



### The Visit of Dr. Aranha an Opportunity for U.S.

The choice of Dr. Oswaldo Aranha as Brazil's representative in for hooming conferences at the White House is a happy one. The United States welcomes Dr. Aranha, now en route to the U.S., as a friend, not only a proved friend of our country, but a friend of democratic governments, for which he has fought unceasingly in his own country.

Dr. Aranha is a man of delightful personality which won him hundreds of personal friendships when he was ambassador to Washington from Brazil. He is a fast thinker, and a hard worker, one to whom President Roosevelt should be able to talk understandingly and on equal terms.

They can not fail to find a great deal in commoon in the fact that Dr. Aranha has been in Brazil one of the leading bulwarks against Fascist influences in that country, a devoted friend of democracy and orderly procedure, and in every way one of the most distinguished of Brazil's sons.

The White House conferences between Dr. Aranha' and President Roosevelt and other U. S. officials should give direct evidence of the intention to carry forward in deeds the words of the Declaration of Lima and the resolution of the Americas to preserve a free system of trade as against private and discriminatory deals between spe- FRECKLES and HIS FRIENDScial countries.

Without excluding any other countries, or in any way barring them from legitimate trade with Brazil, there are many ways in which greater trade and closer co-operation between Brazil and the United States may be stimulated. In many important commercial respects, Brazil with its coffee and rubber, cacao and manganese, tin and diamonds, all lacking to continental United States, is complementary to U. S. economy, while the rise of a manufacturing economy, the building of railroads and roads, and the general rise in standards of living offers plenty of opportunity for the United States to furnish a large share of manufactured goods necessary to the upbuilding of Brazil.

Brazil has been traditionally friendly to the United States, and this visit of Dr. Aranha offers an opportunity to see how the two nations may be of greater service to one another.

As in later talks expected to follow with representatives of other South American countries, there is no longer any wish for diplomatic or commercial "victories." The need today is to apply intelligence to find ways in which each country may help the other. Then there will be no lack of byproducts of understanding and amity.

Events in the Spanish war remind that not a single un strategic spot has changed hands during the war.

The statement that people the world around are much alike is not apt to please anybody capable of reading about the others.
