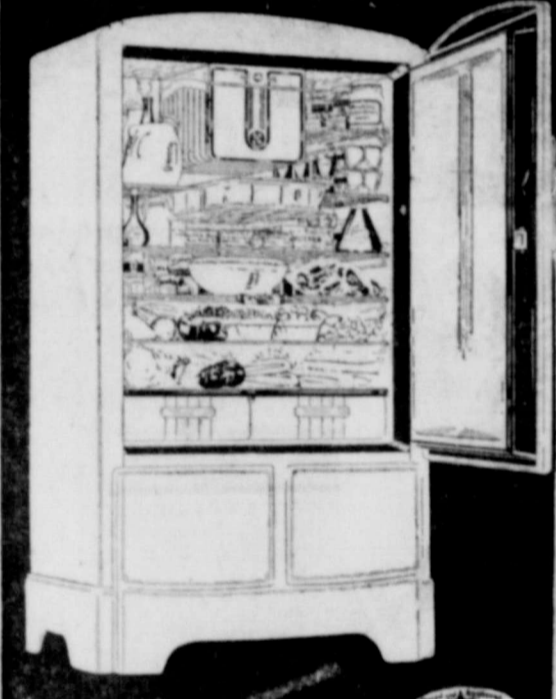

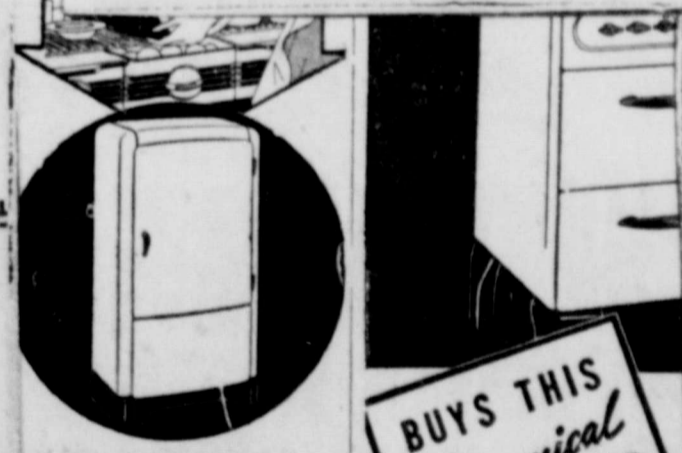

#### Tomato Biscuits

Sift 2 cups Gold Chain flour, 2 teaspoons KC baking powder. Blend 2 tablespoons Mrs. Tucker's shortening, 1 cup tomato soup, 1/4 cup milk.

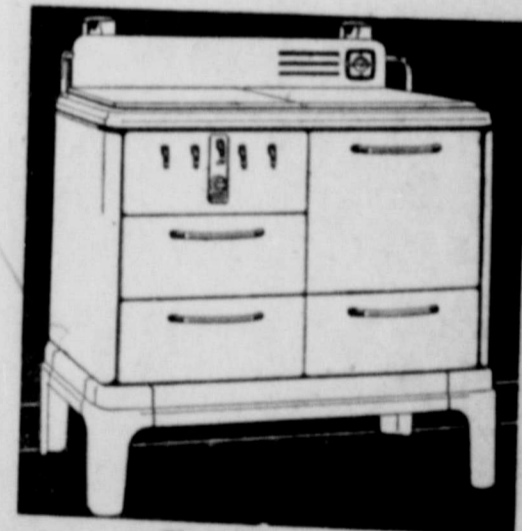

2 1/2 cups sugar, 1/2 cup white corn syrup, 1/2 cup hot water, 2 egg whites.  
Cook syrup to 238 degrees. Pour on stiffly beaten whites. Beat until creamy, add 1 teaspoon vanilla.

**Chinese Fruit Cake**  
4 eggs beaten together, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup Gold Chain flour, 2 teaspoons KC baking powder, 3 squares cut dates, 1 lb. pineapple, 1 lb. cherries, 8 cups whole pecans, 1 cup Gold Chain flour over fruit and nuts.

## Perlstein Gives Explanations Of Vital Questions

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is a talk made at the Lions Club meeting Thursday by Saule Perlstein, and it answers so many questions now in the minds of the people, concerning Germany and Adolf Hitler, that many requests were received that the talk be published in full. Since Lion President Garner re-

marked that we are going to have a good lecture on socks and shoes, I made it my object to disappoint him and talk about something which probably would interest you more than the making of socks and hats. Nearly every day I am asked by people regarding certain words which are making the headlines today in the current events in German and Austrian affairs in our newspapers. Of course this would take only a few minutes time to tell you about these few words, so I take the liberty of adding a few facts

about existing conditions in Germany and Austria. I ask you not to take me for an authority, I do not claim to be either a historian or commentator. I have been asked many times, why Hitler, of Austrian birth, came to power in Germany. The general poverty of the German nation after the war gave Hitler the opportunity to rise into power, as leader of the National Socialists Party (Nazi), who received majority seats at the Reichstag (Congress) in 1933 at which time he became chancellor. Hitler's regime was characterized by every possible plan to unify the conflicting parties of the Reich (realm) under the Nazi banner, and the elimination of opposition, many times by questionable means. One of the first acts of the new regime, avowedly anti-Semitic, was to wage war against German Jews, on which they blamed all the sins of the Versailles Treaty and the World War and whom he later accused of being bolshevistic. He established a government, in which there was room only for one party, the National Socialists. All minority groups—Catholics, Masons, Socialists, or any other group—were forced to fall in line or go to Concentration Camps. All church youth movements were wiped out, their money confiscated and their banners outlawed and the youth forced into his own party youth movement. In 1935 all local self-government on the part of the German states was ended. Mines and businesses were nationalized, much like today's Communistic Russia against which he claims to protect all other types of government. The persecution of Jews and all minority groups continues unabated.

