

City annexes land

"Let's get these people in here!"

With that, Dimmitt City alderman Joyce Hunter made the motion Monday night to officially annex three tracts of land into the city, ending over five months of petitioning and negotiation.

The land belongs to the State Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation, Bob Towler Equipment Co. and Dan and Oma Dee Heard. The Castro County Economic Development Commission holds an option on the Heard's tract.

The action actually started on March 18 when SDHPT officials presented a letter to the aldermen requesting annexation into the city. Later, Towler and the EDC, who have property to the south of the SDHPT tract on US 385, also petitioned for annexation.

City officials had originally wanted to run utility lines for water and sewer through the SDHPT land, but SDHPT spokesmen said they were planning to bury fuel tanks where the city wanted to run the lines.

The city, in turn, has decided to run a water line in front of the properties to the southern end of the Towler tract. Towler has agreed to pay the cost of having the line installed from the southern end of the SDHPT tract to the southern end of his property, where the line will end until there is commercial business on the EDC tract.

SDHPT will pay for its share of the line when it begins using city utilities. SDHPT officials indicate it could be another four or five years before they build a new warehouse facility on the site.

The aldermen opted Monday night to maintain city taxes at the current level of 28.04 cents per \$100 valuation, despite Chief Assessor Jerry Heller's report the city would lose about \$1,149 by keeping the level there.

Heller had suggested raising the rate to 28.32 cents per \$100, which would generate the same revenue as taxes did last year. Alderman David Hays made the motion to maintain the current tax levy.

City Manager Paul Catoe resubmitted an ordinance originally presented April 19 on the city's most flood-prone areas, on the south central edge. Catoe said officials with the Federal Emergency Management Agency had called him twice asking the city to take action on the ordinance.

Catoe explained the ordinance would allow property owners to buy insurance worth up to \$180,000 on homes and up to \$60,000 on contents. Currently, homeowners may buy only \$35,000 worth of protection on residences and \$10,000 worth of insurance on contents.

Catoe also said the ordinance

"is just common sense. It sets up certain guidelines for construction in flood-prone areas. It has guidelines for construction in places that are or could be a lake. You can't just build houses in a lakebed without having flood problems. I know — I live in one (on NW Twelfth).

"The FEMA officials also say that if we don't pass this ordinance, the city would not be eligible for disaster payments if we have a bad enough flood, and could also cost us Revenue Sharing and grant monies from the federal government."

The aldermen passed the ordinance unanimously.

The board also approved a bid of \$14,330.16 from Reeve-Fleming Chevrolet in Lamesa for a 1985 Suburban after the low bidder, Stevens Chevrolet in Hereford, could not find a unit that met the specifications. Reeve-Fleming had a unit on hand that was similar to the one that was bid, but the price was \$667.29 higher. The Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. will pay the difference.

The aldermen went along with the Airport Advisory Board in their selection of McMorries and Associates as the engineer for the expansion project at Dimmitt Municipal Airport, and voted to close a portion of East Andrews Street in front of Don Elliott Wrecker Service and Body Shop.



JOHN HAMILTON was welcomed to Dimmitt Friday by Mayor Wayne Collins as the new city police chief. Hamilton, of Wylie, started out with a bang — he hired two new policemen and said Monday the city police

force should be at full strength by Sept. 1. Hamilton said he plans "to make the police force more visible in the community and cut down on the crime rate."

Registration starts Tuesday

Students will begin the final steps for their return to school Sept. 3 with registration next week at all county schools.

Dimmitt students will register next Tuesday, with registration in Hart and Nazareth next Thursday and Friday.

Registration at Richardson Elementary School will be from 1 p.m. until 4 p.m. Tuesday. Students who will be four years old by Sept. 1, have income below the subsistence level and are unable to speak or comprehend the English language will be eligible for the pre-

kindergarten program. Kindergarten students must have reached their fifth birthday by Sept. 1, while first grade students must be six years old by Sept. 1. All students registering for the first time must bring a birth (Continued on Page 8)

Pioneer farmer 'Goose' Ramey dies Friday

Castro County pioneer farmer, Edwin "Goose" Ramey, 95, died Friday.

