# Man Is Ingenious Without Being Wise

The hope that closer intercommunication among countries and peoples would bring better understanding and more peaceable relations among them doesn't seem to be working out very well.

We invent the airplane, bringing cities closer together in point of time, and what does it mean? Better bomb-

We invent the cable and telegraph and telephone lines so that any country may know instantaneously what is going on in any other country. And what do we get? In half the world we get iron-clad control of communications by governments, and the news poisoned at the source.

We invent radio, by which the human voice can instantaneously enter any home in the world from far countries. And what do we get? We get poisonous propaganda from abroad and floogie-floogie-floy-floy at home.

Now Miss Lidia Zamenhof, daughter of the inventor of Esperanto, an artificially-created language, comes through with still another disillusionment.

Esperanto was devised in the hope that by creating a language universally understood, the barriers of differing tongues would be banished, and universal understanding would be promoted.

But what happens? Both Mussolini and Stalin, Miss Zamenhof says, have seized on Esperanto as a medium for flooding neighboring countries with military and social propaganda.

Maybe "trickling" would be a better word than "flooding,' in view of the small number of people who know-Esperanto. But it is a small straw added to the long list of evidence that ingenuity is not enough.

"The world's desperate need today is not more tools, but more knowledge of how to use wisely the tools it has.


