The presence of that red-headed Irishman at the Court of St. James makes a lot of Americans feel better about their country's chance for peace. Joe Kennedy gives signs of being the ambassador that the United States has needed for a long time. That first speech was simple, it was straight-forward, it was sensible. If Great Britainor any other country-gets funny ideas about how the average American looks at the world scene, it won't be Joe Kennedy's fault.

It was good to read in Kennedy's speech such passages

Most Americans insist that their country retain its independent and unmortgaged judgment as to the merits of world crisis as and when they arise.

"Where the present interests of Great Britain and the United States meet is in the prevention of this generally feared world war.'

"If the nations should again become engulfed in the cataclysm of a general war, we should make ourselves very strong and then pursue whatever course we considered to be best for the United States."


"Best for the United States"—that's putting it the way it ought to be put and leaving room for no misinterpretation. Joe Kennedy is a plain-speaking man. He wants the position of his country to be understood. He said that two ideas were wrong. One was that the U. S. wouldn't fight under any circumstances short of actual invasion, and the other was that the U. S. could never remain nestral in the event of a general war. When Kennedy says that majority of the American people prefer the middle ground he is rhight. The American people believe that keeping to such a course is the surest way to keep out of war.

Joe Kennedy will be no errand boy at St. James. He will like no boots. And the British should like him and respect him for those reasons. They received his speech enthusiastically, even when he frankly warned that the U.S. would go whichever way seemed best to the U.S.





Manganese Seen As a Potential

DALLAS .- Opportunity for development of one of Texas littleknown but vital resources, manganese, is seen by the All-South Development Council in actions before both houses of the national congress aimed at encouraging domestic production of this ore, ermed by the War Department the No. 1 strategic material.

The fact that manganese, which "puts the starch in steel," and in fact is indispensible in making sound steel, and as such is of prime importance in national defense, was stressed in recent congressional committee hearings on the bill of Sen. John E. Miller of Arkansas specifying that a proposed million-ton stockpile be compiled from domestic sources.

Texas is on of 20 states having known substantial deposits of manganese, some of which, in Jeff Davis and Val Verde counties, saw development started during the World War, but not carrier on after that emergency period. Of the indicated consumption of manganese in the United States in 1937. of 911,563 tons, probably less than 40,000 tons was domestically produced, although there are sufficient manganese ores in this country for all peacetime or war-

time purposes.