Funeral services were held Sunday at the First United Methodist Church in Dimmitt with Rev. Vernon O'Kelly, pastor, assisted by Rev. Ed Freeman of the First Presbyterian Church of Dimmitt, officiating.

Masonic graveside services followed at Castro Memorial Gardens, with arrangements handled by Foskey Funeral Home.

He was born in Alto on Jan. 14, 1890, and moved to Castro County on Feb. 2, 1904 from Madill, Okla. He married Lena Tate on April 17, 1916. She died in 1974.

He was also preceded in death by a son, Robert.



Survivors include a daughter, Decimae Beene of Friona; four grandsons; and three great-grandchildren.

Ramey, his twin brother Edgar, three of his older brothers, two sisters and his mother moved here to farm 662 acres that had been purchased

by his oldest brother, Bunyon, in 1902.

They planted the first-ever wheat crop in Castro County, in 1907, and made 18 bushels per acre for \$1 per bushel. They bought the first mechanical header ever operated in the county, a McCormick driven by six mules, in 1909. In 1919 they purchased the first combine that was ever shipped into Amarillo, a McCormick drawn by an eight-mule team with an Armstrong motor to run the machinery.

Ramey received most of his formal education at home and attended Clarendon College for one year. He became a profound expert on geese after

nursing a wounded goose back to health after the goose broke its wing on a shock of sorghum.

He received his nickname, Goose, from Amarillo reporter Harry Ansley, who covered a talk Ramey gave about geese at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society in 1926.

Ramey also raised bees, and told News Publisher Don Nelson in a feature story interview in February, 1984, that he "always had a weakness for

bees, but never could buy any because they couldn't ship them. In 1938 I bought seven hives of bees from a man in Hereford. I've had them ever since."

Ramey also became an authority on the US monetary system, and spoke throughout the Panhandle on the subject.

For over 60 years, Ramey was the official US weather observer for the county, recording the daily high and low

temperatures and precipitation, and was also very knowledgeable in meteorology.

Ramey had been a member of the Castro Masonic Lodge for over 50 years, and had served as Master of the Lodge and was a Grand Deputy of the Grand Lodge of the State of Texas. He had also been on the board of directors of the Masonic Children's Home at Fort Worth, and was a director for many years of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative.

Picnic, reunion set

Arney School marker to be unveiled Sunday

Present and former residents will gather at Arney Sunday to eat a picnic lunch and dedicate a historical marker commemorating the Arney School.

The Arney Community is especially inviting former pupils and teachers of the school to a reunion in conjunction with the dedication. The event is open to all interested persons.

Each family planning to take part in the picnic lunch is asked to bring enough food for the family. Iced tea and bread will be furnished.

The lunch will begin at 12 noon, to be followed by the dedication ceremony at 2:30.

The site is at the intersection of FM 168 and FM 1075, 15 miles northeast of Dimmitt.

The Arney School served the northeast Castro County community for more than half a century. As in most early-day rural communities, the school came to be the center of activity — classes, religious services, community gatherings, elections, holiday events.

The inscription on the new marker reads:

Arney School
Among the early settlers in northeast Castro County were George and Jim Arney, two brothers from Missouri, for whom Arney Community was named. A school was started in 1901 for the children of settlers and ranch hands. The first schoolhouse, a one-room frame structure, also housed services of Arney Baptist Church, which was organized in 1905. Arney School operated until 1953, when it was consolidated with other districts. The school building then served as a community center and polling place. (1985)

S. A. Hodges Jr. will serve as the master of ceremonies at Sunday's dedication service.

Rachel Hunter, who attended Arney School, will give the welcome and recognize former teachers and pupils present, the person who traveled the farthest to attend, county officials and members of the Castro County Historical Commission.

Clyde Hancock will unveil and read the marker, and Helene McFarland will give the

history of the school. County Commissioner Vincent Gugemos of Precinct 4 will officially accept the marker on behalf of the county.

Don Kimbrell will give the invocation, County Judge Polly Simpson will give the benediction, and members of Dimmitt Boy Scout Troop 266 will present the colors during the ceremony.

