**Public Housing Program Gains Permanency**

A rule of politics is that changes come faster than public realization that the changes are here.

Depressions are in full swing before any but the best-trained economists know they are present. Recovery usually comes before any but a few realize it. The revolt against prohibition was full-blown before the average political figure knew it.

Thus changes in our economic and social life come in such a way that none but the closest students know they have occurred. A good example is public housing.

Ask the average person and he will say that public housing is a depression measure aimed at temporarily healing scars left by the buffets of economic disaster.

Is it that, or is it a permanent change in our manner of thinking about housing?

Let's see: There are now 171 counties, municipal, or metropolitan housing authorities operating in the United States and its possessions, according to the National Association of Housing Officials.

Thirty-three states have passed laws which permit local governments to establish housing authorities, and 29 have set up agencies for development of low-rent housing projects. In 31 of the states, local governments are permitted to grant subsidies in the form of tax exemptions or direct grants to housing organizations. Indiana alone has 20 local public housing organizations.

That the conduct of public housing projects has become a recognized profession is attested by the mere existence of the association which compiled the figures.

Note that all these are state laws. They are not something passed by a single Congress which may change complexion in a few years and rescind them. They are the acts of widely diverse states.

Thus, while earnest folk debate the wisdom of the program, public housing itself is already an accomplished and growing fact. Nobody tries to forecast the future any more. It is more than most of us can do to keep up with the present.

**Cultural Relations Between Americas Has Its Benefits**

FORT WORTH, Tex.—Cultural relations between the United States and South American nations would have a more beneficial effect in creating good feeling between the various countries than strictly business relations, Dr. Rodolfo Mueller of Valparaiso, Chile, believes.

Dr. Mueller, in this country to learn English and to study special phases of medicine at the Mayo Clinic at Rochester, Minn., said that the United States was at a handicap in winning South American friendship—particularly in Chile—because Germany now has a second generation of "old friends" in the Latin-American countries.

By offering fellowships for professional students, which give an added cultural association, the Nazi government has gone a long way in winning Latin-American friendship, Dr. Mueller believes. He said the United States "has the right idea, to make friends" but must offer something more than mere business promises.

He pointed out that German steamships offer special tourist services for Chileans to visit Germany. Through cultural methods, as well as the pocketbook, the Nazis have appealed to South American vanity, he said.

Dr. Mueller, who holds a degree in medicine from the Chilean University, spent three years in a German hospital at Valparaiso and was offered one of the eight fellowships given annually to Chilean doctors who desire a year's study. He preferred, however, to come to this country, and will go to Rochester as soon as he has mastered the English language.

**Italy Expanding Its Civil Aviation**

ROME.—Fifty civil airplanes take off every day from various Italian air fields sprinkled over the peninsula, averaging daily distances which if totalled would be sufficient to reach around the world at the equator.  
Official statistics issued by the air ministry add that Italian civil airplanes flew a total of 7,000,000 miles during 1938.

During the past year aviation lines transported from the Alps to Sicily 9989,179 pounds of mail, 5,730,247 pounds of cargo, with a total of 119,280 passengers.  
Although no official figures are available as to the number of civil machines today operating in the country, it is estimated that they total at least 150.  
These statistics were revealed by Deputy Umberto Klinger in an audience he had with Premier Benito Mussolini. Klinger is president of the Ala Littoria Air Co., the only civil airline in Italy, and which is controlled by the government.  
Klinger also told the Duce that a new airline soon will be inaugurated between Italy and South America. At first only mail will be flown to Latin America, but it is expected that regular passenger service will be started before the close of 1939.  
Klinger added that the name of Mussolini is linked to this new line because his son, Bruno Mussolini, blazed the route for the new line in spring of 1938, when he led a squadron of three bombing planes on a non-stop flight to South America.
