Germany and Colonies No Problem for America

A speculative gentleman inclined to venture his money on international politics might very well lay a little something on the line right now to say that Germany will presently be in possession again of her old pre-war colonies.

The heat is on; Germany has notified England and France that she would like to discuss the colonial problem at their convenience, and Hitler has come to bat with one of those "or else" speeches calling for return of the missing property.

But before he does, the unconcerned American might take the trouble to get himself straight on the background. The whole business of overseas colonies has always been pretty ugly. Offhand, it is hard to think of any nation that ever acquired any colonies other than by force.

Consequently, Hitler's recent speech at Munich—in which he spoke of "the colonies to which we have a right"—can be taken as something for home consumption only.

Look at the simple history of it. Germany got her pre-war colonies by force, just as England got South Africa, France got the Sahara and America got the Philippines.

The fact that the allied nations professed the noblest of ideals while they were scrambling to take Germany's overseas possessions away from her may inspire one with cynicism about the statesman's profession, but it still does not affect the fundamental fact: that property which is acquired at the point of a gun and lost in the same way does not trail any particular odor of sanctity.

It is rather important that all of this be kept in mind. It may at least save us from regarding this colonial problem as a moral issue. There are enough moral issues involved in the international situation, Heaven knows, with out adding any new ones.

And when we do look at the problem realistically, we shall probably find added reason to feel that our isolationist policy is a wise one. We have not the slightest interest in whether Germany does or does not regain the overseas possessions she once held.

Migratory Waterfowl Regulations

Under new federal migratory waterfowl regulations announced recently Texas duck hunters will have a 45-day open season compared to a 30-day open season in 1932.

Hunting Methods. Hunters may shoot ducks and geese and other waterfowl in season with a shotgun only, not larger than a No. 10 gauge, fired from the shoulder; a dog, a blind or floating device other than a sink box may be used.

Quail Season

Quail season does not open in Texas until December 1. Many think that quail season opens on November 16 at the time when after the season closes.

It is unlawful in the United States for a person over the age of 16 years to take ducks, geese or brant unless he carries on his person an unexpired federal migratory-bird hunting stamp, validated by his signature written in ink across the face.

Dove Season. Dove season in this section of Texas closed at sunset on November 15. One may not keep doves on cold storage more than 10 days.

Red River Dam Is To Cost \$54,000,000 When It Is Finished

DURANT, Okla.—Work is underway preliminary to construction of the \$54,000,000 Red River Dam, the largest flood control and hydro-electric project in the Southwest.

Capt. Lester F. Rhodes, first assistant to the U. S. Army engineer in charge of construction of the dam, announced the start of borings and power shovel activities at the damsite, where scores of men are at work.

An anticipated delay contingent upon appropriation by congress of money for the \$375,000,000 omnibus flood-control authorization bill under which the dam is to be erected has been sidetracked, Rhodes said.

Rhodes said that money already had been made available to the war department for carrying out its flood control plans until 1945. He asserted that congress would hand over sums as needed in the progress of the dam's construction.

Previously, it had been feared that actual construction of the dam would have to await a congressional appropriation for the omnibus bill passed last year, which included the Red River project.

Availability of funds to the war department for this type of works means that preliminary work on the second largest earthen dam in the world can be rushed and the four-year construction job begun on a major scale, Rhodes said.

Rhodes announced also that Earl D. Yarcho has arrived at Denison, Tex., headquarters for the dam construction from St. Paul, Minn., to take charge of removal of public utilities from the area to be inundated by the impounded waters.