This will be the fifth Official Texas Historical Marker dedicated in the county within the past four years, through the efforts of the Castro County Historical Commission. The earlier ones commemorate the Carter Ranch, the Hereford POW Camp Chapel, the Shootout on Jones Street in Dimmitt, and Summerfield-Damron Corner.

Members of the Historical Commission are Teeny Bowden, chairman; Helen Richardson, vice-chairman; Clara Vick, treasurer; Madge Robb, bookkeeper; George Bagwell, Lon Woodburn, Dale Winders, Norman Nelson, Debbie Jackson, Mary Nell Foster and Cornelia Annen. Edwin "Goose" Ramey, who died Friday, also was a member of the commission.

better for it. For many of us, "Goose" is not gone — he'll never really be gone. He still hasn't said "goodbye," just "good luck."

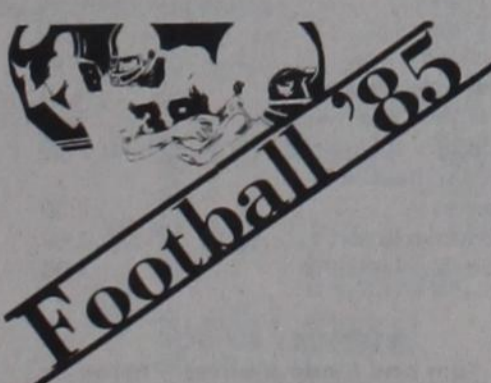

Hart ISD board sets meal prices, hearing

The Hart School Board has set Aug. 29 as the date for the budget hearing for the 1985-86 school year and to amend the 1984-85 school budget.

The board met in its regular meeting Aug. 12 and approved the band budget of \$10,000 for the new school year, and set meal prices for the coming year.

Meal prices for students will be 30 cents for breakfast and 60 cents for lunch, with adults paying 75 cents for breakfast and \$1.35 for lunch.

The board also set substitute teacher salaries at \$40 per day for certified teachers, \$35 per day for non-certified substitutes, and \$25 for substitutes for teacher aides and secretaries.

Scrimmages start tonight

The 1985 football season gets an unofficial start tonight when Hart hosts New Deal in a scrimmage at 6:30 p.m. at Longhorn Stadium.

Dimmitt and Nazareth will have their first scrimmages of the year Friday as the Bobcats host Bovina at 6 p.m. while the Swifts visit Sudan at 7:30 p.m.

All three county head football coaches, Clifford Smith of the Bobcats, Mark Stroebel of the Longhorns and Rex Minsheu of the Swifts, indicated their defenses were in fine

shape, and all of their players were looking forward to the chance to 'hit someone else' in the scrimmages.

"The defense seems to be pretty far ahead of the offense, but that's to be expected," Smith said. "We've got a very aggressive defense, and they're doing a good job. The offense could pick up a lot, but we're making good progress, especially throwing the ball.

"We're in better condition, not having to run as much. The

seniors have done a good job of providing leadership, and that's helped us a lot through two-a-days."

Smith said some of the standouts in the early going have included "Rodrigo Jackson, a freshman tackle, who will probably start the season on the junior varsity; Scott Sava, a sophomore, and Mark Standlee, a junior, who are splitting time at center on the varsity; Ricky Major, a junior who stood out last year during a generally lackluster season for the junior varsity; and Troy Golden, a transfer who could help us in several places."

Stroebel said "we're in fair shape. The defense is looking good, and, of course, the offense is always the last thing to gel, but we still have three weeks before our first game — still lots of time to put things together.

"One advantage we'll have is that our backfield of Brett Ritter, Chris Rodriguez and Johnny Washington has played together since the seventh grade. That will help a lot. This line still likes a lot.

"Our linebackers are looking good — everybody on defense is looking good, but our size isn't going to turn any heads. We'll have to depend on our quickness."

Size is going to turn some heads at Nazareth — on the lines and in the backfield. Minsheu hasn't been working much on the passing game as he tries to decide between two quarterbacks — Todd Hill and Chris Schmucker — to direct what could be the most devastating ground game around.

"We've really looked pretty good," Minsheu said of his squad that returns from last year's 11-1 season. "We've had a stomach virus going around that has hurt some, but everyone showed up in good shape and that's helped us.

