INS MADE FOR REFUGEES FROM EUROPE

At the invitation of President Roosevelt, delegates of 32 nations met at Evian, France, today to consider means of opening borders to destitute refugees fleeing homeless Jews from Germany and Austria.

Of the 32 nations, 21 are in North and South America, traditional refuge of the oppressed. Germany was not represented, nor was Italy.

Myron Taylor, chairman of the American delegation, censured nations that dump "unfortunate" on the rest of the world.

"The practice carried the result of international anarchy. The problem of aiding refugees from Spain also was before the conference. It was considered almost certain that if the insurgents capture Valencia, they end the thousands of loyalists will attempt to flee abroad.

In the Orient the undeclared war between Japan and China had its first year and it was estimated the war, so far, had cost more than 1,000,000 lives and incalculable destruction.

Gen. Chiang Kai-Shek observed anniversary with a statement related to the Japanese and deemed to bolster Chinese morale.

"Do you know that your army is the most cruel force for destruction in the world?" Chiang asked the Japanese.

THREE ESCAPE FROM THE HUNT COUNTY JAIL

GREENVILLE, July 6.—Three men, one of them a former companion of Floyd Hamilton, escaped today from the Hunt County jail.

The fugitives are Melvin Bailey, 36, his brother, Woodrow Bailey, 32, and V. C. "Cotton" Wofford, 26. All were convicted of burglary and were awaiting trial on other charges.

Sheriff Frank Wolfe discovered the men were gone when he went to their cell at 6:30 a. m.

"They sawed the bars of their cell," he said. "Then they tore up blankets, knotted them into ropes, climbed out on an adjoining roof and let themselves to the ground."

Officers recalled that one time Wofford was a companion of Floyd Hamilton and Ted Walters who are accused of numerous bank robberies since they escaped several weeks ago from the Montague county jail.

Officers thought it possible Hamilton and Walters might have aided in the jailbreak today.

A fourth prisoner, Emmett Phillips, awaiting trial on charges of cattle theft, remained in the cell.

When the break was discovered word was sent to Dallas, where officers took into custody the wives of the Bailey brothers.

Free Tuition to Junior College Will Be Provided Residents If Tax Is Voted; All Ward Schools To Be Continued

If the 20-cent junior college tax is carried Saturday, July 9, every student whose parents reside in the Ranger Independent School District will be entitled to free tuition. The only expenses for the local students who attend Ranger junior college will be for the small fees necessary for books. This will open the doors of this institution to every ambitious young person in the school district.

If this tax measure is voted by the people the Ranger school board plans to move the junior college into a separate building at the earliest possible date. This has been the hope and ambition of the board since the founding of the college and such a move is absolutely dependent upon an increased maintenance.

Contrary to an unfounded rumor that has gained some currency, the board of trustees has no thought of discontinuing any of the ward schools this fall. Hodges Oak Park, Young and Cooper wards will all three open on September 12 for the 1938-39 session and continue throughout the year, it was stated today.

GAS EXPLOSION DEATHS MOUNT HIGHER TODAY

GEORGE WEST, Tex., July 6.—The death toll of a gas explosion and fire that demolished two buildings and injured 14 persons, reached four today with the death of Mrs. Voss Yates of San Diego, Texas.

Mrs. Yates, who was dining with her husband at the Bomar Cafe, where the explosion occurred yesterday, succumbed at a hospital in Three Rivers.

A few hours earlier Jim Davis, 24, son of Chief Deputy Sheriff J. W. Davis of San Antonio and driver of a fuel gas truck, died at the hospital.

The others dead were Patsy Jean Morris, six, of San Antonio, and Don Lytle, negro cook at the cafe.

Mrs. J. M. Morris, mother of Patsy Jean, and the husband of Mrs. Yates, still were in serious condition. All the others injured were treated by local physicians and dismissed.

Gordon Resident, Former Ranger, Is Buried Wednesday

Services for C. C. High of Gordon, former Texas Ranger who died Tuesday afternoon at his home, were conducted at the Eastland cemetery Wednesday afternoon with Rev. Lee Romine, pastor of the First Christian church of Eastland, officiating.

Mrs. Larsen's Hoe Is a Badge of Honor

Pictures of the glittering officers of militaristic countries show them always with a sheathed stiletto dangling at belt. They are keen, sharp little instruments, and for some obscure reason much of the world seems to consider them badges of honor.

Yet they are not much sharper than the hoe with which Mrs. Ida Larsen may be found any day, breaking clods in the nine-acre patch near Aurora, O., which yields her a living.

The hand that grips the dagger may be well-manicured, and even perfumed, but somehow we like better the rough, hard hands that grip Mrs. Larsen's hoe. Better than the glistening boots and clinking spurs, we like the high leather shoes and muddy trousers that tramp through the Ohio strawberry patch.