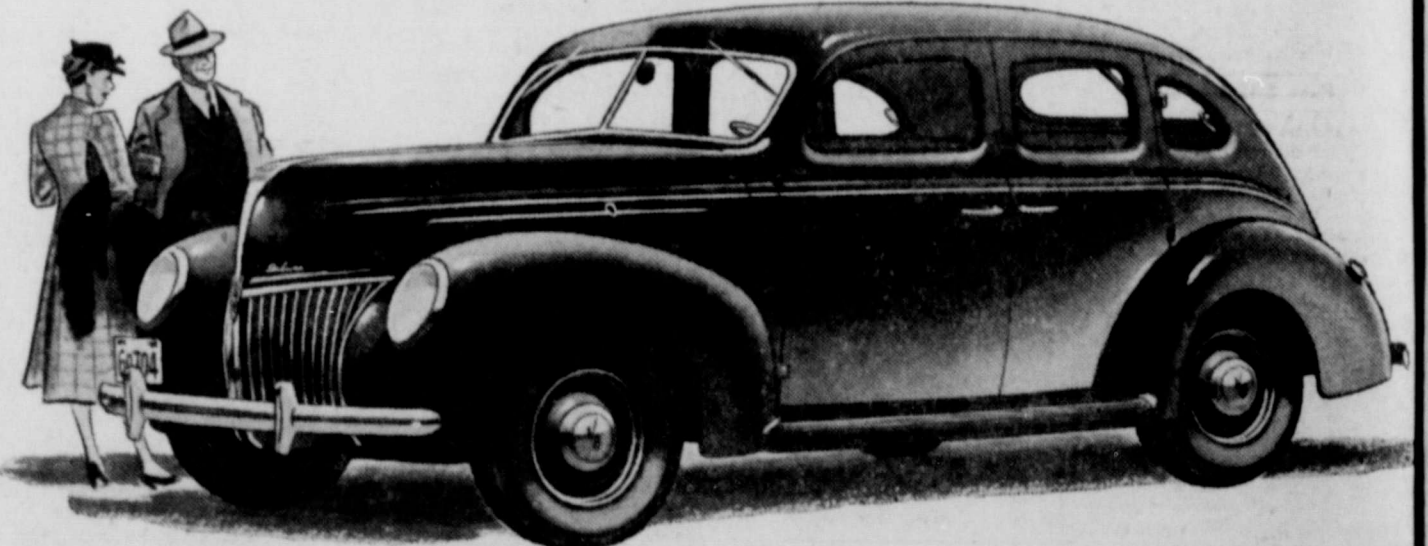

Some years ago, on the occasion of his attaining 25 years in the Christian ministry, the late Dr. John Watson (better known as Ian Maclaren, author of the book 'Beside the Bonny Briar Bush' and other well-known stories of Scottish life) in writing his reminiscences of the 25 years for The British Weekly, wrote of one of the duties of the Christian minister as 'to lie bravely.' It might have been a printer's error for 'to lie bravely,' but in my careful reading of the British Weekly, I never saw any correction. It would be of course very easy to protest and speak contemptuously of such a thing, though I think that honest realism would compel one to recognize that there might be occasions and circumstances under which what Ian Maclaren implied might be both necessary and justifiable. One could conceive of situations in which a minister would be compelled to protect individuals by confidences that he could not divulge. There is, of course, the situation in which we protect the sick, and it is doubtful whether it would be either right, or possible, for a doctor, for instance, under every circumstance to tell his patient the bald truth. Such questions are probably not very profitable, nor can it be said perhaps that they enter into any serious way into this matter of lying. The courteous misstatements which we make...

WASHINGTON—Sure, it's the Farleys and the Corcorans that now are debating what the election results mean and who should be the boys consequently in favor of the big White House. 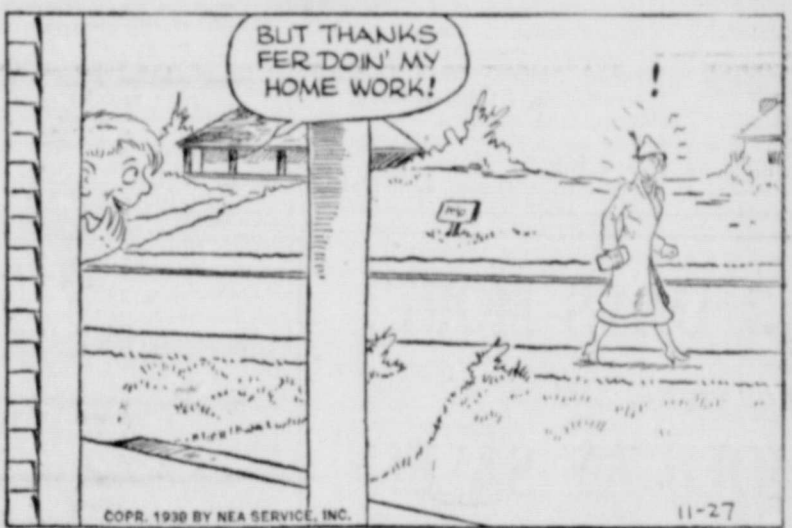
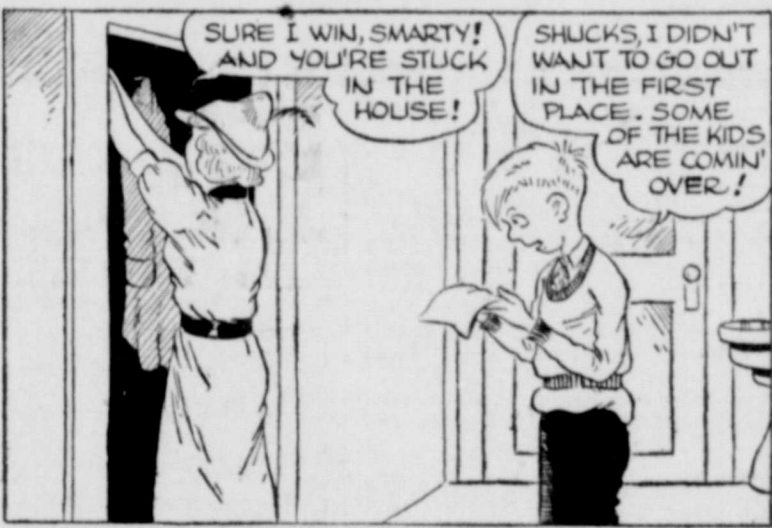
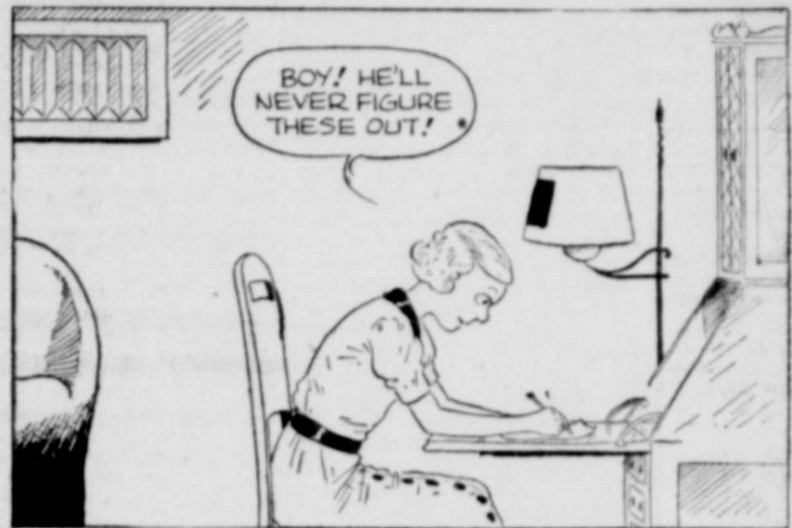
