



was given as the reason.) And now as we give the matter a little thought it appears as though veryone says our collegiate athletic talent will be unable to take the boat ride but the collegians themselves . . .?

BECAUSE by far the greater portion of our Olympic athletes are recruited from the colleges, our athletic invesion of Tokio a couple of summers hence won't get to that proverbies first base, say the

gentlemen who pull the strings and manage our Olympic affairs. Why, how can we get anywhere in Nippon, they ask. The boys have to be in school . . . they won't be able to make up their work in ime to graduate with their class . . . the schools won't give the boys have to be in school leave of absence, and allow them to start the first semester a north or five weeks late.

It is to laugh. Take any 100 college athletes—ask them, frankly, if they would mind graduating a half year later in order to sail to Japan as a ember of the Olympic team.

Ask them if they would mind missing classes for the first semester of the school year in order to enjoy a trip the likes of which they might never again have the opportunity to take as long as they lived.


Just off-hand, about 99 per cent of them, or thereabouts, wouldn't mind at all. . . .
