#### An International Housing **Problem Arises**

If the world is really interested in ending the unrest of its peoples, it will do some hard, serious thinking about the job which the International Refugee Conference is

This conference faces the task of finding some sort of permanent homes for the millions of people who have been thrown out of their European homelands. These people have been dispossessed for all sorts of reasonsracial, religious, economic and political-and their presence as an undigested lump in the world's body politic is like the presence of a source of infection in the human body: it must be removed if the body is to regain good health.

Myron Taylor, the leading American delegate to the conference, pointed out the other day that the existence of these homeless millions is a major factor contributing to world unrest. It is hard to see how it could ever be anything else. You cannot have a stable world, satisfied to exist on its old basis, as long as so many people are completely uprooted. In sheer self-defense, the world has got to find a place for them.

So far, so good. A place must be found. But where? Well, one of the things we Americans will have to think about is the proposal that a certain number of the refugees be settled in the United States. It has been pointed out, for instance, that during the next five years refugees will have to be "placed" at the rate of half a million a year, and that America and Great Britain might properly agree to absorb half of that number annually, between them. That would mean the annual settlement in this country of 125,000 foreigners.

Now the objections to any such proposal are easy to anticipate. We have some millions of people out of work, as it is; can we afford to take on huge new groups into the labor market? Our farmers, too, are growing more things than they can sell profitably; do we want thousands of immigrants to establish new farms each year, thereby adding to the country's agricultural production?

Those questions aren't easily answered. Yet in the long run the scheme might well be a very good one, from a strictly selfish viewpoint.

For one thing, it is at least possible that one reason for our protracted slump is the fact that our whole economic system is keyed to a steady growth in population, and that that growth has been slowing up of late. For another, refugees from European depotisms have in the past contributed largely to the upbuilding of this country; they might well do so again. Some able and talented people are looking for new homes now; it is hard to feel that the nation which gets them will be making a very great sacrifice.

In any case, the problem needs serious thought. World unrest won't end until this refugee problem is decently settled. We have a responsibility that we can't entirely

#### SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

BY MRS. GAYNOR MADDOX

DON'T spoil an expensive dinner before you cook it. Study the modern techniques of home refrigeration. Learn these rules. They are based on cold logic. Reserve the coldest spot for dairy products and raw meat. Speed milk and cream to the refrigerator, taking only enough time to wash off the outsides of the bottles. Creamed dishes and desserts made of milk or cream, or eggs, require the same special or eggs, require the same special

or eggs, require the same special consideration.

Epidemics of food poisonings are usually directly traceable to improper refrigeration of foods of this group. Bacteria-infested custard mixtures of milk and egg, and raw and cooked meats, especially ground meats, are most often the sources of the trouble. The rule that cold air goes down will help to locate the frigid zone in your refrigerator. But a thermometer or two set at different places will help to find the exact spot. Although sometimes the range is only two or three degrees, variations of six to eight

Don't Overfrowd

This may make all the difference between sweet and sour cream for breakfast. Trays, large plates or paper sacks may divert these air currents. Overcrowding may cut them off and reduce the efficiency of the refrigerator.

Dishes are better than paper tacks, as they allow freer pasageway for the cooling air dream. Ground meats should be sandled with special care reduced as milk, cream, butter, need protection from refrigerator odors. The original paper caps are best for milk bottles. Make sure all surfaces of the butter are closely covered by the original wrapping.

To keep the refrigerator fresh and sweet, wash out the interior of the cabinet with a weak solution of washing soda. This is easier to remove than soap, and for the purpose has better cleansing qualities. A mechanical refrigerator should be thoroughly cleansed with washing soda solution at defrosting time. 


