## STATUTE ON TAXES SOUGHT BY ROOSEVELT

WASHINGTON, April 25. President Roosevelt today asked congress to enact "a short and simple statute" to subject all govrnment salaries and all future overnment bond issues to taxa

Mr. Roosevelt advised congres that he believed recent supreme court decisions indicated tax exempt securities and salaries, both federal and state, could be ended without a constitutional amend-

The statute would enable the government to tax incomes derived from federal, state and munici pal bonds and salaries. On the other hand the states could tax ncomes from federal bonds and

The president declared that 'men with great means" placed funds in tax exempt securities and that a "fair and effective progressive income tax and a huge reerve of tax exempt bonds cannot exist side-by-side.'

Under present conditions all government bonds are exempt from taxes. Federal salaries are subject to the federal income tax, but none are subject to state itome taxes. State salaries are not subject to federal taxes.

A world with the jitters is like a once healthy man who begins to notice the first disturbing symptoms of some deeprooted organic disease. Jitters in themselves are not important; they are worth noticing as symptoms of a deeper, more fundamental trouble.

A fair sample is the fuss which was made in the Philippines the other day when someone reported that a mysterious fleet of warships had come to anchor in an out-ofthe-way harbor in Mindanao Island.

These ships, said a frantic local official, were submarines . . . or possibly they were destroyers, or even cruisers. Anyhow, they were grim and ominous engines of war, they had no business being where they were, and they were obviously up to no good.

Now this used to be a world in which people no more got nervous over naval apparitions than does the average householder get panicky over the creaking of floorboards in the dead of night. But it is not that kind of world any

And so this mysterious "fleet" in Mindanao panicked American officialdom in the Far East and ruffled the nerves of American newspaper readers back home . . . although if a similar report had been circulated ten years ago no one would have been in the least disturbed.

A great many of our scares have less foundation in Three Is Lucky, fact. A guileless tourist exercises his pocket camera, and a spy scare is born; a South Sea trading schooner visits some forsaken atoll of water, and a brand-new naval air station takes shape before the eyes of strategists.

All of which simply means that we have got the jitters; which, in turn, is a symptom of the bad state of health that the world has got itself into. For the grim and undeniable fact is that we do live in the kind of world wherein malevolent gestures are to be expected.

Perhaps we could understand why economic recovery is so long-delayed if we look at it in the light of that fact. 