"We're pretty set with Mike Huseman at tailback, Frankie Huseman at fullback and Billy Steffens at powerback, but we won't know who'll start for us at quarterback until after the two scrimmages (the Swifts will tackle Springlake-Earth next week). The line is great both ways. We just can't afford to get anyone hurt."

Berryhill added that all Dimmitt stores handling school supplies should have lists and supplies needed for school.

Dimmitt Middle School principal Neal Bryan said fourth, fifth and sixth grade students will register from 1 p.m. through 4 p.m. Tuesday in the west section of the school, while seventh graders will register from 1 p.m. until 2:30 p.m. and eighth graders will sign up from 2:30 p.m. until 4 p.m. in the DMS library.

Bryan said meal tickets and application forms for free and reduced price meals will be available at registration.

At Dimmitt High School, seniors will register from 1 p.m. until 1:45 p.m., juniors will sign up from 1:45 p.m. until 2:30 p.m., sophomores will register from 2:30 p.m. until 3:15 p.m. and freshmen will register from 3:15 p.m. until 4 p.m. in the DHS auditorium.

1984-85 annuals may be picked up at registration, and all underclassmen will have their school pictures taken at registration.

DHS Principal Alex Glass emphasized the school dress code policy will be in effect for school pictures.

In Hart, students in grades K through 6 will register next Thursday from 8:30 a.m. until 12 noon and from 1 p.m. until 3:30 p.m. All kindergarten and new students to the Hart Schools should present a birth certificate and health records at registration.

Parents or guardians must accompany students to school at registration if they qualify for free or reduced-price lunches to sign the forms. The forms must include the social security numbers of all adults in the household.

Parents that qualify for free lunches that have children four years of age with limited English speaking or comprehension should be present with their child at registration.

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Texas bans infected stock

Permits for entry of horses, cattle and swine from three Colorado counties into Texas are being refused because of vesicular stomatitis outbreaks, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, said this week.

The counties are Pueblo, Fremont and El Paso. Other cases have been confirmed or are suspected in Montezuma, La Plata, Jefferson and Douglas Counties. More than 70 cases have been confirmed in horses in Colorado.

VS can affect horses, cattle and swine. Symptoms include excessive salivation and vesicular lesions of the oral cavity. Lameness is frequently observed. In dairy herds, loss of milk production may be serious.

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Grape grower grasping for market share

The burgeoning Texas wine industry is alive and well in Castro County with the beginning of grape harvest Monday in three county vineyards.

The vineyards are owned by Danny Martin, west of Easter; Tom Draper, about 13 miles north of Dimmitt; and Milton Moore, who has a five-acre vineyard northeast of Dimmitt.

Moore received cuttings from California vineyards three years ago and harvested his first grapes this year, starting with Zinfandels (a sweet, deep red, old German grape) Monday morning. Moore also has Carinoegon (a pinkish red grape), and two "white" grapes, Emerald Riesling and Chenin Blanc.

"The cutting just looked like a stick," Moore explained Monday. "We planted all of them three years ago, but we've had to replant some this year. We've had a bit of bad luck with rabbits eating the vegetation, and a disease called crown gall that encircles the plant and kills it. The crown gall hasn't been too bad."

"We've only had to spray for insects once. We have a leaf hopper-type insect called a leaf miner that got a few of the leaves, but we sprayed just once all through the vineyard, twice on a few plants, and controlled it. We were able to use a hand sprayer from a pickup.

"Birds can be a problem, but we haven't had any trouble from birds this year, and neither has anyone else that I've talked to. We've had some birds feeding on milo, but not on the grapes."

Moore said wind and dust can be a problem.

"This shows what this wind can do," Moore said as he pointed out a grape that was almost perfect except for a large scar on the underside. "The wind rubs the grapes against the stakes and the wire (supports used to "train" the vines), and the sand and dust can scar the grapes, too.

"Some folks have said wasps can be a problem, eating the mature grapes, but we haven't had that problem yet."

Moore said much of the research done on grapes in Texas has been done by Dr. John Lipe, Extension Service Horticulturist from Fredericksburg.

