Big Boom Hits Sleepy Village WAPPAPELLO, Mo.—After U. S. Army engineers department at West Memphis, Ark., requested bids for construction of the huge Wappapello dam and artificial lake near here, this settlement changed almost overnight from a ghost hamlet into a boom town.

Sight of chickens on main street, a common sight earlier this year, is a rarity. Vacant sleeping rooms are not available, and many persons are building additions to their homes to accommodate job seekers.

Property valuations have doubled and it is predicted that during the three years it will take to build the dam, Wappapello will become a thriving city of perhaps 5,000 population.

The dam, when completed, will be an earthen structure approximately 2,600 feet long and 70 feet high. Approximately 1,700,000 cubic yards of earth will fill the dam; 19,000 cubic yards of dumped rip-rap will be used; 19,000 cubic yards of class A and 18,000 cubic yards of class B concrete will be used in the construction along with a total of 1,950,000 pounds of reinforced steel.

Included in the project will be gates, conduit lining and gate hoists, hydro-electric service units, lead gate and operating equipment, power and lighting system, traveling crane, stiffleg derrick, gate house, and an operator's house and garage.

A GOOD cookie always gets around. Bertha M. Burdick, who lives on Big Moose Lake in New York, makes a delight of a brown sugar drop cookie. She gave me the recipe recently. You will like it, too.

Bertha Burdick's Brown Sugar Cookies

One and one-half cups brown sugar, 1-2 cup butter, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, pinch salt, 3-1/2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1-2 cup milk, 1 cup chopped raisins.

Cream sugar and butter. If sugar is lumpy, roll it first. Add eggs to sugar and butter and beat well. Add vanilla and salt, then alternately with milk and flour, baking powder and soda sifted together, and raisins. Stir thoroughly. Drop by spoonfuls on greased cookie pan. Flatten out thin and sprinkle with chopped nut meats. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) about 12 minutes.

A California friend who summers on Lake Tahoe argues that her mountain cookies are even better than Mrs. Burdick's specialties. You be the judge.

Lake Tahoe Cookies

Two cups seedless raisins, 1 cup butter, 2 cups granulated sugar, 1-2 cup peanut butter, 2 eggs, 1-2 cup milk.

all-purpose flour, 3-4 teaspoon salt, 3-4 teaspoon soda, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 2 teaspoons vanilla extract, 3-1/2 cups quick cooking oats.

Pour boiling water over raisins and let stand 5 minutes. Drain and dry on towel. Cream butter, add sugar and cream thoroughly. Add peanut butter and beat. Add beaten eggs and mix. Add milk, soda and spice, and beat. Add flavoring, oats and raisins, and stir to blend. Drop by small spoonfuls, about 2 inches apart, on ungreased cookie sheet, but do not flatten. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 12-14 minutes.

Two Members of 'Third House' to Be Missing Next Year

AUSTIN. — Two members of the "third house" will be missed when the next session of the Texas legislature convenes. Neither were known better than most senators or representatives.

Effective members of the "third house," they were distinct from the button-holing, tricky advocates who have made the term "lobbyist" anathema to most Texans.

John Darrouzet of Galveston and Jeff Strickland of San Antonio both have died since the last session. Different in personality and type, each rose above ordinary "lobbying." The state supreme court had a memorial session in honor of Darrouzet. Gov. James V. Allred has denounced lobbyists with bitterness, but telephoned Stamford when he heard of Strickland's death.

"Jeff Strickland was a fine, clean character who loved his friends. I consider him one of Texas' noblest men. His loss to us is great."

Darrouzet dressed usually all in black or all in white. A flowing tie and large black felt hat emphasized his tall straight figure. He was dubbed "Black Eagle of the Gulf." As a lobbyist, none ever accused him of making a false statement. News men found him reliable whether the facts favored or hurt his cause. Beside his service for clients, he did much volunteer work for religious and benevolent causes he considered worthy.

Strickland had no air of grandeur. He smoked cigars stuck into a corncob pipe, dressed plainly and has been known to blow a saucer of coffee when that was the most effective way to cool the beverage. He represented motion picture interests. Passes given legislators sometimes caused criticism, but he sent them alike to friends and critics.

Both cultivated acquaintances among legislators and officials but not in ways that put the friendship under obligations. Each had a fine touch of natural courtesy, and thoroughly enjoyed making others happy and comfortable.

In the days before most legislators came to Austin by automobile, the story is told, Darrouzet bought up all Pullman car reservations for one night after the legislature adjourned. Members fusing at the railroad stations be-

Eastland Citizens Given New Chance For 'Hopper' Dope

Another offer for Eastland residents to obtain a casher poison was extended Tuesday by County Agent Elmo V. Cook.

Agent Cook stated that persons who reside in the city limits of Eastland may obtain the poison, ready to use, by telephoning or calling at his office prior to 5 p. m., Friday.

The poison will be distributed from Cook's office from 3 to 5 p. m., Saturday. When persons call the office they should, said Cook, designate the acreage on which it will be used so workers may prepare the proper amount. Adults must call in person for the poison.

The poison is to be furnished in cooperation with the city of Eastland.

When distributed according to directions, said Cook, the poison will not harm livestock and pets. It should not be broadcast directly on the shrubbery.

Cook recommended that those who obtain the poison should distribute it Saturday night. It was indicated that this may be the last opportunity for Eastland residents to obtain the poison already mixed and without cost, as later the mixing station at Cisco may be closed.
