



This is an Indian news a halt. Many braves lost their Last year about this time the federal government allowed the Five Civilized Tribes to form a tribal govern-

ment once more. They allowed the tribes to form committees to write tribal constitutions and hold elections for tribal leaders. By the fall of 1979, all the tribes had written their constitutions and planned their governments. They all traded in their old bi-cameral houses (Houses of Representatives

and Senate) for a chief, a

tribal council and a legal

By the early spring of 1980, the Creeks had elected a chief, one Claud Cox, a sevenmember council and a judiciary committee. Once this was done, the federal government rewarded them by passing out the wampum. They really passed it out, too. The Creeks were able to start a hospital, build a huge government complex at Okmulgee, establish a dairy farm, subsidized housing for the needy and the elderly, and send many young Creeks to

college. However, right from the very start there were evident problems. Just after the new tribal council sat down, the Speaker of the Council tried to take the place of the chief. Unfortunately, the constitution called for only one chief. Besides, you know what happens when you get too many chiefs in one tribe. One-half of the tribal council supported the speaker and the other half never came to the meetings.

Chief Claud Cox asked for required legislation from the council so that the Great White Father in Washington would pass out more wampum. By this time the wampum supply was getting a little low and there were many Indian braves at the complex needing to get paid.

The council didn't get the work done and refused to legislate as the Great White Father wanted, so they told Claud Cox to go on a buffalo hunt. In the meantime, Great White Father passed the Creeks over at wampum time.

Chief Cox didn't go on the hunt. He went on the warpath. It didn't do any good, When the wampum supply

The council wrote all the citizens, too, blaming the whole mess on Cox, who, they said, was getting too much wampum for them to keep track of and they weren't going to let Cox get any more until they found a way to count wampum more easily. Evidently, wampum and the computers don't coincide, according to the Creek council.

So while the council is busily trying to count wampum on their fingers and while Chief Cox figures out a way to keep his chief's job, the rest of the Five Civilized Tribes observe with genuine horror. The obvious solution is to

This week we are concluding the questions and responses started last week. These inquiries were raised at a recent symposium held by Social Security. Laura Peacock, the Lubbock District Manager, responded to each as follows.

Question: If the ratio of workers to retirees keeps dropping, what will prevent

Answer: Currently, we For several years now, the birth rate has been declining, and life expectancy has been increasing. If these trends continue, eventually we will have only 2 workers for every beneficiary. In that event, the cost of financing Social Security benefits will increase from about 10.4 percent of taxable payroll in 1979 to almost 17 percent in 2035.

We should keep in mind that no one can predict the future with a high degree of certainty. For instance, it is impossible to predict whether the birth rate will rise or decline. Demographic and economic conditions will obviously be very different in the next century. One obvious result of such change is that a Social Security program enacted many years ago may become less responsive to the needs of a changed society. Future Social Security development will need to reflect such changes if the program is to meet the income security needs of the population at a cost it is willing to pay.

Question: I am 30 and single, and will probably remain single. Will I get back what I have invested in Social Security if I retire at age 62 or 65? I would like some projected figures based on my expected average earnings of

\$40,000 per year. Answer: Based on average life expectancy, you can expect to receive a reasonable return on your investment in Social Security. However, I cannot stress too much the projection you are afforded other than retirement. Even though you are not presently married, and are not concerned with protection for your surviving spouse and children, you are not immune from illness and disability.

Social Security monthly benefits for yourself, and for your spouse and children should you decide to marry, constitute a very real protection long before retirement.

In addition, Medicare benefits payable at 65 or after 24 months of disability entitlement represent a protection of incalculable value. The amount of benefits you will receive at retirement will depend in large part on the benefit formula in use at that time along with the rate of The present inflation. maximum rate for a worker reaching age 65 in 1980 is \$653.80. The projected rate in 1990 is close to twice that

As you can see, the spiral is upward. By the time you reach 65, you can probably count on your Social Security replacing about 30 to 50 percent of your final year's earnings.

Question: What is done with the money in the trust fund? I keep hearing that it is used for welfare payments and that it finances other government give-away programs and by other government agencies?

Answer: The money in the Trust funds is used to pay Social Security benefits. For example, the disability insurance trust fund pays monthly disability checks. In addition, the cost of administering the program (about 2%) is paid from the trust

That portion of each trust fund that is not required to meet current expenditures for benefits and administration is invested on a daily basis in interest-bearing obligations of the U.S. Government or in obligations guaranteed as to both principal and interest by the United Assistance programs such as Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), Food Stamps, etc., are paid from general revenues, and/or shared on a pro-rata basis with the states.

This preview comes from still high on market hogs and Dr. Ernest E. Davis, pigs weighing more than 60 pounds. Most hogs weighing more than 180 pounds will be killed by the end of June, with the remainder being marketed in July, August and the first part of September. Slaughter during the summer is expected to be four to six percent above levels of one

> The number of hogs kept for breeding is down eight this, added to higher slaughter numbers and reduced farrowings, should mean steady price recovery for early 1981 if these trends

"Very likely, these intentions will hold as pork producers have sustained heavy financial losses this past spring," said Davis.

He said that even though much has been said about weak consumer demand declining real incomes, recession and a general dismal economy - demand for pork should remain relatively strong. As long as retail pork is a dollar per pound less than Choice retail beef, consumers will continue to substitute pork for beef.

Price predictions for producers show market barrow and gilt prices averaging \$35 to \$38 per hundredweight for the summer.

Sen. Price reviewed his experiences and opportunities that he had to meet influential people in this nation and others, such as Anwar Sadat and Golda Meier, while he was in Congress. "It is unfortunate that people do not study the voting records of their officeholders and call them to task when they do not vote to the best advantage of their districts. If they did, the fellow who replaced me in Congress would not fare so well,' Senator Price said.

Price said that the citizenry has no idea as to the extent of ridiculous bills that come before the state legislature, and would be dismayed at the small amount of time that is allowed legislators to become informed about each bill. There is very little time allowed for testimony before bills are considered, and often people travel long distances to testify, and are not allowed any time, he said.

Education and the needs of the elderly will be two major items for consideration in the next session, Sen Price said. One-half of the funds, approximately \$10 million will be called for by education proponents. Because of the changing role of the family and the longevity of persons over 60, more demands are placed on funding the care of the elderly, he said.

'The loss of conservatives, both Democrat and Republican, will greatly affect the passage of bills in the legislature. Several bills. such as a state income tax requirement, failed by only one vote last session, and the battles will be uphill this session. Of course, redistricting will be of prime importance to conservatives.'

Asked about prospective water resources, Price stated that he saw little encouragement due to the immense expense in bringing water into this area and because surrounding states are reluctant to part with their own supplies. Price did say that he believed the time would come when any amount of money would be paid by Texas residents to have even enough water to drink, and that possibly agriculture would be a low priority on