"He's done a lot of planting and research," Moore said. "Any time we have a problem, usually he can answer it. Plus, we're doing some of our own experimenting. We irrigated one time, and the rows are 20 feet apart. Dr. Lipe suggested planting the rows ten feet apart, but I think I get a better watering with the 20-foot rows."

Martin uses drip irrigation on two of his varieties, while Art Reinauer of Hereford, who established a vineyard several years ago and founded La Escabarda Winery in Hereford two years ago, has a complete drip irrigation system for his large vineyard west of Hereford.

"I'll try to set up a drip irrigation system here, maybe next year," Moore said. "But we just had to water once this year. The showers we've had took care of the rest of the plants' needs."

Thanks to studies by Lipe and growers throughout the region, grapes have become more plentiful and very low water-intensive. In fact, the plants use less water than cotton and can start making a total profit for a vintner in about eight years.

"The initial cost is probably about \$1,500 an acre. That includes marginal land, which is all you really need, very little water, the cuttings, a little fertilizer, a little bit of insecticide, and poles and wire for the plant.

"The third year, the vines will bear about 50-to-60 percent of their potential fruit, and will bear right at 100% of their potential after the fourth or fifth year. Dr. Lipe says you are completely in the black, on the average, by the eighth year. These plants will potentially bear forever. There are plants that have borne fruit for hundreds of years, and cuttings from those plants can go on and on . . ."

One of the problems faced by Reinauer and the larger Llano Estacado winery in Lubbock has been producing enough wine for the market.



"I did an informal poll a couple of years ago," Moore said. "I called every store in Amarillo, seeing if any of them had Texas wines. There was just one store that had any.

"I found out one of the problems is that Llano Estacado was shipping wine to Dallas and to Houston, but they cut out most of the Houston shipment because they couldn't meet the demand in the Dallas area.

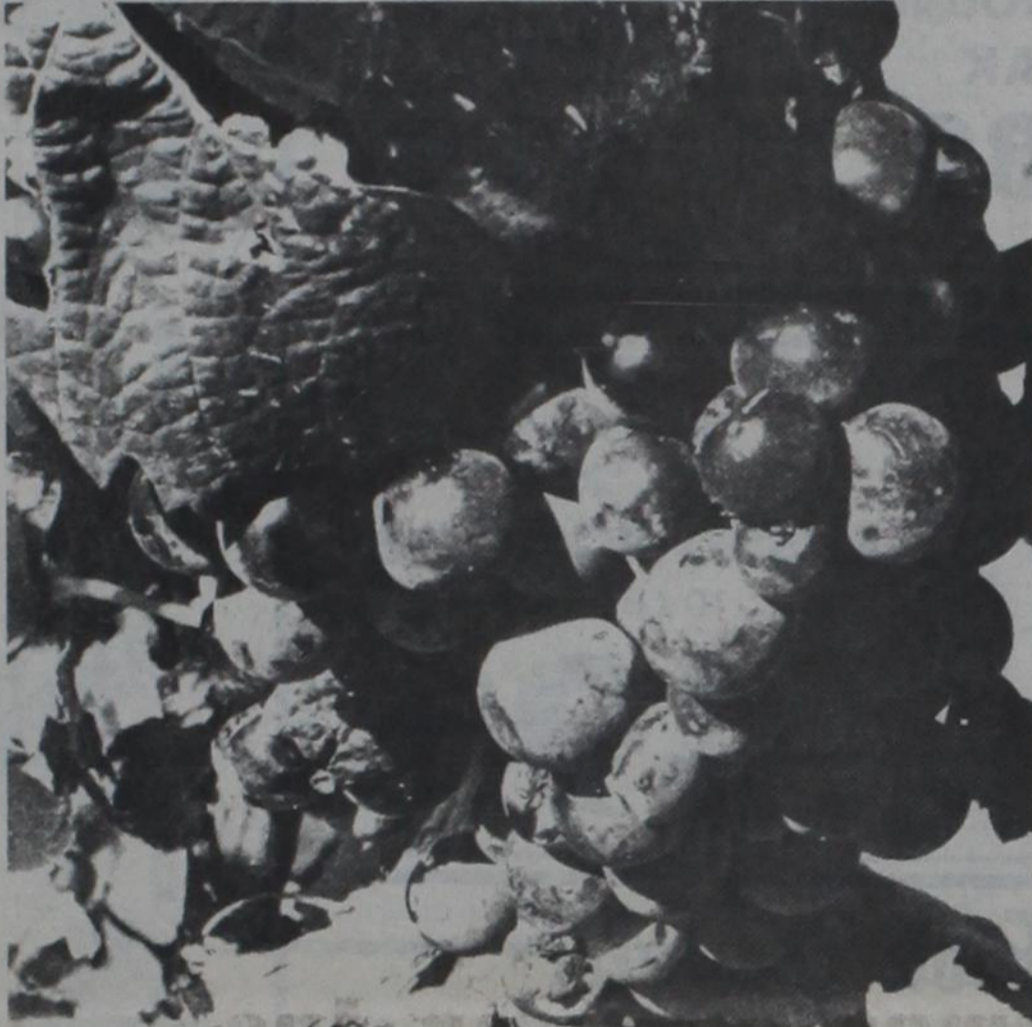
"We're trying to appeal to the overall marketplace. We've learned from marketing ex-