In 1933 before Hitler came into power there were 540,000 Jews living in Germany, or less than 3-4 of 1 per cent of the total population. They have lived in Germany for 100ths of years. It is a fact that the German Jewry played a great factor not only in the commercial life but also in the intellectual culture of Germany, like science, literature, music, medicine and education and it is wrong to think that all the Jews in Germany were engaged in the

men's furnishing or dry goods business. When you read in the newspapers that Hitler destroyed all German Jewish literature, that can only mean, that he fears the enlightenment of his people from these great works more than he does the living Jewish population. Some of the most famous men in the world were German Jews like: Wasserman, Ehrlich, Einstein, Ludwig, Mendelsohn, Heine, Zweig, etc.

After Hindenburg's death he combined the two offices of Chancellor and President and made himself known as "Der Fuehrer." Austria which has been robbed of its independence in the last few days by Hitler is a small country about 3,600 square miles and has a population of about six and one-half millions. It was at one time the second biggest country in Europe, next to Russia, and consisted of what is now Hungary, Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia and Galizia, which is now part of Poland. As Austria is a German speaking nation and these other nations mentioned were part of Austria for many years, you naturally will find German speaking people more or less in any of these nations, especially so, where they border Germany, and which is more so the case in Czechoslovakia, in the northern part. Hitler demands or claims jurisdiction over these people, when he himself within his own borders does not give any rights or consideration to any minority group whatsoever.

I have also been asked the question if Hitler has in reality the majority of support of the people. This is very hard to determine, as free speech and free press is prohibited, but it is quite sure that the older generation is largely not in sympathy with his ideas, nor for the persecution of the Jewish people. The younger generation is being trained from the cradle on to the ideas of Nazism. While England and France wait and hesitate and try to keep out of war, Hitler takes advantage of the opportunity and nullifies most of the Versailles Treaty and Locarno Treaty, making himself a national hero in the eyes of the German people.

## Gunpowder Cans Of 1812 War Found

LEWES, Del.—Four cans bearing the name of the War of 1812 were found in an unused loft of a house struck by English bombs during the bombardment.

The cans, preserved by paint, were marked "Dundee Gunpowder, Potter and Tolm 233 State Street, Boston." The shingled dwelling in which they were found was built prior to 1797, but still is in a good state of preservation.

### Duncan Coffee Co. Outstanding As Texas Industry

Outstanding among industrial concerns of Houston, and the Southwest, is the Duncan Coffee Company of Houston. That Company was born in the months near the end of the World War, and began business on August 13, 1918.

Conti Streets in Houston where it has continued in business ever since. In the beginning the plant force consisted of Mr. H. M. Duncan, Mr. Lester J. Bland, a colored helper, one woman in the packing department, Mr. A. H. Lawrence, roaster, and Mr. Frank Pilot, salesman. Each week day morning, Mr. Duncan and Mr. Pilot called on retail grocers, because the long established machinery of distribution through brokers and jobbers to retailers was closed to the Duncan Coffee company, as all claimed they had a coffee account and could not

take on or sell a new and unknown brand. Undoubtedly the foregoing circumstances was a "lucky break" for Mr. Duncan and his new brand of "Admiration Coffee," as it forced him to go direct to the retail grocer with his coffee. That route of selling was already being explored by Fleischmen's yeast, and one or two other National manufacturers who were finding it the economic thing to do.

As a matter of fact, a new trend in merchandising was already beginning and in the years since the World War, American industry has more and more tried to shorten the road and reduce the expense for getting goods, especially food products—from the manufacturer to the consumer.

Some few years later, based upon their experience in selling retail grocers direct, the Duncan Coffee Company began to study seriously the problem of distributing coffee direct from the roaster to the grocer throughout Texas. The system of direct distribution now covers the greater part of the state and is constantly being extended to take in more territory.

As the Company faced the

He began to employ more and more people to do the work of packing and labeling coffee, which had been done previously by machinery. While this operation by human hands cost more than the same operations by machines had cost, the difference was not enough to force a higher price to the consumer. Again the sales curve of the Duncan Coffee Company went up, and it was necessary to employ more and more men and women, so that a plant and a business, which was operated by six people in 1918, now required two hundred thirty-seven men and women to operate, with an annual payroll running into six figures.

Within the past year, the Company established a fine, new roasting plant and distributing center at Corpus Christi, the better to serve the growing population of the lower coast, and the Winter Garden territory to the South and West of San Antonio,

and the Rio Grande Valley. The new plant is already working to capacity.

During its entire history, including the depression years, the Duncan Coffee Company has given its employees vacations with pay every year, and at the close of business each year has paid a cash bonus to its employees.

In its sales policy, the Duncan Coffee Company has always adhered to one set principle. It has not discriminated between buyers. Its price to every grocer has been the same. This policy has not been popular with some large buyers, but its fairness and justice has borne fruit, and in view of the recent Act of Congress, giving authority to the Federal Trade Commission to make rules and regulations governing trade practices and outlawing such practices as unreasonable and discriminatory "Advertising allowances," secret rebates and other devices which gave merchants an undue advantage in competitive business, the Duncan Coffee Company again rests in the enviable position of knowing it has been right all the way along the road through the changing years.

The present official family of the Duncan Coffee Company consists of Mr. H. M. Duncan, President and general manager; Mr. C. W. Duncan, vice-president in charge of city sales; Mr. L. J. Bland, secretary-treasurer and sales manager; Mr. E. C. Coker, assistant sales manager; and Mr. R. G. Starnes, credit manager.
