Conservation of Subsurface Water Is to Be Studied

AUSTIN .- Conservation and control of the state's diminishing supplies of underground water will be discussed at a statewide meeting to be held in Austin on July 29.

The meeting was called by Gov. James V. Allred after the Texas Planning Board's water resources ommittee had reported that several sections of Texas were facing a serious shortage in underground water, and that other sections of the state were finding it difficult to locate new sources of water for an increased demand by industrial and domestic users.

Contrary to popular belief the state's underground water resources are not inexhaustible. Unger ordinary conditions the present supply of underground water probably would be sufficient to take care of the demands but with new industries coming into the state and the population of the state growing by leaps and bounds water is now being taken from the ground faster than nature can replace it. 



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