perts the average buyer is an upper-middle-class housewife between 35 and 40 years old. They really don't seem to have any preference as to sweet or dry, red or white.

"One thing that has made a big splash has been the wine coolers. Everybody's into that

— Bartles and Jaymes is made by Gallo, there's Seagram's Coolers, Anheuser-Busch makes one. They're already extremely popular. Some are sweet, some are dry, but they've all opened up a big market for all of us.

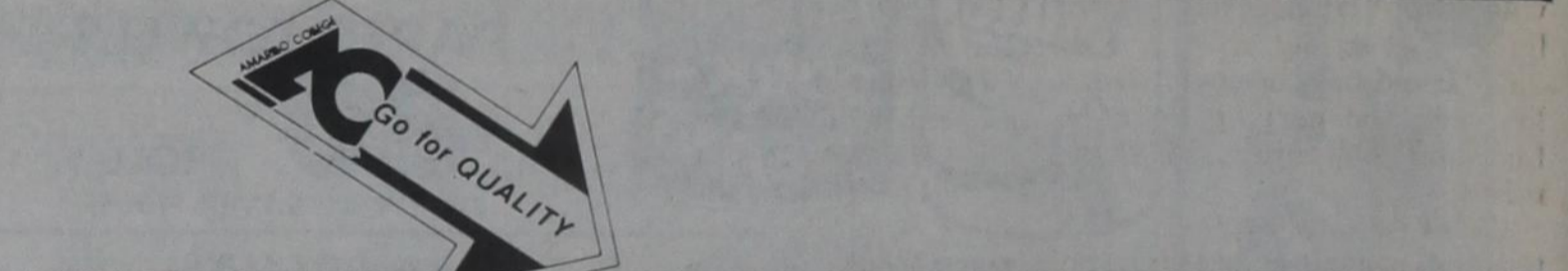

Police Calls

A night out on the town ended in a stabbing Monday morning on Southwest Sixth Street.

City police identified the stabbing victim as Henry Trejo, 40, of Hart. He received emergency treatment at Plains Memorial Hospital for a two-inch knife wound in the abdomen, then was transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Charged with attempted murder was a 34-year-old Farmer County man, Verna Munoz. He was arrested in Farmer County Tuesday morning, and is in the Castro County Jail.

The stabbing occurred about 1:35 a.m. Monday on the street in the 400 block of Southwest Sixth, police said.

Witnesses told officers that Trejo, Munoz, Trejo's wife and her sister had been to a dance and had ridden in a pickup together afterward to the home of Mrs. Trejo's sister.

Witnesses said Trejo and Munoz started fighting inside the parked pickup, and that they got out and continued the fight down the street, where the stabbing occurred. Munoz fled on foot after the incident, they said.

Rosa Escamilla, 35, of Hereford was charged with assault with a deadly weapon after she reportedly fired two shots at Alejandro Perez of Hereford on the parking lot of a local dance hall Monday.

