ONF YEAR BY MAIL (In Texas)

Before Congress really gets down to work on the rearmament program, it is to be hoped that its members will appreciate the fact that, in a military sense, America today is in the position of England during the 19th century.

Which is to say that America today is an insular nation. Its true defense lies on the sea. Just as England was protected by its "moat" until the modern bombing plane rendered the moat useless, so today America is protected by its own moat-the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. And no military program the nation can devise is worth paying for unless it is founded on that simple fact.

Modern armaments take three forms-land, sea and air. And an insular nation must approach its defense problems from a different angle than a nation which does not enjoy the protection of the sea. Germany, for instance, must have a very strong army in order to be secure; it must have peace-time conscription and all the rest of the machinery that enables it to put an overwhelming force on the frontiers at a moments notice.

But that is not at all the answer to the problem on this side of the Atlantic. A nation which can keep its enemies from getting near its frontiers does not need a strong frontier guard. A small, mobile force that can be rushed quickly to any danger spot is all it needs in the way of frontier

But on the water the situation is reversed. Germany can have security with a relatively small navy; the United States, on the other hand, cannot have it without an exceedingly strong pavy. This is an extremely important fact in relation to the prospects for American democracy. For a nation which must prepare in the European manner, with conscription of man-power and regimentation of industry, must inevitably surrender some of its liberties -- as the French are learning today, to their sdrrow. But a sea power can have security without paying that price.

It was not by accident that England enjoyed unbroken freedom and democracy for so many years. It was able to do so because, being defended on and by the seas, it could attain security without supporting an immense mili- enez, Eastland, tary establishment. And America today is in a similar situa-