Here are some of the reasons:

Mrs. Larsen, who is 54, rubs a good living out of her nine acres. She sows her own wood, shoots her own rabbits, puts down her own meat, gets a good living. "Anybody can grub a living out of the ground. Anybody that's willing to work," she says.

Well, perhaps not anybody. For not everybody is like Mrs. Larsen. Listen:

In 1930 her husband was in the hospital. While he lay there, a cow kicked Mrs. Larson, broke her leg. Then her husband died. But Mrs. Larson is made of stern stuff.

She hired a couple of hands to work the farm they were renting. Neither was skilled, and when seeding time came, the work was stalled. Mrs. Larsen had herself lifted into the seeder every morning, her crutches strapped beside her. At noon she came in and fried ham and eggs and potatoes for the hands. She seeded 40 acres, did the washing and scrubbing, and raised 300 chickens that year.

"Now that," says Mrs. Larsen with a certain fierce exultation, "was really tough that year. That was something to stand, maybe."

So to Mrs. Larsen, a regime that looks tough today is not so tough to her.

"I've been grubbing in the ground since I was 10," she says. "I can't see sitting down and letting everything go to weeds. This quarter-acre will bring me 200 bucks next spring. I got plenty. I've seen it a lot worse."

The rhythmic rise and fall of Mrs. Larsen's sharp hoe will go on long after the spurs have fallen apart and the daggers rusted. For she has a courage the battlefield does not know, let alone the parade-ground.

And she has wrung from the world a sturdy independence that millions can never know in lands where life itself depends on giving the right salute.

Coolie Survives a Jump That Killed Water Buffalo

SINGAPORE—A Malay coolie, pursued by a wild buffalo, leaped over a 20-foot cliff in British Malaya and was not injured. The buffalo, leaping after him, was killed.

The story is told in the annual report of the Government Survey Department of British Malaya.

The coolie was carrying a box containing a heavy theodolite when he was pursued across the rice fields by the buffalo. The coolie did not drop the box and run, but placed it carefully on the ground and ran, with the buffalo gradually gaining.

It was within a few feet when suddenly the path along which both were running stopped abruptly with a 20-foot drop to the ground below.

There was no question of stopping. Over went the coolie, followed by the buffalo. The coolie fell on his head and was stunned, and when he came to, there was the buffalo lying dead beside him with a broken neck.

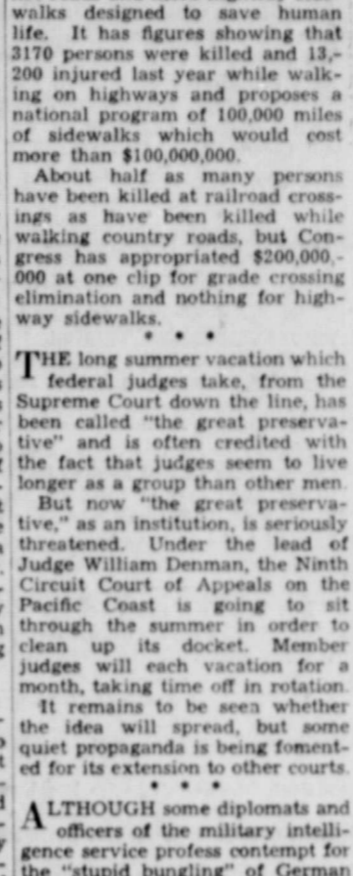

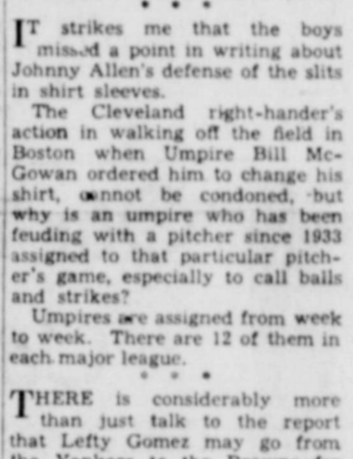
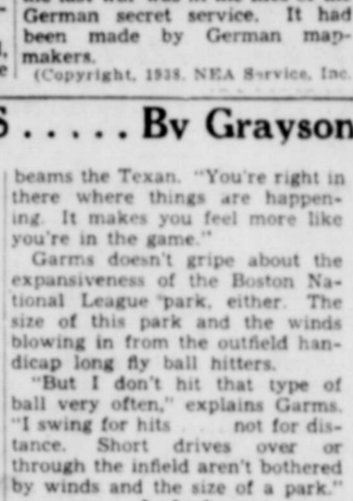