She also was charged with unlawfully carrying a weapon. Both charges against her are felonies.

The shooting incident reportedly occurred shortly after midnight. Escamilla was first taken into custody by security guard Sam Ramirez, who told city police that the woman was sitting in a parked car when she fired the two shots. Ramirez took a Colt .38 special revolver from Escamilla and turned it over to police when they arrived. The pistol had two spent rounds in it, officers said.

In another parking-lot incident, a 20-year-old Hart man suffered a broken tooth and possible jaw fracture when he was assaulted Saturday night by a 20-year-old man and a 15-year-old boy, both also from Hart, in the parking lot of a fast-food restaurant in Dimmitt.

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L. D. Frazier, 208 NW Fifth St., reported Friday afternoon that his home had been burglarized.

Among the items taken, Frazier said, were a macrame hanging decoration and a rechargeable flashlight, with a total value of more than \$40.

Frazier showed city police where the burglars pulled a screen off of a window, cracked a window and bent a door handle before finally gaining entry through a window in his

garage. The case is under investigation.

Mrs. Clarence Bearden, 725 Maple St., reported that a brick had been thrown through a storm window and inner window of her home while she was gone for two weeks. She said that small pieces of concrete also had been thrown at three plate-glass windows near her patio, and that she had found a cigarette lighter on the patio, but that nothing was missing from her home. The case is being investigated.

John Castaneda of Western Vegetables reported last week that someone had driven a

small vehicle between the brine vats at the plant and had run over a ladder, causing an estimated \$80 damage. The case is under investigation.

A truck driver backed into a small car which he said he couldn't see behind him Friday afternoon, causing damage to a 1983 Chevrolet Celebrity occupied by two 15-year-old Dimmitt girls.

Joe Solis Jr. told city police that he had stopped at a yield sign at the 600 block of West Lee Street and started to enter Front Street with his truck when he saw a vehicle approaching on Front.

Meanwhile, the small car's driver reportedly pulled up behind Solis' truck and stopped.

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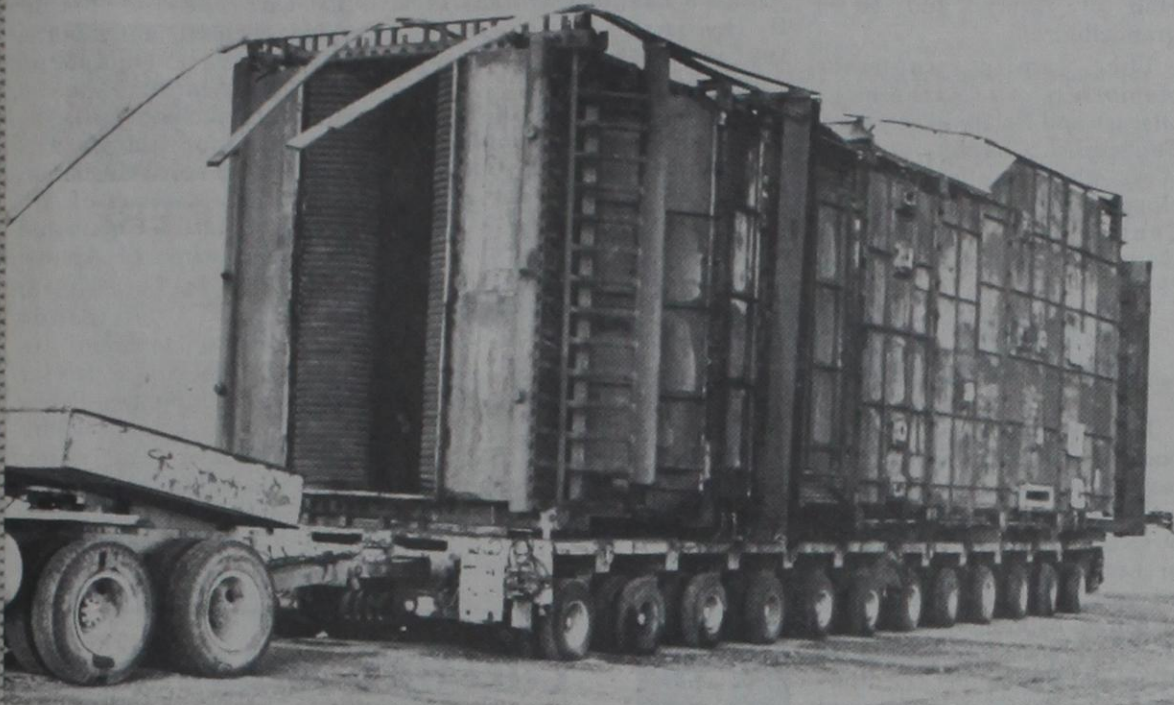

