It is not so very long since earnest Americans were busy worrying about the spread of Nazi propaganda in South America.

Brazil had what looked very much like a Hitler-model government. Other large South American nations were slipping farther and farther away from democracy. German short-wave radio broadcasts were drenching the continent with propaganda. Minority European groups were organizing and preparing to demand their "rights," altogether it looked as if the Monroe Doctrine was being destroyed by a process of infiltration.

But there seems to have been a serious hitch somewhere. Brazil's government turns out to be a pretty stoutly anti-Hitler. The radio propaganda is failing to have its expected effect. Different governments are cracking down on the minority groups. German-language schools have been closed and foreign political agitation has been curbed, even though large German and Italian language groups do remain devote to the cause of the "leaders" back home.

South America, in other words is not proving a very fertile field for the planting of Nazi seeds. When the dust finally settles things will probably be just about as they wree before the fuss started. The continent's democracy will still be imperfect, of course, but it will not be per- Hugh F. 