Farmers eligible for disaster loans

County farmers who received physical losses caused by excessive rain and hail June 2 through June 5 may apply for emergency loans at the Farmers Home Administration office at Third and Bedford, County Supervisor Dean Sanders announced this week.

Castro County is one of 10 counties named eligible by Secretary of Agriculture John Block as eligible for loans to cover physical losses only.

As a general rule, a farmer

must have suffered damages to or destruction of physical property including farmland; structures such as buildings, fences or dams; machinery, equipment or tools; livestock and livestock products; harvested crops; and supplies.

Insurance proceeds will have to be deducted when determining these losses.

Application for loans under the emergency designation will be accepted until April 7, 1986, but county FmHA officials encourage farmers to apply as

soon as possible, since delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly carry over into the new farming season.

Sanders said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual physical loss, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is five percent, with an eight percent interest rate on the balance borrowed over that.

For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.75%.

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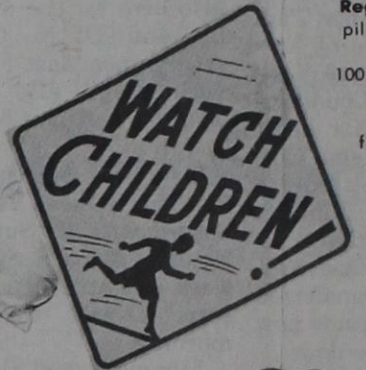
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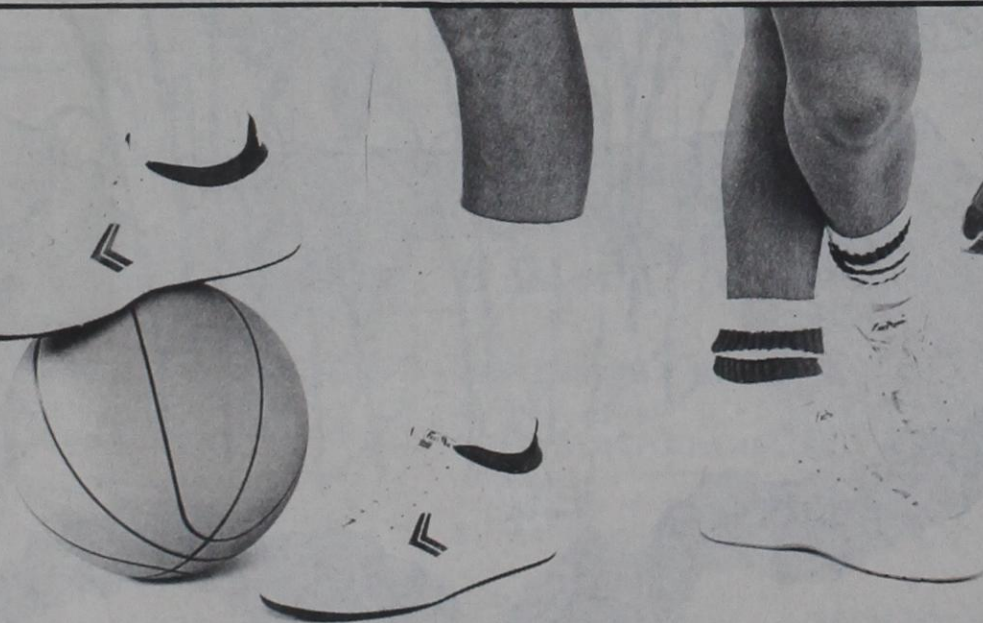
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
